BOLLINGTON (near Altrincham) is a small township and village on the river Bollin and the road from Altrincham to Warrington, and near the Bridgewater canal, 1½ miles south from Dunham Massey station on the Warrington and Altrincham section of the London and North Western railway and 3 south-west from Altrincham; the parish was formed Aug. 10, 1869, out of the original parishes of Rastherne and Bowdon, comprising the townships of Bollington, Agden and a portion of Millington, in the Altrincham division of the county, Bucklow union, Altrincham petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The river Bollin forms the north-east boundary of the township. The church of the Holy Trinity, consecrated 10 Nov. 1854, is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a western turret containing one bell: the church has an open timber framed roof and a stone pulpit and font, and affords 260 sittings, about 170 of which are free. The register dates from the year 1870. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £212, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Rostherne, and held since 1895 by the Rev. Charles James Bradshaw M.A. of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge. The vicarage house was built in 1883, by a grant from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and private subscription, upon an acre of land given by the late Earl of Stamford and Warrington. On the river Bollin is a large corn mill. The Countess of Stamford and Warrington, who is lady of the manor, and Earl Egerton of Tatton, are the sole landowners. The soil is in some parts clay; subsoil, heavy clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats, potatoes, &c. The area of the township is 647 acres; rateable value, £1,743; the population in 1901 was 215, and of the parish 375.

BOLLINGTON (near Prestbury) is a parish, with a station on the Macclesfield and Marple section of the Great Central (late M. S. and L.) railway, 3½ miles north-east from Macclesfield, 169 from London, 26 from Crewe, 13 south from Stockport, and 18 from Manchester, in the Knutsford division of the county, hundred, union and county court district of Macclesfield, petty sessional division of Prestbury, and in the rural deanery and archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The railway crosses the river Bollin and the main road to Macclesfield by a viaduct of twenty-two arches; the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire canal also passes through.

Under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. c. 73), an Urban District Council was formed here in 1895, having been governed from 1862 by a Local Board of Health. The Urban District is divided into Central, East and West wards. The parish is lighted with gas and supplied with water from works belonging to the District Council.

AGDEN is a small township, 4 miles south-west from Altrincham, in the hundred of Bucklow. Heatley, about 2 miles north, is the nearest railway station on the Altrincham and Warrington section of the London and North Western railway. Agden Hall, the residence of Oswald Moseley esq. is a fine old Elizabethan mansion, beautifully seated upon a commanding eminence, overlooking the woods of Dunham park and a fertile tract of country extending into the adjoining county of Lancaster. Major Sir Philip W. Chetwode bart. of Oakley Hall, Staffordshire, is the lord of the manor and sole landowner. The population in 1901 was 115, and the area is 607 acres; rateable value, £1,143.

MILLINGTON is a small township, 4 miles south-west from Altrincham and 5 west-north-west from Knutsford, and consisting principally of scattered farms. There is a Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1834; Congregational, at Bucklow Hill, erected in 1828, and a Baptist chapel, erected about 1750. Earl Egerton of Tatton is lord of the manor and the principal landowner. The soil is clay and the subsoil sandy. The population in 1901 was 225, and the area 747 acres; rateable value, £1,821.

By Local Government Board Order, No. 41,128, which came into operation Sept. 30th, 1900, the Urban District and civil parish were extended to include Kerridge civil parish.

The ecclesiastical parish was formed in May 10, 1842, out of the parish of Prestbury.

The church of St. John the Baptist, an edifice of stone in the Early English style, was erected in 1834 by the Church Commissioners and parishioners, at a cost of £4,000, and consists of chancel, nave, transept, aisles, and an embattled western tower with pinnacles containing a clock and 8 bells: the stained east window is a memorial to the Rev. George Palmer M.A. 13 years incumbent of Bollington: there are 700 sittings. The register dates from the year 1834. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £340, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Prestbury, and held since 1897 by the Rev. Charles Brooke Gwynne M.A. of Christ's College, Cambridge. The vicarage, a building of stone in the Elizabethan style, erected in 1898

at a cost of £4,000, is on the Shrigley road. The Public Elementary school at Bollington Cross is licensed for divine service, which is held here on Sundays, morning and evening. The building at Kerridge formerly used as a National school is also licensed for divine service, which is held here on Sunday afternoon. The Catholic church in Chapel street, erected in 1834, is dedicated to St. Gregory, and will seat about 250 persons. The Congregational chapel, in Palmerston street, erected in 1867, is an edifice of stone in the Early Decorated style, with a turret and spire 96 feet high, and affords 450 sittings. The Wesleyan chapel in Wellington road, built in 1886, at a cost of about £6,000, is of stone, with a turret and spire, and has about 700 sittings. The Wesleyan chapel at Kerridge, built in 1901, is of white stone, and will seat 350 persons. The Primitive Methodist chapel in High street, built in 1859, is of stone, and seats about 550 persons. The Methodist New Connexion chapel, in Greenshaw lane, is a small iron building. The undenominational Sunday school in Palmerston street, erected in 1861, at a cost of £2,000, is also used for public entertainments, and will seat about 900 persons. In and adjoining the township are several large mills for the manufacture of cotton fabrics. Situate at the extreme point of a ridge of hills here is a small conical stone tower, called "White Nancy," erected for the purpose of a land boundary; inside it is a stone table with seats surrounding it, and from this site extensive views are obtained. The Earl of Derby K.G., P.C. is lord of the manor. The principal landowners are Peter P. Brocklehurst esq. of Hurdfield House, Macclesfield, William Williamson esq. Major Harwar, the trustees of the late Samuel Greg esq. Henry Davenport esq. and Mrs. Lowther, of Shrigley Hall. The soil is clayey and sandy; the subsoil, rock of superior quality. There are many large stone quarries in the neighbourhood. The area of the civil parish and Urban District is 1,291 acres of land and 15 of water; rateable value, £17,375; the population in 1901 was 5,245; viz.: Central ward, 1,826; East ward, 1,743; West ward, 1,676.

Bollington Cross and Kerridge are hamlets in Bollington parish.

BOSLEY is a township, village and parish, constituted in 1858 out of Prestbury and formed into a district chapelry Feb. 16, 1883; it is on the road from Macclesfield to Leek, Staffs. with a station on the Churnet Valley branch of the North Staffordshire railway, 6 miles south from Macclesfield, 17½ north-east from Stoke-on-Trent, 7 from Leek, 5 east-north-east from Congleton and 163 from London, in the Macclesfield division of the county, petty sessional division of Prestbury, Macclesfield hundred, union and county court district, and in the rural deanery and archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Mary the Virgin, originally Norman, is a small edifice of brick, rebuilt, with the exception of the tower, in 1777, and consisting of chancel (added in 1834), nave, and an ancient and low embattled tower containing 4 bells: the organ was the gift of Joseph Stubbs esq. in 1879: the brass lectern was presented by Mrs. Peel, of the Manor House, in memory of her husband, Charles Peel esq. who died 18 July, 1889: the stained east window is a memorial to Mrs. Sarah Sutcliffe, d. 24 Jan. 1859, and was erected by her husband, the Rev. William Sutcliffe M.A. incumbent of this parish (1833-70): there are four other stained windows in the nave, including one to Abraham Bullock, d. 9 March, 1894, and a mural tablet to John Williams Nowell esq. of Macclesfield, d. 21 Dec. 1837: the church was restored and reseatened in 1878 and affords 250 sittings. The registers date from the year 1728. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £80, with 35 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the vicar of Prestbury, and held since

GREAT BOUGHTON is a village and township in the parish of St. Oswald, Chester, partly within the limits of the municipal and parliamentary borough of Chester and bounded on the north by the river Dee; it is 1½ miles south-east from the Cross, in the Eddisbury division of the county, lower division of the hundred of Broxton, union and county court district of Chester and petty sessional division of Chester Castle. During the Civil war this village was the scene of several encounters between the Royalists and Parliamentary forces; in 1644, Chester being then besieged by the latter, a detachment of the garrison sallied forth to attack a Parliamentary force posted in the adjoining village of Christleton; the skirmish began at Great Boughton, and after a severe struggle the Parliamentarians retired, but about 140 of the king's party were slain, most of them being citizens of Chester. The whole of Great Boughton, including the hall, was burned down by the garrison of Chester in order to prevent the enemy from re-occupying it. Most of the land is cultivated as market gardens, which furnish abundant supplies to the Chester market. Boughton Hall, the property of

Mrs. Currie, and now (1906) the residence of James Garrett Frost esq. is an ancient mansion of the 17th century, with a good entrance porch; the hall has a floor of polished oak and a fireplace surrounded by Dutch tiles, and bearing the date 1655; it has been in the possession of the Currie family since the time of Henry VII. Mrs. Currie, of Eastbourne, is lady of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is loam; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are vegetables, strawberries &c. The area is 719 acres; rateable value, £7,577; the population in 1901 was 1,034, including 27 inmates and 5 officials in Tarvin workhouse.

BOWDON.

BOWDON is an extensive parish and township, 9 miles south from Manchester, 7 from Knutsford, 12 from Northwich and 1 south-west from Altrincham, with a station locally in Stamford road, Altrincham, on the Manchester, South Junction and Altrincham railway, and connected also with the neighbouring stations on the London and North Western and Cheshire Lines railways (Hale Station), in the Altrincham division of the county, hundred and union of Bucklow, county court district of Altrincham, rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The town occupies a commanding eminence, affording fine views of the valley of Bollin and the surrounding country for many miles; its delightful and healthy situation, and the facilities of railway communication which it enjoys, have made it a popular place of residence for the wealthier classes of Manchester.

"The Local Government Act, 1858" was adopted 22

Jan. 1864, but the township, formerly under the control of a Local Board, is now governed by an Urban District Council, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. c. 73) and is supplied with water by the North Cheshire Water Co.

The Urban District is divided into East, North, South and West Wards.

The parish church of the Blessed Virgin Mary, first erected during the Saxon times, and thrice restored, according to a brass inscription in the interior, in the years 1100, 1320 and 1570, was rebuilt with enlargements, on the same site, in 1860, at a cost of £15,000, under the direction of Mr. W. H. Brakspear, architect, of Manchester, in the Transition style between the Decorated and Perpendicular periods, and is a cruciform edifice, consisting of chancel, with north and south chapels, transepts, clerestoried nave, north and south porches, and an embattled western tower, 91 feet

in height, with pinnacles, and containing a clock and 6 bells: the base of the tower forms a western porch: both chapels were formerly the burying places of the Earls of Stamford and Warrington, but the present family vault is under the south or Dunham chapel: in the south or Dunham chapel is a fine mural monument with inscribed tablet, sculptures and allegorical figures to Henry 2nd Baron Delamere and 1st Earl of Warrington, tried for high treason, but honourably acquitted, 1676; ob. 2 Jan. 1693-4; and to Mary (Langham) his countess, ob. 23 March, 1690-91; here also is another large mural monument, with Ionic pillars supporting a pediment adorned with figures of cherubs, and at the back a shield of arms of 60 quarterings and two medallion portraits; on the monument is a long inscription to the Hon. Langham Booth, d. 12 May, 1724; and to the Hon. Henry Booth, M.P. for Cheshire, 1661-80, d. 2 Feb. 1726-7: in Carrington chapel is a fine monument with recumbent effigies, to William Brereton esq. of Ashley, ob. 29 Aug. 1630, and Jane (Warburton) his wife, ob. 2 March, 1627; the figure of the former lies under an arch in the upper stage of the monument, and below, under a marble canopy, supported on pillars of the Corinthian order, is that of his wife; ten members of the Brereton family were buried here from 1570 to 1660, and the registers also record numerous baptisms: in the chancel proper is a brass to the Rev. John Kingsley M.A. formerly curate here, and some time vicar of Dunham Massey, d. Nov. 1869; and one to Ven. William Pollock D.D. vicar of Bowdon and archdeacon of Chester, d. 11 Oct. 1873; and there are other memorials to Thomas Assheton Smith esq. d. 1769, and Harriet his wife, d. 1778, and to Thomas, their son, d. 1774; and to Edward Jeremiah Lloyd esq. of Oldfield Hall, d. 3 July, 1850: the stained east window was presented by W. Nield esq. in memory of his wife, who died in 1859, and the west window, a memorial to Margaret Annie Clegg, was placed in 1854 by her parents; the large stained windows in the transepts were given by Lady Murray, of Oldfield Hall, and E. Joynson esq. of Bowdon, and there are five others, chiefly memorials: the font, presented in 1860 by Miss Joynson, consists of an octagonal basin of Painswick stone, richly carved, and supported on a shaft of Devonshire marble: the brass lectern was the gift in 1891 of F. G. Napier esq.: there are 1,764 sittings in addition to those in the Dunham chapel: the churchyard was levelled and inclosed by a wall and railings in 1860. The register dates from the year 1627. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £673, with 10 acres of glebe and residence, erected in 1864, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1873 by the Ven. Archdeacon Arthur Gore D.D. of Trinity College, Dublin, examining chaplain to the Bishop of Chester, Canon Residentiary of Chester Cathedral, and surrogate. The mission church of St. Luke in Vicarage lane, erected in 1882, is served from the parish church. The St. Paul's Wesleyan Methodist church, Enville road, erected in 1890, at a cost, including Sunday schools and minister's house, of £30,000, is a building of stone, in the Gothic style, from designs by Mr. W. H. Brakspear, architect, and will seat 700 persons. There are two other small Wesleyan Methodist chapels, one in Vicarage lane and one in Priory street. The charities for distribution in bread, to be given away to the poor every Sunday, and in clothing, amount altogether to about £110 yearly; George Earl of Warrington left by will dated 22 July, 1754, a sum of £5,000, in 1902 of the capital value of £5,610, invested in Consols, for apprenticing, educating or clothing poor children, or for clothing or affording other relief to aged persons; Walton's, Cooke's, and Bagshaw's charities produce £216 yearly for educational purposes and bedding. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and

chief landowner. The population of the township and Urban District in 1901 was 2,788; the acreage, 845 acres of land and 5 of water; rateable value, £29,668.

BREDBURY is an extensive parish, $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles north-east from Stockport, with a station on the Great Central (late M. S. and L.) and Midland Joint railway and $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-west from Bomiley station on the same line, in the Hyde division of the county, hundred of Macclesfield, Stockport union and county court district, petty sessional division of Stockport, rural deanery of Stockport, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester.

The "Local Government Act, 1858," was adopted here 6th January, 1865, and the district has since been extended under the Act 43 and 44, Vict. c. 58 (1880), so as to include Bomiley. The former Local Board has been superseded by an Urban District Council, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. c. 73). By the Stockport Borough Extension Order of 1901, 193 acres of the Bredbury parish was added to the Borough of Stockport, and by the Bredbury and Bomiley Extension Order of 1902, part of the parish of Brinnington, 461 acres, was added to the parish of Bredbury. The ecclesiastical parish was formed September 8, 1846, from the parish of Stockport. The church of St. Mark, erected in 1848 at a cost of £3,330, is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays, aisles, west porch and a western tower with pinnacles containing a clock with four dials and one bell: in the chancel is a memorial window to Zipporah, wife of the late W. C. Vaudrey esq. d. 10th May, 1873, and to Harriet, his sister, d. 27th December, 1868: the brass lectern was presented in memory of Thomas Wild esq.: a carved oak pulpit and prayer desk were erected in 1892 by public subscription as a memorial to the Rev. James Whittaker B.A. vicar here 1846-91, and an oak reredos was presented in 1905 by Mr. J. Clegg: the church affords 740 sittings, of which 338 are free. The lych gate was erected in 1901 in memory of Mr. Clegg Livesey, by his widow and daughters, at a cost of about £300. The register dates from the year 1846. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £268, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1900 by the Rev. Stephen Percival Gray L.Th. of Durham University and Theol. Assoc. K.C.L. Charities:—The sum of £25 18s. yearly, derived from the Barrack Hill school property, is applied to educational purposes here in the form of yearly prizes in money of £1 to children who have been for three years in regular attendance at any elementary school in Bredbury or Bomiley. Bredbury Hall is the property of James Edward Mills esq. The area of the parish of Bredbury, as reduced by the addition to Stockport, is 2,471 acres of land and 66 of water; rateable value, £29,711; that of the Urban District of Bredbury and Bomiley, 3,726; rateable value, £45,028. The population of Bredbury in 1901 was 4,671, that of the Urban District, 7,087, viz.:—Bredbury, 4,671; Bomiley, 2,416.

HATHERLOW and **WOODLEY** are hamlets in this parish. There is a Congregational chapel at George

lane, built in 1876; another at Hatherlow, erected in 1846, and a Primitive Methodist chapel at Woodley, erected in 1868. In the township are collieries, brickfields, and various factories. At Woodley are the wool carding mills of John Lees Buckley and Sons Limited, the machinery works of J. Salmon and Son, and several foundries and steel works. At Woodley there is a junction station on the Great Central (late M. S. and L.) and at Bredbury a station on the Great Central and Midland Joint railways.

BRERETON-cum-SMETHWICK is a township, parish and scattered village, on the road from Newcastle-under-Lyme, Staffs, to Northwich, 1½ miles south-east from Holme Chapel station, on the Crewe and Stockport section of the London and North Western railway, 3 miles north-east from Sandbach, in the Knutsford division of the county, Northwich hundred, Middlewich and Sandbach petty sessional division (Sandbach section), Congleton union and county court district, rural deanery of Congleton, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Oswald, which stands immediately south of the Hall, and is environed with lofty trees, is a building of stone in the late Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles and an embattled western tower with four pinnacles containing 5 bells: the roof is of handsomely-carved oak: in the south aisle is a large and elaborate mural monument with half-effigies originally coloured, to William Smethwick esq. ob. 16 June, 1643, and Frances (Coleclough), his wife, ob. 1 May, 1632: in the north-east angle of the chancel is a finely-carved mural monument of marble in mixed Italian and Gothic styles, with shield of twelve quarterings and an inscription in Latin, stating that anciently the church of Brereton was a donative chapel in the parish of Astbury; that the ancestors of Sir William Brereton kt. baron of Malpas, who erected this monument in the year 1618, were buried in the churchyard at Astbury, but that after the chapel of Brereton had been made parochial the ancestors of the said Sir William Brereton

were buried in the chancel of that church: there are 300 sittings. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £510, including 20 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of and held since 1896 by the Rev. Alfred Littledale Royds M.A. of Trinity Hall, Cambridge. There are Primitive Methodist and Wesleyan chapels. The charities for distribution amount to about £27 yearly, and there is £1 a year for education. Brereton Hall, the property of John Brereton Howard esq. and now in the occupation of John Moir esq. was erected about 1586 by Sir William Brereton kt. created in 1624 Baron Brereton of Leighlin, co. Carlow, a title which is presumed to have become extinct in 1722; the house is a handsome mansion of brick, pleasantly standing in about 17 acres of well-wooded land, on the east bank of the river Croc: the existing structure, originally quadrangular, and the foundation stone of which is said to have been laid by Queen Elizabeth, consists of one side and portions of two others: the principal front, which faces westward and has an embattled parapet, is flanked by gabled wings with tall projecting bays, three storeys in height, lighted by mullioned windows: the entrance gateway formerly had two large and lofty octangular towers, rising considerably above the parapet and connected near their summits by a semi-circular arch, each tower being finished with an ogee-shaped cupola roof with vane: the cupolas of both these towers, however, were destroyed and an embattled parapet substituted by Mr. John Howard, of Hyde, who purchased the estate. The interior has undergone con-

siderable alteration, but the dining room still retains a frieze enriched with the arms of European sovereigns, and in some of the windows and on the cornice of the staircase are the shields of arms of various Cheshire families: other good examples of stained glass exist in the rooms on the first floor, and in one apartment is a chimney-piece with the Brereton arms, supporters and crest &c. and other heraldic ornamentation. A quantity of extremely interesting and valuable stained glass, displaying the arms of distinguished persons of the Elizabethan period, figures of nine of the Saxon earls of Mercia, and seven of the Norman earls of Chester, was removed from the Hall to Aston Hall, near Birmingham, erected (1618-35) by Sir Thomas Holte, 1st bart. and father of Sir Robert Holte bart. who married Jane, sole heiress of the Breretons; on the acquisition of Aston Hall about 1857 by a limited company for public purposes, this glass was transferred to Atherstone Hall, formerly the property of Charles Holt Bracebridge esq. who at his decease in 1872 bequeathed it to his cousin, the Rev. Berdmore Compton M.A. The Duke's Oak, an immense tree, the trunk of which is hollow and capable of holding six persons, is on

Duke's Oak farm. John Brereton Howard esq. who is lord of the manor, Col. Sir Walter Geoffrey Shakerley bart. of Somerford Park, Congleton, and Edmund Swinburne esq. of Brereton, are the chief landowners. The soil is clay and sand. The chief crops are potatoes, oats and wheat. The area is 4,582 acres of land and 17 of water; rateable value, £9,792; the population in 1901 was 552 in the township and 2,055 in the ecclesiastical parish.

Smethwick is a joint township with Brereton.

BROMBOROUGH is a civil parish and well-built village on the high road between Chester and Birkenhead, bounded on the east by the river Mersey, and is 1 mile from Bromborough station and the same distance from Spital station, both on the Birkenhead and Chester section of the London and North Western and Great Western joint railway, 11 north from Chester and 4 south from Birkenhead, in the Wirral division of the county, higher division of the hundred and union of Wirral, petty sessional division of Wirral, county court district of Birkenhead, rural deanery of Wirral and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The village is lighted with gas from the Birkenhead gas works, and water is supplied by the West Cheshire Water Company.

Bromborough was, from January, 1873, controlled by a Local Board, but, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894," is now governed by an Urban District Council. The church of St. Barnabas, the third on the same site, was erected in 1864, from designs by the late Sir G. Gilbert Scott kt. R.A. and is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, north and south porches, and a tower on the north-east, with hexagonal broach spire, and containing 8 bells, presented by Charles Bamford esq. of Bromborough: eight stained windows were placed in the clerestory in 1891 by the late Arthur John Jones Bamford esq. of Misterton Park, Leicestershire, in memory of his father, Charles Bamford esq.: the stained east window is a memorial to Mrs. Bull, and the west window was presented by Sir J. Rankin bart. ex-M.P. in memory of his parents, who formerly resided at Bromborough Hall. During the removal of the previous structure various ancient carved stones of Runic and Saxon origin were found, and are now on the lawn at the rectory: the church affords 500 sittings. The registers date from the year 1560, but are from 1660 perfect. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £270, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester, and held since 1860 by the Rev. Edward Dyer Green, of Queens' College, Cambridge, M.A. Cantuar. and surrogate. There is a lecture, reading and mission room, built in 1868, where divine service is conducted on Sundays only at 3 p.m.; the reading room is open every night at 6 p.m. The Hard-ware charity is of £4 10s. yearly value. A drinking fountain of elegant design has been erected by several of her friends in the village, to the memory of Annie, wife of David MacIver esq. M.P., J.P. late of Woodlee, Brom-

borough, who died 24 August, 1869. Bromborough Pool is an arm of the Mersey, on which river are the Liverpool floating gunpowder magazines, and on the borders of the Pool are the extensive works of Price's Patent Candle Co. Limited, employing about 600 men and boys: in connection with these works is a horticultural society, co-operative stores, hospital, erected in 1901 at a cost of £3,000, and all the organisation of a well-appointed village. Bromborough Pool church, erected in 1890 and maintained by the Company, is a building of freestone, consisting of chancel, nave, and an octangular tower at the south-east, terminating in a bell-cote containing one bell, and is capable of seating 210 persons. The Rev. Edward John Trevitt has been chaplain since 1898. King Edward I. granted Bromborough a weekly market and an annual fair of three days in June, and the charter still holds good, but the fair has long ceased to be held. This place is considered by some to have been the scene in 937 of the battle of Brunanburgh, in which King Athelstan defeated the combined forces of Anlaf the Northman; Camden preferred Broomridge, in the parish of Ford, Northumberland, and others have suggested Brumby, in Lincolnshire. Bromborough Hall, the seat of Sir William Bower Forwood J.P. is a stuccoed building with a handsome portico, standing in a park near the village and church. Charles Francis Kynaston Mainwaring esq. of Oteley, Ellesmere, is lord of the manor and chief landowner. William Hesketh Lever esq. M.P. is also a large landowner. The soil is loamy; the subsoil, red sandstone. The area of the civil parish and Urban District is 1,671 acres of land, 7 of inland and 796 of tidal water and 623 of foreshore; rateable value, £20,481; the population in 1901 was 1,891 in the civil and 1,824 in the ecclesiastical parish.

By Local Government Board Order No. 33,125, Sept. 30, 1895, the Urban District and civil parish were extended to include part of Poulton-cum-Spital civil parish.

Leigh esq. of Belmont Hall, d. 1848, and Joseph Leigh esq. d. 1869; and there are others to James Mosley Leigh esq. d. 1858, and to Sir Peter Warburton, 5th and last bart. of Arley, d. 13 May, 1813; there is also a marble monument to Sir Peter and to Dame Alice (Parker), his wife, and a memorial brass to Edward Ussher, Capt. and Adjut. Royal Scots Greys, who was mortally wounded during the Boer war, and died 20 Feb. 1902: the church was thoroughly restored and reseated in 1870, at a cost of £2,000, and now affords 630 sittings. The register dates from the year 1559. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £370, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford, and held since 1892 by the Rev. Arthur Phidias Holme M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge, and hon. canon of Chester. There is a Wesleyan chapel. The charities for distribution in kind and money amount to about £26 yearly. Belmont Hall, leased by Roscoe Brunner esq. from O. Mosley Leigh esq. is a mansion of brick, standing in extensive pleasure grounds. Piers Egerton-Warburton esq. of Arley, who is lord of the manor, and Oswald Mosley Leigh esq. are the sole landowners. The soil is gravel; subsoil, clay and sand. The chief crops are wheat, oats and potatoes; this is also a good cheese district. Here is a Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1826. The Hon. Lady Leighton-Warren, of Tabley House, Knutsford, who is lady of the manor, and William Vigor Fox esq. of Statham Lodge, are the chief landowners. The soil is clay, and the subsoil is gravel. The crops are wheat and oats, with some land in pasture. The population in 1901 was 203; the area is 1,031 acres, and 30 acres of water, called Pickmere Mere; rateable value, £1,896.

LITTLE BUDWORTH (formerly called Budworth-in-the-Frith) is a township, village and extensive parish, 4 miles south-east from Delamere station on the Cheshire Lines railway, 2 south from Whitegate station on the Winsford branch of the London and North Western railway, and 4 east-north-east from Tarporley, in the Eddisbury division of the county, Eddisbury hundred and petty sessional division, union and county court district of Northwich, rural deanery of Middlewich and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester; it was formerly a part of the parish of Over, and is described as such in the charter for endowing the bishopric of Chester, 38 Hen. VIII. (1546-7). By an Order of the County Council, confirmed by Local Government Board Order No. 28,045, Oulton Lowe was in 1892 added to Little Budworth for civil purposes. The church of St. Peter, formerly belonging to the Benedictine nunnery of St. Mary, at Chester, is an edifice of stone, consisting of chancel, nave and an embattled western tower, containing a clock and 5 bells: the nave was rebuilt in 1800, pursuant to the desire of Ralph Kirkham esq. of Manchester, who was educated at the school within this parish, and left £1,000 for that object: the church affords 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £225, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Bernard Norman Atkinson M.A. of the Victoria University, Manchester. A sum of £400 was left by Ralph Kirkham esq. and the interest of £10 yearly, designed for the education of poor children of the parish, has been transferred to the Education Authority of the Cheshire County Council by the Charity Commissioners. Kirkham's benefaction of £30 yearly is for distribution in money and clothing: there is also a sum of £9, arising from land in Duddon, which is given in money for coal in February of each year. An almshouse was erected here about 1740 by Dame Isabella Dodd, who also endowed the same with an income derived from a house and land, now (1906) producing £218 yearly; the building is arranged to hold 6 poor men and 6 poor women of the parish, the former receiving 3s. and the latter 3s. 6d. weekly, in addition to which each inmate has coal, medical attendance, £1 rs. yearly for clothing, and a Christmas gift of 2s. 6d. Oulton Hall, the seat of Sir Philip Henry Brian Grey-Egerton bart. D.L., J.P. is an elegant and spacious mansion of brick, with stone dressings, standing in a delightful park stocked with about 300 head of deer: on the north side of the park, which is supposed to have originally formed a portion of the forest of Delamere, is a beautiful monument, erected to John Francis Egerton, major, East India Company's horse artillery, son of the Rev. Sir Philip Grey-Egerton, of Oulton Park, born 10 Aug. 1810; during the Sikh war of 1845, he was present with the division of Major-Gen. Sir John Littler in the attack upon the enemy's entrenched camp at Ferozeshah, on the evening of the 21st and the morning of the 22nd Dec. and when, after a severe conflict, the position was carried and the victory already secured, he fell by the sudden assault of two Sikhs, concealed in a village which he was reconnoitring, and being found upon the battle-field thirty hours afterwards, was conveyed to Ferozepore, where, after a month of great suffering, he died, 23 Jan. 1846; on the south side of the monument is some exquisite carving of an emblematical character. White Hall is the residence of James Henry Stock esq. M.A. Between the years 1153 and 1160 the manor was granted by Hugh de Meschines, surnamed "Kevelioc," 3rd Earl of Chester, together with a moiety of the forestership of Mara, to Robert le Grosvenor, whose descendant, Richard le Grosvenor, held Budworth for King Edward I. as Earl of Chester. The manor continued vested in this branch of Grosvenors till the death of Richard le Grosvenor, who left

Cecilia, his daughter, sole heiress; she married successively into the families of Bromley and Mere, having issue by the latter, and subsequently married John Bradburne, whom she survived. In the reign of Henry VI. William del Mere was succeeded in the lordship of the manor by his sister Margaret, wife of Walter Troyford, who sold it in 1431-2 to William Trowbeck esq. together with a fourth of the manors of Little Neston and Hargreave, for 1,000 marks (£666 13s. 4d.). Certain lands, however, in Budworth continued for several generations vested in the female line of Grosvenor. Budworth remained in the possession of the Trowbeck family till the death of Adam Trowbeck esq. of Moberley, who, in the reign of Henry VIII. left his daughter Margaret, wife of Sir John Talbot kt. of Albrighton, Salop, sole heiress. Budworth thus passed with other estates to the Talbots, of Salwarp, Worcs., Earls Talbot and subsequently Earls of Shrewsbury; but the share of the forestership was sold to the Dones of Utkinton in the time of Henry VIII. The Earl of Shrewsbury and Talbot, who is now lord of the manor, and Sir P. H. B. Grey-Egerton bart. are the chief landowners. The area is 2,828 statute acres of land, which are chiefly in pasturage, and 39 of water; rateable value, £6,506; the population of the civil parish in 1901 was 599, and of the ecclesiastical parish, 544.

OULTON LOWE comprises six farm houses, 4 miles north-east from Tarporley, and was in 1892, by order of the County Council, confirmed by Local Government Board Order, annexed to Little Budworth. At the time of the Conquest the manor was held by the Earls of Chester, from whom it is supposed to have been transferred to the Kingsleys; afterwards it came into the possession of Richard de Odleton, or Oulton, the founder of a family which assumed the local name; the Oultons continued here for some generations, when it appears that Joan, or Johanna, second of the three co-heiresses of John de Oulton, became possessed of the manor, with whom it passed in marriage to Peter Starkie, the second son of Thomas Starkie, of Nether Hall, in Stretton, whose descendants continued here until the latter part of the 17th century, when it was purchased by the Egertons, of Oulton, and descended to Sir John Grey-Egerton bart. of Oulton (d. 24 May, 1825), and is now held by Sir Philip Henry Brian Grey-Egerton bart. of Oulton Hall, who is the sole landowner of the township. Darley Hall, formerly the seat of the Starkies, was taken down by the late Mr. Egerton, and on the site of it a farm residence has been erected. The land is applied chiefly to pasture and the cultivation of grain. Letters through Tarporley. Little Budworth is the nearest money order & telegraph office, about half a mile distant from the Hall

BUGLAWTON is a parish and populous village on the river Dane, three-quarters of a mile north-east-by-north from Congleton, of which it forms a suburb, in the Macclesfield division of the county, Northwich hundred, Middlewich and Sandbach petty sessional division (Congleton section), Congleton union and county court district, rural deanery of Congleton, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The Macclesfield canal and the North Staffordshire railway intersect the township; the latter passing about 1½ miles from the village and crossing the valley of the Dane by a viaduct of twenty arches.

The Local Board established here in 1863 has been superseded by an Urban District Council under the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 & 57 Vict. c. 73).

The ecclesiastical parish was formed in 1869 from the Astbury civil parish.

The church of St. John the Evangelist, erected in 1840, at a cost, including site, of £2,287, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave and a western tower with spire containing a clock and one bell: the east window is stained: there are marble tablets to the Hogg family and to the Rev. Henry Rowland Bramwell, late vicar, who died 1868: the church was restored in 1873 at a cost of £200: the carved oak pulpit was erected in 1890 by the vicar in memory of his wife, in remembrance of whom the parishioners also gave the prayer desk: the brass lectern and font are memorials respectively to Charles Vaudrey esq. and Mrs. Vaudrey: the church affords 500 sittings. The register dates from the year 1840. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £280, with residence, in the gift of the rector of Astbury, and held since 1869 by the Rev. William Besant M.A. of Hertford College, Oxford. Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel: there is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel here, erected in 1845, and another at Dane-in-Shaw, built in 1898. There are charities of £4 10s. for distribution by the overseers in clothing and money. On the eastern side of the township is a high hill called "The Cloud," the summit of which, 1,190 feet above the level of the sea, affords the most extensive and diversified prospect. The manufacture of ribbons and trimmings and of turkish towels is carried on here. Buglawton Hall, the seat of Joseph Maghull Yates esq. K.C. is a mansion of brick, delightfully situated amongst picturesque

The church of St. Boniface, formerly collegiate, is an ancient and beautiful fabric of stone, in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave of six bays, aisles, Egerton chapel on the south-east, south porch and an embattled western tower, with six crocketed pinnacles, containing a clock and 8 bells, 2 of which were added in 1895: the base of the tower forms a porch: the chancel is Decorated and the nave Late Perpendicular: the Ridley, or Egerton, chapel, erected by Sir Ralph Egerton of Ridley, in 1527, and originally an exquisite example of its style, after being much disfigured, and left in a ruinous condition, was restored in 1899: there were once also two other chapels, the Spurstow chapel in the south aisle of the nave, and in the north aisle the Calveley chapel: the church contains several fine monuments, among which, in the centre of the chancel, is a rich altar tomb, with effigy in alabaster, to Sir Hugh Calveley, who distinguished himself during the invasion of France by Edward III. and another in the north-east angle of the chancel, with effigy and inscription, under a canopy, to Sir George Beeston, one of the commanders who aided in the destruction of the Spanish Armada in 1588; he was knighted at sea by the Lord Admiral, Howard of Effingham, after the victory, and died in 1611 at the age of 102: near the font are some Early Norman coffin lids and fragments of Norman stone work: the stained east window was presented by Ralph Brocklebank esq. of Haughton, and there are several others, including one to Dr. J. Everitt Dutton, who lost his life in Central Africa: the church was completely restored in 1864-5, with the addition of a new roof and clerestory windows, under the direction of Messrs. Pennington and Bridgen, architects, at a cost of about £4,000, and again restored in 1895, when new choir stalls were fitted, a new organ provided, and two bells added, at a total cost of about £3,000: the roof of the nave was thoroughly restored in 1897: the church affords 900 sittings. The register of marriages and burials dates from the year 1559 and of baptisms from 1598. The living is a vicarage, with Calveley, Haughton, and Spurstow annexed, net yearly value £270, with house and 2 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Haberdashers' Company of London, and held since 1900 by the Rev. Sydney Powell Townend. In 1575, Thomas Aldersey purchased the rectory and advowson, and about 1592 granted a lease of the same to his brother for 500 years, at £130 yearly; some land was assigned with £20 a year and house for a schoolmaster, and £10, a house and land for an usher; this charity now produces £86 13s. 4d. yearly for the clergy and £50 for the school: his lineal descendant, Hugh Aldersey esq. of Aldersey, is the present lay impropiator. The advowson was granted to the Haberdashers' Company of London: the living was augmented with £2,000 from Queen Anne's Bounty at various times during the period from 1762 to 1826. There is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel, erected in 1868, and a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1876. The Public Hall, erected in 1888, at a cost of about £600, by the late John P. Turton esq. of Spurstow, and presented to the parish by Mrs. Turton, his widow, is a building of brick and stone in the Gothic style, comprises a large room occasionally used

for concerts and holding 400 persons, and there are two smaller rooms for public meetings: the building also contains a library of about 400 volumes. The consolidated charities for distribution in clothing and fuel amount to about £47 8s. yearly. Gardner's charity of £49 10s. is for education, Aldersey's charity of £10 for distribution in money, and Millington's and Leche's charity of £1 8s. 6d. for poor widows. Sir Hugh Calveley in 1386 founded a college here and dedicated it to St. Boniface, but it was eventually dissolved by Edward VI. Lord Tollemache is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The area of the township is 1,161 acres; rateable value, £4,703; the population in 1901 was 820 in the township and 2,492 in the ecclesiastical parish.

 Public Elementary School (girls & infants), erected in 1830, for 90 girls & 65 infants; average attendance, 74 girls & 43 infants; Miss Florence E. B. Wager, mistress

BEESTON is a township in the union of Tarvin, 2 miles west-north-west from Bunbury and 3 south from Tarporley, with a station, called Beeston Castle, on the Crewe and Chester section of the London and North Western railway; the township is also intersected by the Shropshire Union canal. There is a mission room, in which services are held by the Wesleyans, Primitive Methodists and Baptists. A cattle fair is held here on Mondays every week, and is well attended. Beeston Castle, which occupies a romantic and impregnable site on the summit of a huge and lofty isolated rock, was founded about 1220 by Ranulph de Meschines (surnamed de Blundville), 4th Earl of Chester, after his second return from the Holy Land; the castle was a place of great strength, to which its natural position largely contributed, but after the surrender of Chester to the Parliamentary forces, 3 Feb. 1646, it was dismantled, and has since been allowed to fall into ruins. A well, frequently mentioned by antiquaries extends to the depth of Beeston brook, in the valley below (122 yards); the castle is the property of Lord Tollemache, who is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The area is 1,966 acres; rateable value, £6,355; the population in 1901 was 285.

CALVELEY is a small scattered village and township, with a station on the Chester and Crewe section of the London and North Western railway, $\frac{3}{4}$ miles south-east from Tarporley. The chapel of ease to Bunbury, erected here about 1838 is an edifice of brick and stone, consisting of nave only. The Rev. Edgar Stockdale, perpetual curate of St. David's, Wittenhall, has been curate here since 1889. There is a sum of £25 yearly for the repairs of the Causeway, arising from land given in exchange for the Hermitage lands by Lord Tolle-mache. Calveley Hall, the residence of John Julius Jersey de Knoop esq. is an ancient mansion, pleasantly standing in a well-wooded park of about 60 acres, 1 mile from Calveley and 4 miles from Beeston stations, both on the London and North Western railway. Lieut.-Col. William Bromley-Davenport, of Capesthorpe Hall, is lord of the manor and chief landowner; there are also several smaller proprietors. The area is 1,546 acres; rateable value, £4,418; the population in 1901 was 312.

PECKFORTON is a township 3 miles south-west from Beeston Castle station on the Crewe and Chester section of the London and North Western railway, and $\frac{3}{4}$ south from Tarporley. Peckforton Castle, the seat of Lord Tolle-mache, situated on a wooded height overlooking on the north side the wide valley which separates it from the still more commanding rock and ruined fortress of Beeston, was erected during the period 1844-50, by the late Lord Tolle-mache, and is a magnificent building of red sandstone, quarried on the estate, and its circular keep forms a landmark for many miles: attached to the castle is a domestic chapel, the services of which are open to the neighbouring inhabitants; the Rev. John Taylor Clegg B.A. incumbent of Burwardsley, has been chaplain since 1902. The area is 1,754 acres; rateable value, £3,427; the population in 1901 was 176.

WARDLE (or Wardhull) is a township and scattered village, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-east from Calveley station on the Crewe and Chester section of the London and North Western railway, 4 north-west from Nantwich and 5 south-east from Tarporley, in the Eastern division of the Eddisbury hundred. The Shropshire Union Railway and Canal Company have a wharf in this township. Draining tiles for agricultural purposes are extensively manufactured here. The manor, at the Norman accession, was given to Hugo de Mara, probably one of the king's Norman followers. The local name was early assumed by the family in possession; and it appears from certain records that Catherine de Wrenbury gave all her lands in Wrenbury to Philip, son of David de Egerton, these lands being described as Wordel Park and Le Breres. By inquisitions in the reigns of Henry VI. Richard III. and Henry VII. these lands were found to be held from the Grosvenors of Holme. The Brereton's afterwards held them from the Egertons, with the moiety of the barony of Malpas. Wardle subsequently became the property of the Priestland family, from whom it was purchased by Thomas Wilbraham, of Woodhey, esq. and thence descended to the Earl of Dysart. Lord Tolle-mache, who is now lord of the manor, Miss Harrison, Miss Hill and Miss Rutter are the principal landowners. Wardle Hall, an ancient building of brick and wood, was formerly inclosed by a moat, but, with the exception of a portion on the south-east side, this has now been filled up, and in 1849 a farmhouse was erected near to the hall. The township comprises 1,053 statute acres, chiefly applied to the cultivation of grain and pasture, and 9 of water; rateable value, £2,875; the population in 1901 was 193.

BURLEYDAM is an ecclesiastical parish formed Feb.
16, 1869, from the ecclesiastical parishes of Audlem and
Acton; it is in the Eddisbury division of the county,
hundred, petty sessional division and union of Nantwich,
in the county court district of Whitchurch, rural deanery
of Nantwich and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester.
The village of Burleydam is on the road from Audlem
to Whitchurch, Salop, 3 miles south from Wrenbury sta-
tion on the Crewe and Whitchurch section of the London
and North Western railway, 3 west from Audlem station
on the Wellington and Crewe section of the Great Western
railway, 7 south-west from Nantwich and 5 north-east
from Whitchurch (Salop), and is partly in the township
of Dodcott-cum-Wilksley and partly in the township of
Newhall. The church of St. Michael, built in 1769 by
Sir Lynch Cotton bart. and enlarged in 1886, is a cruci-
form edifice of brick with stone dressings, in the Norman
style, consisting of chancel, nave, transepts, north porch,
vestry and organ chamber on the south side, and a

western bell cot containing one bell: there are 250
sittings: the churchyard adjoins and is inclosed with an
iron palisading. The register of baptisms dates from
the year 1770. The living is a vicarage, net yearly
value £230, including 46 acres of glebe with residence,
in the gift of Viscount Combermere, and held since
1888 by the Rev. James Bardell Adamson M.A. of
Emmanuel College, Cambridge. The Vicarage house,
near the church, was built about 1862. Viscount
Combermere (a minor) is the principal landowner. The
soil is mixed; subsoil, clay and sand. The land is
chiefly in pasture for dairy purposes. The area is in-
cluded under Dodcott-cum-Wilksley and Newhall town-
ships; the population in 1901 was 405.

BURTON is a township, parish and village on the estuary of the Dee; it was once a market town and still has the right to hold markets, and is three-quarters of a mile south-east from Burton Point station on the North Wales and Liverpool line, 2 south from Hadlow Road station and 3½ from Hooton station, both on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railways branch line from Hooton to West Kirby, 8½ north-west from Chester and 12 south from Birkenhead, in the Wirral division of the county, higher division of the hundred of Wirral, petty sessional division and union of Wirral, county court district of Birkenhead, rural deanery of Wyrehall, or Wirral, and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Nicholas, rebuilt (with the exception of the east end of the north aisle) in 1721, was thoroughly restored and re-seated in 1870 at a cost of £2,000, the chancel being rebuilt at the sole expense of the late Wm. Congreve esq.; it now consists of chancel, nave, north aisle and a western tower containing a clock and 6 bells: there are 250 sittings. The register dates from the year 1538. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £120, with residence, in the gift of H. N. Gladstone esq. who is lay impropriator, and held since 1902 by the Rev. Patrick Frank Arthur Morrell B.A. Lond. Here was formerly a hospital, to which Alexander de Stavensby, Bishop of Lichfield (1224-40), appropriated the tithes of Burton. Henry VII. in 1494 gave the hospital, with the rectorial and vicarial tithes and glebe, to the hospital of St. John at Lichfield, and they are still held by that charity, but are leased with the glebe to H. N. Gladstone esq. A fair, formerly held on the festival of St. James (25 July), is now discontinued. There is a poor's fund of £1 16s. yearly for distribution in kind and money. Burton Manor, a mansion beautifully seated above the Dee estuary and close to the village, is the seat of Henry Neville Gladstone esq. J.P. who is lord of the manor and owns the whole township of Burton, with the exception of the glebe, which he rents from St. John's Hospital, Lichfield. Thomas Wilson, Bishop of Sodor and Man (1697-1755), and author of the well-known "Sacra Privata" and other devotional works, who was born here in 1663, and died 7 March, 1755, founded a school here for the instruction of children of the parish-

ioners of Burton. The area of the township, which includes the Salt Marsh, is 1,963 acres; rateable value, £2,941; the population in 1901 was, parish 348; township, 222.

BURWARDSLEY is a township and chapelry in the parish of Bunbury, on the Peckforton range of hills, 3 miles south-east from Tattenhall Road station on the Crewe and Chester section of the London and North Western railway, 4 miles west-south-west from Bunbury and 7 south-south-west from Tarporley, in the Eddisbury division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division of Broxton, Tarvin union, Crewe county court district, and in the rural deanery of Malpas and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. Charles Stewart Stubbs M.A. has been curate in charge since 1897. Here are extensive sewage farms and market gardens belonging to the Corporation of Manchester. CHEADLE is a populous town, township and parish, with stations on the London and North Western and Cheshire Lines railways, 3 miles south-west from Stockport, 7 south-south-east from Manchester, and 5 east from Altrincham, in the Altrincham division of the county, Macclesfield hundred, Stockport petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Stockport, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester.

A Local Board of Health was formed by Local Government Board Order No. 20,464, August 2, 1886, for Cheadle and Gatley, and comprises Cheadle and Stockport Etchells civil parishes; under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. c. 73) an Urban District Council has been established: the district is divided into four wards.

By Local Government Board Order No. P, 1,711, confirmed by "Local Government Board Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 11) Act, 1901," which came into operation Nov. 9, 1901, part of the civil parish of Cheadle and Urban District of Cheadle and Gatley was added to the civil parish and county borough of Stockport.

The church of St. Mary, rebuilt at the beginning of the 16th century, is a battlemented edifice of stone, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, north and south chapels, south porch, and an embattled western tower containing a clock and 8 bells: the stained west window in the tower was presented in 1880 by Egerton Macdona esq. son of the late rector; the roofs of the nave and aisles are of oak, and the chancel is fitted with carved oak stalls: in the Hanford chancel is a large altar-tomb of the 15th century, with two recumbent effigies of knights in rich plate armour representing two members of the Hanford family: one is bareheaded, the head of the other rests on a helmet encircled by a wreath: here also is another altar-tomb inscribed to Sir Thomas Brereton bart. of Handforth, ob. 7 Jan. 1673, and to the Hon. Theodosia (Ward), his wife; on the upper slab is a recumbent effigy of the knight in plate armour; on the side of the tomb are shields of arms of the Brereton and Ward families, and at the end another shield impaling both coats: in the Moseley chancel are monuments to Humphrey Bulkeley esq. ob. Sep. 1678, and to Bertie Markland esq. d. 20 May, 1817: in the chancel proper are memorials to two former rectors, the Revs. Roger Royston, d. 1723; Edward Poole, d. 22 Sep. 1772, and to the Rev. W. H. Prescott, of Bradshaw Hall, d. 16 Nov. 1842, and there are others to the Kelsalls of Bradshaw, 1675-1745: the church was restored during the years 1876-80, at a cost of about £10,000, under the direction of Mr. James Medland Taylor, architect, of Manchester, and affords 600 sittings, all free at the evening service. The registers date from the year 1558. The living is a rectory, net yearly value, £500, with 6 acres of glebe and residence in the gift of Sir D. L. Broughton bart. and held since 1883 by the Rev. Frederick Augustus Macdona M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge, and rural dean of Stockport. St. Cuthbert's chapel of ease at Cheadle Heath, erected in 1887, is a structure of brick, consisting of chancel, nave, vestry and organ chamber; it affords 200 sittings, and is under the control of the rector of Cheadle. The Wesleyan chapel, built in 1865, is of brick, and will seat 150. The Congregational chapel, in Massie street, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, seating 400. There is also a small Congregational mission hall at Adswood, erected in 1886, with 120 sittings. The Primitive Methodist chapel, at Cheadle Heath, is also of brick, and was erected in 1855. The Methodist New Connexion chapel, at Cheadle Heath, erected in 1883, is an iron structure, and will seat 250. The Cemetery, situated off Stockport road, was opened April 20th, 1903, and is under the control of the Urban District Council. Cheadle wakes commence on the first Sunday after the 18th September. Dunn's charity of £6 13s. 4d. yearly, founded by will in 1839, is for clothing. The Barnes Convalescent Hospital, established in 1874, in connection with the Manchester Infirmary, has 136 beds, and is supported by voluntary contributions. The Literary Institute, erected in 1877 by public subscription, at a cost of about £2,000, contains a large public

hall, 50 by 32 feet, library, news room, billiard, chess and recreation rooms and a gymnasium. James Watts esq. is lord of the manor. Lady Dundonald, of Gwyrch Castle, Abergyle, the trustees of the late Col. James H. Deakin (d. 1880), the Rev. Oldfield Kelsall Prescott M.A. of Bournemouth, and James Watts esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is various; subsoil, partly gravel and clay. The chief crops are potatoes and turnips. The joint area of the Urban Council district is 5,086 acres; rateable value £66,188. The area of the civil parish is 3,497 acres of land and 17 of water; rateable value, £50,864; the population in 1901 was 6,140 in the civil and 4,202 in the ecclesiastical parish.

CHEADLE BULKELEY and **CHEADLE MOSELEY** are hamlets in the parish of Cheadle. The greater number of the inhabitants reside in the hamlets of Edgeley and Brinksway, which are within the borough of Stockport. The London and North Western railway passes through these townships, the lands of which are very much intermixed. Bulkeley's charity of £30 ros. founded in 1669, is for apprenticing, and Hanshy's, of £5, founded in 1662, for bread; Dawn's gift of £2 ros. founded in 1678, is for distribution in money: Reginald Fowden in 1848 bequeathed £2,000, but this has since, under a scheme of the Charity Commissioners, been reduced to £1,137 ros. 3d. the interest arising from which is now divided amongst three poor aged and blind persons in Cheadle parish only; there are also several smaller charities. Frank Sykes J.P. of Brookfield, the trustees of the late Robert Bamford-Hesketh esq. James Watts esq. the trustees of the late Sir William Cunliffe Brooks bart. (d. 1900), and Arthur Henry Sykes esq. of Lydham Manor, Salop, are the principal landowners.

CHEADLE HULME consists of parts of the townships of Cheadle Bulkeley and Cheadle Moseley, and is an ecclesiastical parish, formed from the civil parish of Cheadle, Aug. 4, 1868, with a station on the Manchester and Crewe section of the London and North Western railway; it is in the Altrincham division of the county, Macclesfield hundred, Stockport union and county court district, rural deanery of Stockport, archdeaconry of Macclesfield, and diocese of Chester. All Saints' church, erected in 1863 & enlarged in 1899, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays, aisles, south transept and organ chamber, south porch and a bell-cot containing one bell: the stained east window was erected in 1873 by the late Rev. C. J. Cummings M.A. formerly rector of Cheadle and founder of the church, and there are three others to John Rooke Corbett esq. d. 19 April, 1869, Robert Gray esq. d. 31 July, 1872, and Richard Brown: the eagle lectern was presented in 1899 by Dr. T. B. Knott, and the

oak communion table and rails and oak panelling were erected in 1900 as a memorial to the late J. B. Gallo-way esq.: the church affords 500 sittings. The register dates from the year 1864. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £260, in the gift of the rector of Cheadle, and held since 1898 by the Rev. Henry Tyson M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford, and L.Th. of Durham University. The Baptist chapel, in Grove lane, built in 1840, is a small and plain edifice of brick, and will seat 200. The Congregational church, in Swann lane, erected in 1869, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, and has a tower with spire: there are 450 sittings. The Wesleyan chapel, in Station road, erected in 1883, is of red brick with stone facings, and will seat about 300. The principal landowners are Lady Dundonald, of Gwyrrh Castle, C. Brocklehurst esq. of Macclesfield, Isaac Storey and Mrs. Watson. The soil is various; subsoil, gravel and clay. The chief crops are potatoes and turnips, and some land in pasture. The area of the ecclesiastical parish is 5,500 acres; the population in 1901 was 1,765.

ADSWOOD is a village in Cheadle parish.

CHELFORD is a township and village in the parish of Prestbury, on the road from Macclesfield to Knutsford, with a station on the Crewe and Manchester section of the London and North Western railway, 9 miles north-west from Congleton, 14½ from Crewe, 35 from Chester, 5 south-east from Knutsford, 6½ west from Macclesfield, 16½ from Manchester, 10½ from Stockport, 9½ from Sandbach and 17½ from London, in the Knutsford division of the county, petty sessional division of Prestbury, hundred, union, county court district, rural deanery and archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester; it was formed into a consolidated chapelry April 9th, 1880, and comprises Old Withington and the greater part of Snelson in the ancient chapelry of Peover. The church of St. John the Evangelist, erected in 1776, on the site of an earlier structure of the 13th century, is an edifice of brick with stone facings, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave and an embattled western tower with pinnacles and octagonal spire and containing a clock and 6 bells; the tower was added in 1840: the stained east window is a memorial to John Dixon esq. of Astle Hall, who died in 1875, and there is another to his wife. The register of baptisms dates from the year 1679; marriages and burials, 1674. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of Lieut.-Col. Dixon, and held since 1902 by the Rev. Lionel Scuda-

more Stanhope M.A. of New College, Oxford, who is non-resident. The Rev. Ernest Mostyn Ellis M.A. of New College, Oxford, has been curate in charge since 1905. The charities for distribution in money in this township amount to about £14 yearly. The Cheshire Gentlemen's Cricket Ground, opened in 1861, is close to the station. Astle Hall, the seat of Lieut.-Col. George Dixon J.P. who is lord of the manor and sole landowner, stands in a well-timbered park of about 120 acres, on the north side of which is a beautiful sheet of water. The soil is sand; subsoil, sand. The chief crops are oats, potatoes and turnips. The area of the township is 1,166 acres of land and 18 of water; rateable value, £5,094; population in 1901 was town-ship, 374, ecclesiastical parish, 610.

Astle is a hamlet in this township, about a mile from the church, comprising three farmhouses and a few cottages.

OLD WITHINGTON is a township, the houses of which are scattered, 2 miles south from Chelford station on the London and North Western railway. John Baskerville Glegg esq. is lord of the manor and principal landowner. Withington Hall, a handsome mansion standing in a well-wooded park of 112 acres, with a lake, and the property of J. B. Glegg esq. is occupied by H. J. Reiss esq. The township contains 1,106 acres of land and 9 of water; rateable value, £1,942; the population in 1901 was 121.

CHESTER.

CHESTER is a city and county of itself, and the capital of the county of that name, a municipal, parliamentary and county borough, sea port, head of a union, county court district and petty sessional division, in the Eddisbury division of the county, and is pleasantly seated on the north bank of the river Dee, a bend of which encircles nearly one half of the city; it is distant from Bangor 59½ miles, Birmingham 74, Birkenhead 15, Bolton 36½, Cheshire 37, Crewe 21½, Conway 45½, Flint 12½, Frodsham 9, Glossop 65, Holyhead 84½, Holywell 16½, Hull 150, Liverpool 17, London 179½, Manchester 40, Mold 13½, Nantwich 17½, Oswestry 26½, Oxford 150, Ruabon 17, Sandbach 26½, Shrewsbury 38½, Shifnal 59½, Stafford 46½, Stockport 39½, Stoke 36½, Sheffield 80, Warrington 18, Wrexham 12, Wellington 49½ and Wolverhampton 61½. The city stands at the extremity of Broxton hundred and at the east end of the peninsula of Wirral, and adjoining Flintshire, and is in the rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. Few places in the kingdom present to the antiquary attractions of more varied character than this ancient city: it is rich in memorable incidents and associations, and has a history chronicled not only in books, but in its walls, ecclesiastical and other buildings, its unique "rows" and other venerable remains.

Chester may not improbably have been a very early Iberian or British town, and it most certainly was an important Roman station: the general plan of the city and the arrangement of the principal streets—answering in some measure to a Roman camp—bear witness to its Roman origin: to the Roman geographers it was known as "Deva," or the station on the Dee, where, according to the Antonine Itinerary, was the station from A.D. 61 of the 20th Legion (Valeria Victrix), and this seems to be confirmed by the name "Caer Leon Gawr," or the "city of the great legion," assigned to it by the British; this view is further strengthened by the discovery here of votive altars and sculptured tombstones, the inscriptions

on which show that they were erected by officers and others belonging to Roman legions, besides which many and various other Roman remains have been met with at different periods. The 20th Legion quitted Deva about A.D. 406; and it then reverted to the Britons, from whom it was taken in 607 by Ethelfrith the Fierce, King of Northumbria; the Britons, however, regained possession, and continued to hold the place till they were dispossessed in 828-30 by Egbert, who, as sole monarch, added Legaster, as it was called by the Saxons, to his other dominions; in 894 it was taken and ravaged by the Danes, and on their retreat, the city walls were rebuilt, about 908, by Ethelfleda, Countess of Mercia; but after her death, the Britons once more became its masters, only to be again expelled by Edward the Elder: in the summer of 973, Edgar received on the Dee the homage of various inferior Saxon sovereigns, and according to some writers, was rowed from his palace on the south bank of the river to the conventual church of St. John by eight tributary kings: on the division of the country in 1066 between Edmund Ironside and Canute, Chester, as part of Mercia, was retained by the latter. Under the Normans Chester increased considerably in importance, and after the Conquest, the Earldom of Chester (county) was conferred on Georobodus, a nobleman of Flanders, who, however, never took possession of his territory, and, returning to the Continent, died soon after, upon which the dignity was bestowed by the Conqueror, in 1070, upon his half-sister's son, Hugh de Avranches (or Avranches), surnamed "Lupus," who had his residence and held his courts and parliaments here, to which he summoned the barons and landowners of the shire; this powerful and wealthy noble eventually died as a monk in the abbey of St. Werburgh, at Chester, 27 July, 1101: and on the death in Dec. 1119 of his son Richard, 2nd earl, the male line then becoming extinct, the earldom passed to his 1st cousin, Ranulph de Meschines, son of Ralph de Meschines, who had

married Maud de Abrincis, sister of Earl Hugh Lupus: Ranulph or Ralph de Meschines, 4th Earl of Chester of this family, and surnamed "Blundevil," died at Wallingford, 26 Oct. 1232, and the earldom then devolved upon his nephew, John le Scot, as "Earl Palatine," at whose decease, by poison, in 1244, the male line again failed, and in 1246, the Earldom of Chester was for ever annexed to the Crown by Henry III. and the title has since that time "excepting the short period 1264-5, when possession thereof was obtained by the rebellious Simon de Montfort," been borne only by the heir apparent of the sovereign: by the Act 21 Rich. II. c. 9 (1398) the earldom of Chester was erected into a Principality, and although this Act was annulled by the Act 1 Hen. IV. c. 3, the earldom of Chester has ever since been granted in conjunction with the Principality of Wales, and H.R.H. the present Prince of Wales thus received both titles 9th Nov. 1901. The city suffered severely during the sanguinary period of the Wars of the Roses, and was on one occasion (in 1455) visited by Margaret of Anjou, the warlike queen of Henry VI. King James I. on his journey into Scotland in 1617 passed through Chester, and received from the mayor the city sword, which, being re-delivered to him, was borne by the mayor on horseback before the king. On the breaking out of the Civil War, the city was in 1642 the head quarters of the Royalists in this locality; and in 1645, under the governorship of John, 1st Lord Byron, and a distinguished cavalier, withstood, under great privations, the attacks of Sir William Brereton; the king thereupon came to its relief (22 Sep. 1645), but the royal forces being defeated on Rowton Heath, 2 miles from the city, on the 24th, the king, after remaining one night, retired to Denbigh, and the place was eventually surrendered 3 Feb. 1646. In Aug. 1659, Sir George Booth and Sir Thomas Middleton surprised and took it, but were defeated near Nantwich by General Lambert, who then advanced upon and recaptured Chester; the city was visited by James II. in 1687, and on the rebellion of 1688, was seized by Lords Molyneux and Aston in the royal interest, but the speedy abdication of James rendered their efforts useless: under William III. Chester was appointed one of six places for the assay of gold and silver, and this privilege is still retained; in the Jacobite rising in 1745, it was fortified and garrisoned against the Pretender, this being the last important military event in its history, but it is still a chief military centre. On the 11 and 12 Feb. 1867, the castle was threatened by attack by the Fenians, whose intentions, however, were rendered futile by the activity of the authorities. The Exchange and Town Hall, burnt down 30 Dec. 1862, were reopened by H.M. the King, then Earl of Chester, 15 Oct. 1869.

Chester is entirely surrounded by walls, which are among the most perfect examples of such fortifications to be found in the kingdom: they are built of soft freestone and are nearly two miles in circumference, varying from about 12 to 40 feet in height, with a paved walk on the top, of sufficient width in the narrowest part to admit of two persons walking abreast, thus affording a beautiful promenade, in the circuit of which a variety of pleasing prospects are presented to the eye, including the Roodee, or racecourse, the river Dee and Peckforton and Beeston Castles and the mountains of Flintshire and Denbighshire: the walls are said to have been rebuilt and their circuit enlarged by Ethelred and Ethelfleda, Earl and Countess of Mercia, about the year 908, and they still have, besides posterns, four principal gates, viz. East gate, North gate, Bridge gate and Water gate. East gate consists of a single lofty arch for the passage of carriages, and two posterns for foot passengers: it was built in 1769, on the site of the ancient gate, at the expense of Richard, 1st Baron Grosvenor, whose arms, with those of the city, occupy the centre of the archway. North gate, a similar structure, formerly served as the city prison, and was in the charge and keeping of the sheriffs. Bridge gate, which has also a central arch and two posterns, was erected in 1782, at the expense of the Corporation and had formerly an octagonal tower. Water gate, built of local red sandstone, painted to imitate freestone, was built in 1788, on the site of the ancient Water gate, the expenses being defrayed out of the Murage duties, and it acquired its name from the fact that the tide once flowed up to this spot. The principal postern gates were Kail yard, New gate (formerly called Wolf gate) and Ship gate.

The walls were formerly defended by various towers; the New Tower, sometimes called the Water Tower, projecting from the walls towards the Dee and twenty-four feet in height, was built in 1322, at the expense of the citizens; large iron rings were attached to this tower, to which vessels were fastened which came up

to this point before the harbour became choked with sand: a thoroughfare tower, leading to the Water Tower, was anciently called Bonewaldesthorne Tower. The Phoenix Tower, from which Charles I. witnessed the defeat of his army, commanded by Sir Marmaduke Langdale, at Rowton Moor (24 Sept. 1645), by the Parliamentary forces, under Sir William Brereton and Col. Poyntz, takes its name from the crest of the Painters and Stainers, who, with other companies, held their meetings in this tower: it was formerly called Newton Tower: there were, besides these, Goblin's Tower, now known by the name of Pemberton's Parlor, of which only a portion remains, and the Saddler's Tower, which stood near the Cathedral, but was taken down in 1780.

The city consists principally of four streets, excavated out of the solid rock and diverging at right angles to the cardinal points from a centre, where formerly stood a stone cross, called the High Cross, pulled down in 1646, after the city had fallen into the hands of the Parliamentary army, but a portion of the structure is still preserved in the Grosvenor Museum; the first floors of the houses on both sides at an average height of about 10 feet above the level of the carriage-way, are continuously open to the street, and form the famous "Rows," which are a species of elevated corridors or ambulatories with shops at the back, affording a sheltered promenade for foot passengers over the shops below and communicating with the streets by flights of steps placed at intervals: in the "Rows" and elsewhere within the city walls there are still extant many highly interesting examples of the timber-framed and plaster houses peculiar to this county, and some of these are richly ornamented with carved work and parquetry: "God's Providence House," in Water gate street, dated 1652, and reconstructed in 1862, takes its name from the motto, "God's providence is mine inheritance," carved on one of the exterior beams, and said to have been thus inscribed by a former tenant who escaped the plague, which had visited almost every other house in the city: the house of Bishop Lloyd (1615) and that of the Stanley family (1591) are also in this street: another fine example is the Bear and Billet inn, in Bridge street, which thoroughfare also affords several other quaint specimens of this style: the streets are paved with stone and lighted with gas from works in Paradise row, near the Roodee, originally erected in 1818 in Cuppin street, by the Chester Gas Light Company, amalgamated in 1856 with the Roodee Gas Company, under the name of The Chester United Gas Company and also by electric light supplied by the corporation from their new works in Middle Crane street. The water supply is derived from works at Barrell Well and Spitalfield walk, the property of the Chester Water Works Company, whose offices are in Newgate street.

Chester is amply provided with railway communication and has three stations. The general station at the top of City road, into which the trains of the Great Western and London and North Western companies run, is the joint property of these two companies; there are 8 platforms, the two longest being 520 yards each in length; two others, known as the Island platforms and erected in 1890, are each 340 yards long; in 1890 various improvements were carried out, including the extension of the glazed iron roof, so as to cover the whole of the platforms.

The station of the Cheshire Lines Committee, in Victoria road, called "Northgate station," was opened for traffic in 1875, and has two platforms each 100 yards long; the whole is covered by a light iron framed and glazed roof.

The Great Central Railway (late Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire) station in Liverpool road was opened in 1890 and a branch line has since been made from this station to Hawarden, affording communication with Wrexham, and a line has been constructed so as to connect Chester with the Cambrian railways and South Wales with Birkenhead, Hoylake and Seacombe.

The city is a seaport and under the Act of 1846 its limits were declared to be from the eastern end of the bridge to Red Stones, at Hoylake, to the Voryd or Clwyd river, and along the seashore and western side of the Dee, to the western end of the bridge, including the rivers Dee and Voryd: fishing boats and their implements to be distinguished by the letters C.H.; the river Dee has been canalized from the city to Connah's quay at its estuary, which expands to a considerable width.

The Old Bridge over the Dee, at the Bridge gate, consisting of seven irregular arches, is of considerable antiquity, but has been rebuilt and repaired at different

times: the ancient gates, which formerly stood one at each end, were taken down, one in 1782 and the other in 1784.

Grosvenor Bridge, which crosses the Dee near the racecourse, was erected at a cost of £36,000, from designs by Mr. Thomas Harrison, architect, and is a structure of freestone, consisting of one arch, with a span of 200 feet; the height from the springing line is 40 feet, the length of the roadway 340 feet and width 35½ feet: it was formally opened by Her late Majesty (then Princess Victoria), upon the occasion of her visiting Eaton Hall in 1832.

The Suspension Bridge crossing the Dee, a light and handsome structure, leads to the suburb called "Queen's Park."

At the time of the Conquest Chester ranked as a Merchant Guild, and the chief citizens assembled in guild to make laws for their guidance and protection; charters of privileges were granted to the city by the successive Norman earls, and these were confirmed and enlarged by Hen. II. and John, and Hen. III. in 1242 constituted the chief magistrate mayor: Henry VII. by charter, in 1506, made the city of Chester a county in itself, and granted to the mayor and corporation jurisdiction over the river Dee, from Heron Bridge to Arnold's Eye: during the Commonwealth the city was deprived of its privileges as a separate county, and the Corporation dissolved 17 Sept. 1659; but in 1664, Charles II. confirmed the grant and charter of Henry VII. and the Corporation continued to be elected under the charter of Charles II. until the passing of the "Municipal Corporations Act, 1835" (5 and 6 Wm. IV. c. 76), by which the city was divided into five wards, each returning 6 councillors; and the Corporation now consists, under this Act, and the later Act of 1882 (45 and 46 Vict. c. 50), of a mayor, sheriff, ten aldermen and thirty councillors, who also act as the Urban Sanitary Authority; by the Local Government Board's Chester Order 1898 certain alterations of boundaries were made in connection with Chester Castle parish and the township of Blacon. The city has a commission of the Peace and separate court of Quarter Sessions and a police force, and ancient Courts of Record called the "Court of Pence" and the "Court of Portmote." Under the "Local Government Act, 1888," Chester is declared a "county borough," for certain purposes of that Act.

Chester returned two members to Parliament from the 1st year of Queen Mary (1553), the elective franchise being vested in the freemen and householders; but under the "Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885," the representation was reduced to one member, the franchise having been previously extended in accordance with the "Representation of the People Act, 1867" (30 and 31 Vict. c. 102).

The city arms:—"England, dimidiating az. 3 garbs, or," are probably at least as old as 1283, and were confirmed by William Flower, Norroy, 3 Sept. 1580, with crest and supporters; but in the 17th and 18th century, the coat—"az. 3 garbs, or," surmounted by a sword in pale—was used.

The see of Chester originated in 1075, when Peter, 34th bishop of Lichfield, removed the seat of his diocese to this city, with the church of St. John the Baptist as a cathedral, thus occasioning his successors to be frequently styled bishops of Chester, although the next bishop, Robert de Lindsey, prebend of St. Paul's, translated the head of the see to Coventry, where it remained till about 1086, when Hugh Novant, prior of the Carthusians, re-established it at Lichfield. Chester, however, was not created a distinct and separate see until 1541, when it was chosen as one of the six new bishoprics made by Henry VIII. and the church of the Benedictine abbey of St. Werburg, founded in 1053 by Hugh Lupus, Earl of Chester, was assigned as the cathedral church and re-dedicated to Christ and the Blessed Virgin. The diocese now consists of the entire county of Chester, except parts of the parishes of Threapwood and Whitchurch, and part of Mottram in Longendale, and it also includes portions of the parishes of Doddleston, Hawarden, and Malpas, in Flintshire, of Ashton-under-Lyne, in Lancashire, and of Barthomley, in Staffordshire. There are two archdeaconries (Chester and Macclesfield), 12 rural deaneries, and 265 benefices. The revenue of the see, which in 1824 was only £1,700 a year, was increased by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners to £4,200.

Among the bishops of Chester may be mentioned John Bird, appointed to the see on its creation in 1541; he had been a monk of the Carmelite order, and sometime abbot of Chester, suffragan bishop of Penrith, in 1537, and bishop of Bangor in 1539; in 1553-4 he was deprived by Mary for having married, but afterwards conforming, was employed as suffragan to Bishop Bonner of London;

he died in 1558. George Coates, his successor (1554-6), was master of Balliol College, Oxford, 1539-45; Thomas Morton (1616-19), and afterwards of Durham, was the author of the "Book of Sports;" Brian Walton (1660-17), was the editor of the "Hexapla Polyglot Bible," and died 29 Nov. 1661; John Wilkins (1668-72), an astronomer and one of the founders of the Royal Society; John Pearson (1673-80), author of "An Exposition of the Creed;" Sir William Dawes, bart. (1708-14), archbishop of York (1714-24), and died 30 April, 1724; Beilby Porteus (1776-87), and afterwards bishop of London; Charles James Blomfield (1824-28), also translated to London, and died 5 August, 1857; John Bird Sumner (1828-48), and archbishop of Canterbury, 1848, died at Lambeth, 6 Sept. 1862; William Jacobson (1865-84), sometime Regius Professor of Divinity at Oxford; and William Stubbs (1884-9), Regius Professor of Modern History at Oxford, and Bishop of Oxford 1888-1901. The Right Rev. Fras. John Jayne D.D. 33rd and present Bishop of Chester, formerly fellow of Jesus College, Oxford, principal of St. David's College, Lampeter, and vicar of Leeds, was consecrated in 1889.

The Cathedral church of St. Werburg, originally the church of the Benedictine abbey, but on the foundation of the bishopric of Chester by Henry VIII. renamed as the Cathedral church of Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary in Chester, is a cruciform structure of red sandstone in various styles from Early Norman to Late Perpendicular, and consists of nave of seven bays, with aisles and south porch; choir of five bays, with aisles and south-east chapel; an eastern lady-chapel of three bays, small north transept of one bay, with eastern chapel; south transept of five bays, with aisles; an incomplete south-west tower, and a central embattled tower, 127 feet high, with octagonal battlemented turrets at the angles, and crocketed pinnacles between these; the belfry has two canopied windows in each face, and contains a clock with chimes and eight bells. On the north side of the nave are the abbey cloisters, 110 feet square; the eastern alley opens into a vestibule, leading to the chapter house, and near this on the north are stairs, once leading to the dormitory, and to the east a vaulted cellar; the refectory occupies almost the whole of the north walk, and on the west side is a long low vaulted undercroft of Early Norman date. The Cathedral is so much shut in by buildings that a really good general view is unobtainable, but the best prospect is afforded by the city wall, which closely adjoins the Cathedral yard on the east. The eastern portion of the fabric is almost entirely Early English, the remainder is Decorated, with additions and alterations made during the Perpendicular period. The west front, flanked by octagonal banded turrets, is wholly filled with a Perpendicular window, richly traciered; the space below is occupied by an embattled screen, with a central doorway, on either side of which are three canopied niches; the basement of the south-west tower, along the face of which the banding of the turret is carried, has a Perpendicular window, with a canopied niche on either side; the interior serves as a consistory court. The south porch, which abuts on this tower, has a parvise chamber above it. The cathedral has generally pierced chapels, but the south transept and its aisles are embattled, and the east end of the choir is strongly marked by two octagonal turrets, with tall crocketed spirelets; the stone roof of the south-eastern apse, restored from existing records, and rising to a height of about 40 feet, is also a very striking feature; the east end of the lady chapel is finished with buttresses surmounted by canopied pinnacles.

The nave is 145 feet long, and, with the aisles, 75 feet wide, and has a height of 73 feet; its arcades are Decorated, of rather plain character, but the stage above is wholly Perpendicular, with a lofty window in each bay, and serves both as triforium and clerestory; the nave is seated with open benches and chairs, and at the east end are raised seats, arranged longitudinally, for the choir; the pulpit, designed by Mr. R. C. Hussey, and the eagle lectern, were removed from the choir; the nave was first used for divine service on Advent Sunday, 1867; the aisles were also modified during the Perpendicular period, but the lower part of the wall of the north aisle is Norman work; the interior wall of this aisle has been adorned with marble mosaics, the gift of Mrs. Platt, of Stalybridge, who died in 1888; the work, finished in 1890, represents scenes from the Old Testament history, designed by Mr. Clayton, jun. and executed by Mr. Burke, of Newman street, London; the stained windows above were presented in 1890 by H. Higgins esq. of Hereford. The present baptistery, formed out of an ancient Norman chamber at the north-west angle of the nave, was dedicated by the late bishop of Chester, 9 Oct. 1885; the flooring has been laid down

with mosaics, illustrating the "Miraculous Draught of Fishes," surrounded by a series of heads, emblematic of Christian virtues; the ancient and beautiful font of Italian marble was presented by Lord Egerton of Tatton. The small north transept is now partially occupied by the organ loft, which is a beautiful work of stone and marble supported on sixteen marble columns, and was erected at a cost of £2,400, entirely defrayed by the Duke of Westminster. The organ, formerly placed above the choir screen, has now been removed to this transept, which has an ornamental oak roof supported by angels holding emblems of the Crucifixion, and the arms of Cardinal Wolsey also appear prominently on the beams. The south transept was assigned, in the 14th century, as the parish church of St. Oswald's parish, and so continued to be used until 1881, when the church of St. Thomas was given to this parish in lieu of this transept: it is 78 feet 4 inches long by 77 feet wide, including the aisles, and in its architectural character resembles the nave; the screen wall erected across the transept, in 1828, by Dean Copleston, has been entirely removed; the stained window at the south end of the transept was the gift in 1885 of Lord Egerton of Tatton, in memory of his father, William Tatton, 1st Baron Egerton of Tatton, who died 24 Feb. 1883; on the east side of the transept is a stained window given in 1890 by Mrs. A. Potts, of Hoole Hall, in memory of her father and her husband. The interior of this transept has been restored at a cost of about £10,000, under the direction of Messrs. Blomfield & Son, architects, as a memorial to the late Duke of Westminster K.G. who died Dec. 22nd, 1899. The stone groining of the western aisle, and the oak groining of the central aisle being new.

The choir screen, originally a Decorated work of the 14th century, was subjected to some modifications during the restorations in 1844, and also at a later date, on the removal of the organ to the north transept; it is a light and elegant structure, the lower portion consisting of open traceried arcading, with a central entrance closed by ornamental gates, presented in 1876 by Mr. Harwood Banner, of Liverpool; the upper stage is of similar open work, rising into slender crocketed pinnacles, and on the choir side is richly canopied, and has four tabernacled stalls on either side the doorway; a portion of the organ is still retained here, and appears in the centre of the screen as a tall sheaf of pipes, banded together, and capped by a crocketed spirelet with finial cross. The choir is, architecturally, much more impressive than the nave; the two Eastern bays are Early English, but the western portion belongs to the period of transition from that style to the Decorated; the main arcade is lofty, supporting a triforium of four trefoiled arches in each bay, and round-headed recesses at the back; the clerestory consists of a single lofty window in each bay, filled with debased tracery; the east end of the choir is pierced by an arch of the same height as those of the arcades, and opening into the lady-chapel, and above it is a window filled with geometrical tracery. The former plaster roof has been entirely removed and replaced by a new roof of oak, at a cost of £2,500, defrayed by the late Thomas Platt esq. J.P. of Dunham Hall; the roof is richly decorated in gold and colour, and painted with various subjects, including figures of the sixteen Old Testament prophets. The pavement of the choir has been relaid, in part with the old marble slabs, intermixed with new tile-work, and the sacrum with marble bearing incised representations of subjects illustrating the "Passion." The stalls, forty-eight in number, belong to the 15th century: the canopied work is peculiarly fine, and there are misereres or subsellia of the same date; at the east end of the southern range of stalls is the bishop's throne, executed by Messrs. Farmer and Brindley, and erected in 1876. The sacrum is inclosed by railings, presented by the late John Torr esq. M.P. for Liverpool, who died in 1880. The communion table, given by the late Very Rev. John Saul Howson D.D. dean of Chester 1867-86, is made of portions of oak, olive-wood and cedar, all obtained from Palestine, by Henry Lee esq. J.P. of Sedgley Park, and presented by him for this purpose in 1876; over the table is a handsome reredos, adorned with a picture in mosaics, executed at Venice, of "the Last Supper." The four Decorated sedilia, originally in the Church of St. John the Baptist, and restored by the Freemasons at a cost of £450, are in two stages, with two seats in each; their canopies, which had been much mutilated, have figures of monkeys and other grotesques, as well as pedestals for figures: on the opposite side are two fine aumbries, also Decorated. The pulpit of carved wood illustrates the Preaching of John the Baptist in the

Wilderness, the building of Solomon's temple, and St. John viewing the descent of the heavenly Jerusalem under the guidance of an angel. The choir lectern was presented in 1873 by the late Miss Potts, of Chester, who died in 1876; the pavement on which it was intended to be placed has on it incised representations in marble of the heads of the twelve apostles: at the angles are figures of St. Chrysostom, St. Augustine, St. Athanasius and St. Ambrose. In the Norman church, the choir aisles, as well as the choir itself, terminated in apses, the outlines of which have been marked on the pavement of the choir, but on the conversion of the east end in the Early English period, the aisles were prolonged considerably eastward, and made to terminate in apsidal chapels of semi-hexagonal form; towards the end of the 15th century these chapels were in turn destroyed, and the aisles again extended eastward for almost the entire length of the lady-chapel, in the walls of which openings were made, but during the restorations subsequent to 1873, this Perpendicular work was entirely removed on the south side but retained on the north. At the same time the Early English windows were restored in the lady-chapel, which is now in its original form. The south choir aisle has thus at its eastern extremity an apsidal chapel, as designed by the Early English builders, and is surmounted by a curious spire-like roof. This chapel was restored by the Brassey family in memory of their father. Each aisle is vaulted, and retains a piscina, and has western gates, presented in 1876 by the late Duke of Westminster K.G.; the south aisle has also on the south side two sepulchral recesses, each containing a stone coffin, and at the upper end a coffin-shaped altar-tomb, the sides of which are panelled in quatrefoils, with small painted figures of kings and bishops between the panels: in the north aisle is a monument, designed by Messrs. Kelly and Edwards, architects, of Chester, to Dr. John Graham, bishop of Chester 1848-65, and at its western end is a small chapel of the 12th century, with a curious low sedile and traces of an altar.

The lady-chapel, restored as stated above, has an east window of five graduated lancets, designed by the late Sir Gilbert Scott R.A. and filled with stained glass. The elaborate decoration of the roof was executed by Mr. Octavius Hudson, in part from traces still remaining, and occupied about five years; the reredos of glass mosaic, designed by Sir A. W. Blomfield kt. A.R.A., F.S.A. occupies the whole of the space below the window; the centre panel above the holy table represents the "Nativity," and on either side are other panels, arranged horizontally one above the other, with similarly wrought pictures of the "Salutation," the "Annunciation," the "Adoration of the Wise Men," and the "Flight into Egypt;" there are sedilia and a piscina, and some stall work of 1637; the flooring is of marble and tiles, and on the north side is a memorial to the Ven. Francis Wrangham M.A. prebendary of Chester and archdeacon of the East Riding, d. 1842. The shrine of St. Werburgh, or rather its lower portion, which from the foundation of the see up to 1876 served as the episcopal throne, was in 1890 replaced on its original site under the arch between the choir and lady-chapel; the structure was, however, so greatly altered at its restoration in 1846 by Canon Slade, that the ancient design could not be completely recovered; the original work is Early Decorated of the 13th century, and includes several small gilt figures, presumed to represent various Mercian sovereigns.

The other monuments in the cathedral include a fine modern altar-tomb, with effigy, to Bishop Pearson (1673-86): at the feet of the effigy are figures of angels; the sides of the tomb are ornamented with heads of the twelve apostles and sentences from the Creed; above the effigy rises a canopy of wrought metal work, inlaid with coloured marbles and precious stones; there are also memorials to William Smith D.D. dean of Chester, d. 12 Jan. 1787; Samuel Peplow D.D. bishop of Chester, 1726-52; and Capt. John Moore Napier, 62nd foot, d. in Scinde, 7 July, 1846, with epitaph by Lieut.-Gen. Sir Charles James Napier G.C.B. The ancient stained glass was almost wholly destroyed by a mob during the visit of the Duke of Monmouth to the city in 1683; the modern glass comprises the east windows of the choir and lady-chapel, the whole of the windows in the choir aisles, and others, some of these being memorials to the Anson, Hughes, Humberstone, and Richards families.

The restoration of the choir of the cathedral was begun in 1844 by Dean Anson, and carried out under the superintendence of Mr. B. C. Hussey, architect. In 1855 the lady-chapel was partly restored by the chapter, and decorated at the expense of Mrs. Hamilton, of Hoole

Lodge. At the beginning of 1868 the nave was fitted up by the chapter for divine service, at a cost of £1,500, and in March of the same year, at the instance and by the exertions of Dean Howson, the general restoration of the fabric was set on foot, and large sums were at once subscribed, including £10,000 by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners: the work was begun in the summer of 1868, under the direction of the late Sir G. Gilbert Scott R.A. and continued after his death by Sir Arthur W. Blomfield M.A., A.R.A., and since 1873 upwards of £100,000 has been expended in repairs and decoration. The cathedral registers date from 1687.

The cloisters, with the exception of the south walk, rebuilt during the later restoration of 1868 and following years, are 15th century Perpendicular; the destroyed south walk was furnished with carols or small square inclosures for studies, and five such studies still exist at the south end of the western alley; in the wall of the south walk, next the north aisle of the nave, are six semi-circular recessed Norman arches, probably indicating the burial places of abbots, or as some think recesses for book shelves; and at either end is a Norman doorway opening into the aisle; in the western alley are two other Norman doorways, one of which admits to the long vaulted chamber forming this side of the cloisters; it is of Early Norman date, 105 feet long by 40 wide, with a row of five circular vaulting piers down the centre, and was once divided by wooden partitions; its purpose and that of the building once existing above it appears to be at present undetermined. On the north side of the cloisters is the refectory, 90 by 34 feet, and originally Early English, but altered during the Perpendicular period; the oak roof was removed in 1804, but there remains a very beautiful Early English mural pulpit with open arcaded staircase; the entrance from the cloister and the arches above the lavatory, both of this period, also exist, but have been interrupted by the later Perpendicular vaulting, and a corbel on the east side of the doorway exhibits the royal arms of Henry VII. In the eastern alley of the cloisters is an Early English vestibule, 30 by 27 feet, divided by columns into three aisles, and leading to the chapter house, a very fine example of Early English (1142-8), 50 feet long by 26 wide and 35 feet high; it is vaulted in three bays, and has at the east end five graduated lights; the chapter library, kept here, includes a MS. Bible of the 12th century; on the wall hang the old colours of the 22nd (Cheshire) Regiment, carried at the storming of Quebec, Sept. 13, 1759; at the east end of the alley are stairs formerly leading to the dormitory, and beyond these on the east a vaulted cellar.

Holy Trinity church, in Watergate street, a building of red sandstone, in the Decorated Middle Pointed style, was entirely rebuilt in 1869, at a cost of £10,000, under the direction of Mr. William Kelly, architect, of Chester, and consists of a chancel, clerestoried nave of three bays and aisles and a western tower with pinnacles and spire containing 6 bells. Several relics of the old church are carefully preserved in the new, and include a stone effigy of John Whitmore, mayor of Chester 1369-1372, d. 1374; a brass to an unknown K.G. date about 1490, and other brasses to Henry Gee, a noted mayor of the city, 1545; Dame Elizabeth Calverley, 1579, with a quaint inscription in verse; Richard Olive, 1572; Peter Drinkwater, 1631, and to Matthew Henry, the commentator, 1714; sword and mace cases for the mayor of the city when he attended the church in state. Thomas Parnell, the poet, was buried here in July, 1718, but no monument remains. The stained east window is a memorial to Gen. Thomas Gerard Ball, and the pulpit of alabaster was erected to the memory of Dean Anson; the carved oak chancel screen commemorates the Rev. Edward Marston, rector 1862-95, and has 12 figures of saints, representing ancient dedications in the parish; the church plate dates from the 17th and 18th centuries, and there are sword and mace rests used on the occasions when the corporation attend here. The church affords 750 sittings. The registers date from the year 1598, and the churchwardens' accounts from 1532. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £194, in the gift of the Earl of Derby K.G. and held since 1895 by the Rev. Laurence Meakin Farrall M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge. The parochial charities include about £69 17s. yearly for distribution in bread and money.

The church of St. John the Baptist was originally the church of a college founded here by King Ethelred in 689 for a dean and 7 prebendaries; refounded in 906 by Ethelred, Earl of Mercia, and again by Leofric, Earl of Mercia, for a dean, 7 canons, 10 vicars, 2 clerks and 4 choristers: from 1075 until 1102 it served as the cathedral of Peter, Bishop of Lichfield, who removed the head of the see to Chester: the church, situated without the city walls, on a cliff of red stone rising above the north bank of the Dee,

is a fine example of the Norman, Transition and Early English styles, consisting of choir with aisles (new of one bay only out of four, the remainder being in ruins), clerestoried nave of four bays with triforium, north and south aisles, south-eastern chapel, crypt, north porch and a north-east tower containing a clock and 3 bells: the old tower, which stood at the north-west angle of the structure, fell in 1881, entirely destroying the north porch; the latter was rebuilt in 1882 and a new tower was erected in 1886 at the north-east angle of the church: in 1887 the north wall of the church was strengthened with buttresses and entirely replaced by the 1st Duke of Westminster K.G.: the massive circular pillars of the nave and crossing date from 1075 to 1095: in the crypt are some fine pre-Norman crosses and in the north aisle is a glass case containing objects of antiquity found at various periods in and about the church: there are some handsomely-painted mural boards by Randle Holme, the herald and author; and the mural monuments include one to Cecil Warburton esq. d. 1728; Diana Warburton, d. 1693, with the figure of a skeleton finely carved in marble; to William Falconer, recorder of the city of Chester, d. 1764; Elizabeth, his wife, d. 1782, and their five children; and to the Rev. William Richardson, 53 years vicar of the parish, d. 1837, and others: there are also brasses to the Rev. William Buxton Marsden, who was for 37 years vicar of the parish, 1838-75; Meadows Frost, of Chester, d. 1883; George Baxter, d. 1845; and Thomas Hughes esq. F.S.A. sheriff of Chester (1873-4), d. 1890: the stained west window, erected in 1890 and designed by Mr. Edward Frampton, exhibits twelve subjects taken from historical incidents in connection with the city of Chester, and was the gift of the 1st Duke of Westminster: in the north aisle is the recumbent cross-legged effigy of a knight in chain mail covered with a surcoat: there are 821 sittings, of which 388 are free. The register dates from the year 1559. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £297, in the gift of the Duke of Westminster, and held since 1875 by the Rev. Canon Samuel Cooper Scott M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge, rural dean and surrogate. The charities of the parish amount to about £700, and are applied to the relief of the deserving poor of the parish according to a new scheme sanctioned in 1889.

St. Barnabas' Mission church, in Sibell street, near the General Railway station, built in 1877, at a cost of about £1,700, as a chapel of ease to the church of St. John the Baptist, is a small edifice of brick, consisting of chancel, nave, north transept, and a turret containing one bell: there are 250 sittings. The Rev. John Phillips is curate in charge.

St. Mary's church, or St. Mary's-on-the-Hill, as it is more commonly called, stands on an eminence near the Castle; on the consecration of the new church of St. Mary-without-the-Walls, in 1887, the boundaries of the parish were altered, and the old church was included in the parish of St. Bridget with St. Martin, and in 1891, by a faculty decreed in the Consistory Court, it was constituted the parish church of these united parishes: the church is an ancient edifice of red sandstone in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with north and south chapels, clerestoried nave of three bays, aisles and a tower with pinnacles containing 8 bells, restored and refitted, and augmented by the addition of 2 bells from the church of St. Bridget: the aisles are separated from the nave by low Tudor arches: in the north chapel are two altar tombs, one of which, commemorating Thomas Gamull, recorder of Chester in 1613, and Alice his wife, has recumbent effigies of both, and at the feet of the lady is a kneeling figure of their infant son, afterwards the loyal Sir Francis Gamull kt. (1664); there are also figures of three infant daughters holding skulls in their hands, and on the sides of the tomb are two shields of arms: the other altar tomb, to Philip Oldfield esq. of Bradwall, ob. 1616, bears a half-recumbent effigy in marble, with two daughters kneeling at the head, in the costume of the period; figures of his four sons, each bearing a shield of arms, support the upper slab, and on the side of the tomb is a painted skeleton in a similar attitude to the effigy above: in the north aisle is a mural monument of considerable interest, ornamented with heraldic devices, to four members of the Holme family, local antiquaries and heralds of repute; the third, Randle, was the author of the heraldic work, "The Academy of Armory," published 1688; of the numerous other mural monuments and tablets, some have been removed here from the church of St. Bridget: the stained east window in the north chapel was erected in 1860, by public subscription, to the 23rd Regiment (Royal Welsh Fusiliers), especially with reference to its share in the campaign of 1854-5; there are also seven other memorial windows: the church has been restored at different times, and in 1891 a sum of £4,300 was expended, of which one half was given by the 1st Duke of Westminster, and the remainder

contributed by public subscription, the work being carried out under the superintendence of the late Mr. J. P. Seddon, architect, of Westminster, and including the re-casing of the north side, a new wood floor, the rebuilding of part of one arcade and the clerestory; the removal of the galleries, the restoration of the Troutbeck or Shrewsbury chapel, at the east end of the south aisle, and the construction of vestries at the west end of the same aisle: the porch was built at the cost of the Freemasons of the Provinces as a memorial to Randie Holme, at a cost of £225; the organ has also been rebuilt at a cost of £300, and an oak organ case has been since erected in memory of the late William Warrington, for 13 years an officer of the church: the beautiful nave roof, believed to have been brought from Basingwerke Abbey, in Flintshire, in 1536, has been restored at a cost of nearly £1,100; the elegant bosses, all of different design, being carefully preserved: there are 561 sittings. The registers and plate belonging to the old church were transferred in 1887 to the new church of St. Mary's-without-the-Walls, which became the parish church of the old parish of St. Mary-on-the-Hill. The registers of St. Bridget's date from the year 1649, and those of St. Martin's from 1680. The living, styled St. Bridget and St. Martin's, is a consolidated rectory, net yearly value £210, with 34 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1886 by the Ven. Edward Barber M.A. of Magdalen College, Oxford, archdeacon, vice-dean, and canon residentiary of Chester. The charities of the united parishes amount to about £50 yearly, and in accordance with a new scheme, sanctioned in 1889, are applied to the relief of the deserving poor of both parishes.

The church of St. Martin, at St. Martin's Ash, built in 1721, is an edifice of brick, in mixed styles, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles and a western tower containing 2 bells: it was restored in 1882, at a cost of £1,400, destroyed by Robert Roberts esq. of Upton, and is now used for Welsh services: there are sittings, for 200 persons. The church room, erected in 1901, is used for Sunday school and other purposes. The Rev. Owen Alban Thomas M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin, has been curate-in-charge since 1901.

The church of St. Mary, HANDBRIDGE, commonly called St. Mary's-without-the-Walls, and now the parish church of the old parish of St. Mary-on-the-Hill and also the garrison church, is a building of red sandstone in the Perpendicular style, erected during 1855-7, from plans by Mr. F. B. Wade, architect, of Victoria street, London, at a total cost of about £15,000, which, together with the site, was the gift of the late Duke of Westminster K.G.; it consists of chancel, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, north transept, north and south porches and a western tower with spire, 180 feet in height, containing a clock and 8 bells: the fittings are of oak, ornamented with wrought iron: the windows of the clerestory and those of the aisles are stained: the reredos has a representation of the "Resurrection," by Mr. Clement Heaton, of London: the font and three stained windows in the baptistery were given by the children of the congregation in 1887, and a memorial window has been erected at the west end of the south aisle to Charles A. Frost, d. 1891, son of Sir Thomas Gibbons Frost kt. several times mayor of Chester: the silver communion plate, formerly belonging to the church of St. Mary-on-the-Hill, includes an Elizabethan chalice, a flagon dated 1712, and two patens dated respectively 1639 and 1683: there are 800 sittings. The register, which is the old register of St. Mary-on-the-Hill, dates from the year 1628. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £225, with residence, in the gift of the Duke of Westminster, and held since 1882 by the Rev. Henry Grantham K.C.L. surrogate and hon. minor canon of Chester Cathedral and garrison chaplain. The charities for distribution to the poor of the parish amount to about £24 yearly.

St. Michael's church, in Bridge Street row, partially rebuilt in 1849, at a cost of £2,088, under the direction of the late Mr. Thomas Harrison, architect, of Chester, is a building of stone in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave of three bays, aisle, transept and a western tower, with pinnacles, containing 6 bells: Thomas Falconer esq. A.M. the celebrated editor of Strabo, a native of Chester, 1736; d. 4 Sept. 1792, was buried here: there are 300 sittings, all free. The register dates from the year 1560. The living, with St. Olave's chapelry annexed, is a vicarage, net yearly value about £220, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Francis Edward Hicks M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge.

St. Olave's, in Lower Bridge street, is a plain edifice of red sandstone, consisting of nave only, and has 150 sittings. The parochial charities of St. Olave's amount to £4 14s. 4d. and of St. Michael's, about £28 10s.; of the

latter, £20 16s. 7d. is distributed (principally in bread) to the deserving poor, or applied to the apprenticing of boys.

St. Peter's church, at the angle of Watergate and Northgate streets, is a building of local red stone in the Gothic style of the 15th century, and from the great span of the arches and their elevation is supposed to be the remnant of a larger edifice; it consists of a nave of two bays with clerestory, aisles, and an open tower at the west end, containing an illuminated clock and 6 bells: there being no chancel, a small portion of the nave at the east end has been raised to serve this purpose: the stained east window is a memorial to H.R.H. the Prince Consort, and was erected in 1862 by public subscription, at a cost of £264: there are about 30 monumental brasses and tablets, including one to Thomas Cooper, sheriff of the city in 1582, and another to Robert Townsend, also sheriff: the church was altered and partially restored in 1849, when an additional gallery on the south side was erected: in 1886 the west gallery was removed, the organ re-cased, a new pulpit, brass eagle lectern and reading desk provided, and the quasi-chancel re-seated; a new entrance was also formed at the north-west corner, Perpendicular traceried windows, lighting the clerestory, a battlemented parapet and a conical roof to the tower being also added: in 1899 choir stalls were provided, a new vestry erected, and 5 stops added to the organ, at a total cost of £600: there are 500 sittings. The register dates from the year 1559. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £305, in the gift of the Bishop, and held since 1905 by the Rev. Alfred Hamilton Waller M.A. of Queens' College, Cambridge, and surrogate. The parochial charities include about £26 yearly for distribution in kind and money.

St. Thomas's church, in Parkgate road, was erected in 1871, and in 1881 (Aug. 30) was enlarged and made the parish church of the parish of St. Oswald, in lieu of the south transept of the cathedral, which had served as the parish church since its erection in the 14th century: the church is of red sandstone in the Early English style, from designs by the late Sir G. Gilbert Scott R.A. and consists of chancel, nave of five bays, aisles, north porch, and has one bell, but there is at present no tower: the east and west windows are stained, and there is a memorial window in the north aisle, erected in 1881, to the late William Harrison M.A. 52 years vicar, d. 1880; and others to George Haswell, d. 1854, and Sarah Haswell, d. 1857: the church affords 750 sittings. The register of St. Oswald's dates from the year 1580. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £200, with residence, erected in 1880, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Ernest Campbell Lowndes M.A. of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, and surrogate. The parochial charities amount to about £30 yearly.

St. John the Baptist's without-the-Northgate (commonly called Little St. John's) is a chapelry within the parish of St. Oswald. The chapel, erected in 1717, at the expense of the Corporation, is a plain structure of brick occupying the south wing of the Blue Coat Hospital and is part of the foundation of the adjoining Hospital of St. John the Baptist, of which the incumbent is chaplain: the chapel affords 150 sittings. The living is a perpetual curacy, net yearly value £274, in the gift of the Chester Charity Trustees, and held since 1881 by the Rev. Joseph Louis Bedford M.A. of Queens' College, Cambridge, and surrogate and chaplain of St. John's Hospital.

Christ Church is an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1843 from the parishes of St. John the Baptist and St. Oswald, Chester and Plemstall. The church, in Gloucester street, Newtown, and originally erected in 1838, has been entirely rebuilt, and is an edifice of stone, seating 750 persons. A large picture of Joseph of Arimathea, with the dead Christ, painted in 1826 by Richard Westall R.A. and formerly in the old church of St. Mary, at Eccleston, has been transferred here, together with the oak choir stalls of that church, entirely rebuilt in 1890. The register dates from the year 1835. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £190, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1880 by the Rev. James Francis Howson M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge.

St. Paul's is an ecclesiastical parish formed July 10, 1846, from the parishes of St. John the Baptist and St. Oswald, Chester, and comprises Spital-Boughton, formerly reputed to be extra-parochial. The church at Boughton, erected in 1830 at a cost of £2,000, was almost entirely rebuilt upon the old foundation in 1876, at a cost of about £4,000, and is a structure of brick in the Gothic style, from designs by Mr. John Douglas, architect, of Chester, and consists of nave with eastern apse, aisles and a turret containing a clock and one bell: the south aisle was built in 1902 at a cost of £2,000: the stained east window was erected in 1881 as a memorial to Eliza Brown (d.

1868) and Annie Brown (d. 1880): there are 750 sittings, of which 350 are free. The register of marriages dates from the year 1874, and of baptisms from 1838. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £342, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of St. John's, Chester, and held since 1896 by the Rev. Frank Edwards M.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge.

The Catholic church, dedicated to St. Werburgh, in Grosvenor Park road, was erected in 1875, and is a building of stone in the Gothic style: two sacristies, connected by an ambulatory, at the sanctuary end of the church, were erected in 1904 at a cost of about £2,000: the church affords sittings for 600 persons.

The Catholic church of St. Francis, in Grosvenor street, erected in 1875, is an edifice of stone, in mixed styles, and will seat 800.

The Catholic Apostolic church, in Church street, Upper Northgate street, built in 1864, will seat 250.

The Matthew Henry Memorial Presbyterian Church of England, at the south end of Newgate street, erected in 1846 and rebuilt in 1884, at a cost of £4,000, affords 414 sittings.

The Welsh Calvinistic Methodist chapel, in St. John's street, erected in 1866, at a cost of about £8,000, is a building of stone in the Gothic style: the west front has a good stained window: all the services here are in the Welsh language: number of sittings, 550. The chapel of this sect in City road, erected in 1864, has 430 sittings.

The Unitarian chapel, in Trinity street, erected in 1700, is a plain edifice of brick, with 250 sittings. The celebrated Matthew Henry ministered in this chapel at an early period of his career.

There are five Congregational chapels. The chapel in Queen street, erected in 1772, is of brick, fronted with stone, with a portico and pillars of the Doric order, and has sittings for 1,000 persons. The chapel in Upper Northgate street, erected in 1878, is of stone and has 500 sittings. Great Boughton chapel, in Christleton road, built in 1867, seats 430. Handbridge chapel, erected in 1879, will seat 400. Albion Park Welsh chapel, in Albion street, erected in 1847, seats 500.

The Wesleyan Methodist chapel in St. John street, built in 1811, is of brick and stone, and has sittings for 800 persons.

The Wesleyan chapel, City road, erected in 1873, at a cost of about £8,000, is of stone, in the Gothic style, and has 700 sittings.

The Welsh Wesleyan chapel, in Queen street, and built in 1884, at a cost of £2,800, will seat 350 persons.

The Methodist New Connexion chapel, in Pepper street, opened in 1835, at a cost of about £5,000, is of brick, faced with stone and ornamented in front with four fluted pillars of the Corinthian order, and will seat 1,000 persons.

There are three Primitive Methodist chapels. That in Hunter street, erected in 1899, has 575 sittings; the chapel in George street, built in 1837, will seat 780; and that in Tarvin road, erected in 1884 and enlarged 1894, seats 285.

The Baptist chapel, in Grosvenor Park road, erected in 1880, has 400 sittings, and that in Milton street, built in 1882, will seat 600.

The Cemetery, at Overleigh, on the south-west side of the Dee bridge, the property of the Chester Cemetery Co. is about 13 acres in extent and has three mortuary chapels. Opposite the cemetery gates is a suspension bridge for foot passengers, leading to Curzon park.

The Town Hall, on the west side of Northgate street, and erected in 1869, at a cost of about £35,000 (to replace the Old Town Hall, burnt in 1862), is a building of red sandstone in the Gothic style, from the designs of Messrs. Lanyon and Lynn, architects, of Belfast. The principal front is about 120 feet in length, with a tower rising to a height of 160 feet, and at each corner of the façade are turrets intended to contain statues. The interior comprises a Sessions court, an assembly room, holding 500 persons, mayor's parlour, committee rooms and a small ante-room leading to the council chamber, which is a noble apartment, handsomely appointed. The basement is chiefly occupied by the police offices.

The Police Station is at the Town Hall.

The municipal insignia consist of a great mace, a sword of state, mayor's chain and badge, sheriff's chain, two staves and a silver oar. The great mace, of silver-gilt, is 4 feet 3½ inches in length; the staff, finely chased with spirals of roses and thistles, is divided into three portions by large knobs, the foot knob bearing the arms of Stanley, the Isle of Man and the City of Chester, and the latter coat is repeated on the flat plate at the bottom; the head of the mace is surrounded by foliated figures alternating with the national badges, crowned, and is surmounted by a circlet from which spring the arches of the crown; on the flat top of the head are the royal arms of the Stuarts, and it also bears an inscription showing that it was given to

the town in 1668 by Charles, 8th Earl of Derby, lord of Man and the Isles, and who was also then mayor. The sword, 4 feet 2 inches long, has a double-edged steel blade of 39 inches, bearing traces of engraved shields of arms; the guards, or quillons, which curl upwards, and the pommel, are of silver-gilt; the scabbard is covered with red velvet, encased at intervals by ten silver-gilt belts and plates, with arms and names of mayors and others from 1668 to 1781. The sword has been reputed to be that presented to the city in 1394 by Richard II. but its shape and ornamentation do not accord with so early a date, and it is most probable that it is the sword given to the city by Henry VII. and mentioned in his first charter, dated 6th April, 1506. The mayor's chain and badge of gold were presented in 1851 by John Williams esq. then mayor; the chain is formed of plain links; the badge, a circular medalion displaying the city arms, within a laurel wreath, depends from an earl's coronet; the sheriff's chain, of silver-gilt, is similar in design, and was the gift, in 1869, of Alderman F. Butt. The mayor's porter's staff is a silver-headed cane, 6 feet 3 inches long, and was given in 1721 by Thomas Edwards, mayor; the sheriff's staff, presented in 1867 by Thomas Bowers, then sheriff, is of polished lancewood, 6 feet 8 inches long, and has a silver head bearing the city arms. The silver oar, so called, is of wood cased with silver; it is 14 inches in length and has the Chester hall-mark for 1719-20 and various inscriptions, arms and badges. The common seal, of silver, is 2½ inches in diameter and was made in the 17th century, in imitation of the earlier 14th century seal, now lost; the mayor's seal, also of silver, is smaller and has also been copied from a much older one; in addition to these, the city also possesses one of the original statute merchant seals, dating from about 1283. The mayor and aldermen wear robes of scarlet cloth and sables, and the sheriff one of purple cloth with black velvet facings. The corporation are very rich in silver plate, though it is mostly of late date, the old plate having been sold during the Civil War to provide for the defence of the city and the payment of its debts; the earliest piece now held by the Corporation is a tankard of 1668-9, given to the city by Alderman Ralph Whitley, who died 5th October, 1679.

The castle of Chester, built about 1084 by William the Norman, was originally a fortress of considerable extent, but a great part of it was taken down about 1790 for the purpose of erecting the County Hall, a fine structure in the classic style, from designs by Mr. Thomas Harrison, architect, with a colonnaded portico of the Grecian-Doric order, 103 ft. in length. The large hall is semi-circular in form and is supported by twelve columns of the Ionic order. A second hall or court has recently been erected in which civil actions are tried. The western side of the area is occupied by the spacious armoury. Here are held the assizes, county courts, petty sessions and meetings of the County Council; the castle also serves as barracks.

Opposite the entrance to the Castle is a bronze equestrian statue of Field-Marshal Viscount Combermere G.C.B. (d. 21st Feb. 1865), modelled by the late Baron Marochetti: R.A. and erected in 1879, at a cost of £6,000, subscribed by the inhabitants of the county. The total height is about 24 feet. On one side of the pedestal is an inscription and on the other a list of battles in which Lord Combermere was engaged.

Chester is the head quarters of the Western Military District, comprising Wales and the counties of Lancashire (except that part included in the Northern command), Shropshire, Herefordshire, Monmouthshire, and the Isle of Man. The Defences of Barrow and the signal stations on the coast of Cumberland and Lancashire are included in the Mersey Coast Defences. The city is also the Depot of Regimental District No. 22, the Cheshire Regiment (Welsh Border Group), comprising the 1st and 2nd Battalions (22nd Foot), 3rd Battalion (1st Royal Cheshire Militia) and 4th Battalion (2nd Royal Cheshire Militia). The 3rd Battalion have barracks in the Castle Esplanade, and the 4th their head quarters at Macclesfield. The Cheshire (Earl of Chester's) Imperial Yeomanry have their offices at Old Bank buildings, Foregate street; the 1st Cheshire Royal Garrison Artillery (Volunteers) have head quarters in Shipgate street; and the 2nd Volunteer Battalion (Earl of Chester's) Cheshire Regiment have head quarters at 8 Blackfriars. Chester is also the head quarters of the Cheshire Volunteer Infantry Brigade and the Cheshire Bearer Co. Royal Army Medical Corps (Volunteers).

The Volunteer Drill Hall, in Albion street, erected in 1869, at a cost of about £2,500, is a building of stone with embattled front and a tower, and was designed by Messrs. Kelly and Edwards, architects, of Chester; the hall is 100 feet in length and 60 feet in width, and was refitted in 1895 with wood at a cost of about £400; adjoining is the

armoury and magazine, over which are committee and reading rooms, and there is a dwelling house for the hall keeper.

The Campbell Memorial Hall, Boughton, erected at the expense of Mrs. Pitcairn Campbell, in memory of her husband, the Rev. Edward Augustus Pitcairn Campbell M.A. of Vicar's Cross, Chester, who died in 1892, is a structure of red brick with stone facings, comprising a large hall for entertainments, gymnasium, two billiard rooms, reading room and library. The building, opened Sept. 16, 1895, is vested in trustees for the benefit of the parish of Boughton. Edward S. Giles esq. solicitor, is hon. sec.

The city of Chester was at one time a place of considerable commercial importance, but with the rise of Liverpool it gradually declined; there are, however, some manufactures, which include the shot tower and lead smelting works and extensive white lead and paint factories of Messrs. Walkers, Parker and Co. Limited, also tobacco and snuff factories, several timber yards and steam saw mills, breweries, corn mills with steam and water power, and the extensive nurseries of Messrs. Dicksons Limited.

The markets are on Wednesday and Saturday, the latter being the principal day: the Market Hall, in Northgate street, is a spacious building, well supplied with meat, fish, poultry, vegetables, and all kinds of provisions. The corn market, on Saturday, is held in the Corn Exchange, Eastgate street, and is well attended by the neighbouring farmers. There is also a weekly market for horned cattle, sheep and pigs held in the Cattle Market, George street, on Thursdays, and sales by auction of fat stock every Tuesday. Cheese fairs are held in the Market Hall, Northgate street, on the third Wednesday in each month. There are also fairs every month for horses and cattle, held on Thursdays.

There are five newspapers, two of which have a large circulation and have been established more than a century; the third and fourth a few months previous to the repeal of the stamp duty. The fifth (which is a monthly publication) has an extensive circulation amongst the farmers of Cheshire. They are the "Chester Courant," Conservative, established 1730; "Chester Chronicle," Liberal, established 1775; "Chester Guardian and Record," "Cheshire Observer," established 1851; and "The Farmers' Herald."

The Shropshire Union Railways and Canal Company's boats load daily at the Tower wharf and Cow Lane wharf, for Liverpool and principal towns in North Wales, Shropshire and North and South Staffordshire.

The Grosvenor Hotel, on the north side of Eastgate street, erected in 1866 at a cost of £30,000, by the late Marquess of Westminster, is a building of red pressed brick and Bath stone, in the style of the 16th century, from designs by the late Messrs. Penson and Ritchie, architects, of this city. The principal or Eastgate street front includes a continuation of the "Row" on that side of the street, the superstructure being carried on a colonnade of polished Anglesea marble shafts with moulded stone bases, and carved and moulded capitals; the hotel contains a magnificent ball or assembly room, conveniently holding about 300 persons.

The Queen Hotel, adjoining the Railway Station, with which it communicates, was built in 1860, and is an extensive building of stone, with spacious coffee, dining and other rooms. The Hop Pole Hotel, Foregate street, and the Bull and Stirrup Hotel, Upper Northgate street, are also good and well-managed hostleries.

The Post Office, in St. John's street, erected in 1876, is a handsome red brick building with stone facings, and has commodious offices.

The Chester City Baths, situated in Union street, were erected in 1901, and contain ladies' and gentlemen's private and swimming baths.

The Royalty Theatre, in City road, and erected in 1882, is of brick and stone, and will seat about 2,000 persons.

The Music Hall, in Northgate street, an edifice of brick and stone, with an entrance in St. Werburgh street, will seat about 1,000 persons, and is used for concerts &c.

The Public Library and Reading Room, in St. John street, formerly the Mechanics' Institute, was opened as a Free Library in 1876, and comprises lending and reference departments, with a large general reading room and a separate ladies' reading room; the total number of volumes in the library is now (1906) 22,000; the library is managed by a committee of the City Council, and usually consists of 16 members.

The Grosvenor Museum, in Grosvenor street, erected in 1885, at a cost of about £20,000, raised by public subscription, is an edifice of brick and stone in the Renaissance style, from plans by Mr. T. M. Lockwood, architect, of Chester. The museum contains many interesting relics discovered within the city, besides various objects of

general historical and archaeological interest; and there is also a natural history museum, which contains a fine collection of birds in groups, and excellent lecture rooms in which the Chester Archaeological and Historic Society and the Society of Natural Science and Literature hold their meetings: the School of Science and Art and the Technical School and School of Cookery are also carried on here.

The Liberal Club, in Watengate street, was first founded in 1883, the old property costing £2,500; in 1891-2 the buildings were re-modelled, at a cost of £1,500, and opened 31 March, 1892, and now comprise billiard room, reading room, dining, chess and reception rooms &c. and at the rear is a piece of ground for recreation. In 1896 the club was endowed by a gift of £2,500 from the president, Alderman Charles Brown J.P.; it is managed by a committee of 12 members, and there were in 1906, 470 members.

The Chester and County Unionist Club, in Newgate street, erected in 1898, comprises an assembly room, billiard and chess rooms, dining and reading rooms, and other apartments. The club is managed by a committee.

The City Club, in St. Peter's churchyard, Northgate street, was founded 10 June, 1807, and its buildings, erected in that year at a cost of £3,000, are Classical in style, and were designed by the late Mr. Harrison, architect, of Chester. The club, opened 10 June, 1808, contains reading and billiard rooms, card room and steward's offices; there were in 1906 100 proprietary and 40 subscribing members. The club is managed by a committee of 15 persons.

The Grosvenor Club, in Eastgate street, and erected by the Trustees of Owen Jones's Charity, is a building of red brick, with Helsby and Manley stone dressings, in a late Gothic style, erected in 1883, from the designs of Messrs. Douglas and Fordham, the ground floor of which is in the occupation of the North and South Wales Bank Ltd. The club was originally established in 1866, and until 1883 occupied rooms at the Grosvenor Hotel; there are about 250 members, the majority of whom belong to the counties of Cheshire, Flintshire and Denbighshire.

The charities of the city, for distribution in money and kind, apart from the parochial gifts, amount to about £1,500 yearly.

The Hospital of St. John was founded by Ranulph or Randle de Meschines, surnamed "Blundevill," 4th Earl of Chester of this family, Duke of Brittany and Earl of Richmond (1181-1232), for the maintenance of thirteen poor and impotent persons, each of them to receive daily throughout the year, a quarter loaf of good bread, a dish of pottage, and a certain pittance of "fish or flesh as the day may be, and half a gallon of competent ale." The hospital, situated in rear of the Blue Coat School, forms three sides of a quadrangle, and at present consists of thirteen houses, each containing sitting-room, bed-room and scullery under the same roof, and inhabited by thirteen poor and aged people, male or female, each receiving ten shillings per week, together with gas, a certain allowance of coals during the year and medical attendance; one of the inmates acts as matron and nurse. The chapel of St. John, mentioned above, and now included in St. Oswald's parish, is a portion of the same foundation, and the whole is under the control of the Local Charity Trustees, the Rev. Joseph Louis Bedford M.A. of Queen's College, Cambridge, and incumbent of Little St. John's, has been perpetual curate and chaplain since 1881; the whole of the sittings in the chapel are free. The income of the hospital, incorporating that of St. Giles's hospital, is about £761 yearly, derived from houses, lands and tithes.

The Chester General Infirmary in St. Martin's-in-the-Fields, established in 1755, is a structure of brick in a plain style, containing 118 beds, 50 of which are for men, 40 for women, 20 for children, and 8 for ophthalmic cases; during the year 1905 there were 1,140 in-patients, 4,375 out-patients, and 2,056 home and district patients. The infirmary is managed by a board elected by the governors, and is supported by voluntary subscriptions and by an annual grant by the Duke of Westminster from the fees paid to His Grace by the public for viewing Eaton Hall; the grant for the year 1905 amounted to £500.

St. Michael's Almshouses, in Pepper street, were founded in 1658 by William Jones esq. Middle Temple, London, for 4 men and 6 women, each of whom receives 20s. per month; this charity has a yearly income of about £118, derived from property consisting of houses and land.

Wardell's Almshouses, Crook street, were erected in 1859 by William Wardell esq. in connection with Mr. Thomas Green's Charity of 1602; they are 6 in number and are for aged persons, each of whom receives 8s. per week and a ton of coal yearly.

Mainwaring's Almshouses in Trinity street, and Timothy Dean's at Handbridge, have been taken down, and Salmon's in Little St. John street are now closed.

Almshouses, New Crane street, founded by an ancestor of the Duke of Westminster many years ago, for 12 aged freemen of the city, each of whom receive 5s. weekly, supported by the Duke of Westminster.

Grosvenor Park, on the north bank of the Dee, facing an estate called the Queen's Park, on the opposite bank, comprises about 20 acres, presented to the city in Nov. 1867, by Richard, 2d Marquess of Westminster K.G. who left £100 yearly towards its maintenance; the park is well laid out and includes a small ornamental lake, and in the centre is a monument to the marquess, erected by his tenants and neighbours in 1866. Curzon Park is a pleasant suburb, occupying an elevated position on the south bank of the Dee.

The Town Council at their meeting 14 April, 1892, accepted from the late Duke of Westminster the gift of a park at Handbridge, which he had purchased and laid out at a cost of £4,000, together with £1,000 for its endowment, and it was opened to the public on April 18; the site includes "Edgar's field," which is stated to have been the mustering ground of the Roman soldiers, and also the spot from which King Edgar embarked for his journey up the Dee.

The Roodee is a wide and level tract of about 60 acres, on the north bank of the Dee, belonging to the Corporation; and here the Chester race meeting is held every year in May. The present Race Company, of which the

Duke of Westminster is chairman, has liberty to enclose the Roodee, and levy gate money, paying to the Town Council one-tenth of the gross receipts, and contributing five-tenths to the race fund. From the surrounding walls each race can be seen from the commencement to the termination; the Grand stand, erected in 1817, was enlarged in 1855. The ground is also used for the Horticultural Show and Fête, which is held annually.

The Duke of Westminster and the Earl of Crewe are the principal landowners.

The area of the city and county borough is 2,787 acres of land, 75 of inland and 60 of tidal water and 13 of foreshore; rateable value, £216,572. Chester Castle parish area, 10 acres; rateable value, £427.

The population of the municipal borough in 1901 was 36,309, including 110 in the Industrial School and 212 Military and 18 other occupants of Chester Castle.

The population of the municipal wards in 1901 was, Boughton, 11,547; St. John, 4,056; St. Mary, 6,278; St. Oswald, 7,470; Trinity, 8,958.

The population of the ecclesiastical parishes in 1901 was, Christ Church, 5,428; Holy Trinity, 2,755; St. Bridget with St. Martin, 1,931; St. John the Baptist, 7,899; St. Mary the Virgin, 3,604; St. Michael with St. Olave, 1,388; St. Oswald (St. Thomas), 6,335.

The area of the parliamentary borough is 3,393 acres, of which 173 are in Flintshire; the population in 1901 was 46,207, of which 1,296 were in Flintshire. The number of electors on the parliamentary register in 1906 was 7,918.

SCHOOLS.

King's School, Northgate street, founded by King Henry VIII. in 1541, & re-organized under the "Endowed Schools Act," in 1873. The object of the foundation is to supply a liberal education by means of this school, in connection with the Cathedral Church of Chester, under the "Endowed Schools Act, 1869" (32 & 33. Vict. c. 56). The present building, erected in 1877, at a cost of £20,000, from designs by Sir A. W. Blomfield A.R.A., F.S.A. is of red sandstone, with convenient class-rooms & offices, & will hold 200 boys. A field is rented in the suburbs to be used as a playground. The school is controlled by a body of governors. The endowment amounts to about £600 yearly & there were in 1906, 105 boys. Rev. John Timothy Davies M.A. of Wadham College, Oxford, head master; Rev. The Blue Coat School in Upper Northgate street, occupying a portion of the site belonging to the Hospital of St. John the Baptist, was founded in 1700, by public subscription, under the auspices of Dr. Nicholas Stratford, then Bishop of Chester, & is a structure of brick, forming three sides of a quadrangle; the west side & north wing comprise the school, the dormitories, board room & master's apartments; the south wing is the chapel of St. John the Baptist without-the-Northgate, of which a separate account will be found among the descriptions of churches: in the school room is a bust of Bishop Stratford with an inscription: thirty-six boys are educated, clothed, lodged & boarded. Boys are elected annually to the board & clothing foundation, as vacancies occur, orphans & sons of widows having priority: the school is supported by voluntary subscriptions, & by the revenues arising from landed property & stock in the public funds. F. G. Tamplin Williams, head master; Miss Hilda Wills, matron; Bugle-Major Handley, band-master.

Blue Charity (girls), Vicar's lane, founded in 1711; the present building was erected in 1872 on a site given by Hugh Lupus, 3rd Marquess of Westminster, for 18 girls. The school is intended for the education & training of girls for domestic service. A small sum of money is given when a girl leaves the school, for clothing, & a further bounty if her conduct deserves it while in her situation. There were in 1906, 18 girls. Miss Annie Fleetwood, matron.

Chester Diocesan (boys), George street, Upper Northgate street, established in 1812, & managed by a committee; Joseph Arkle, master.

Bishop Graham Memorial, Princess street, built in 1867 & enlarged in 1895, for 200 children; average attendance, 140; Robert Lloyd, master.

The Queen's School for Girls was founded in May 1879, & up to 1883 occupied premises at 100 Watergate flag, when the present building was erected at a cost of about £4,000 on a site near the city walls, given by the first Duke of Westminster K.G., P.C. & commanding an extensive view of the river Dee & the Welsh hills; it is of brick with stone dressings from designs by Mr. E. A. Ould, architect, of Chester, & has convenient class rooms & a residence for the head mistress; over the principal entrance is a statue of Queen Victoria in terracotta, executed by Mr. Edward Griffith, of Chester.

The object of the foundation is to provide an education for girls similar in general character to that given in the King's School for boys. CHRISTLETON is a parish in the unions of Tarvin and Chester; the township is on the road from Whitchurch to Chester, 2½ miles south-east from Chester, in the Eddisbury division of the county, lower division of Broxton hundred, petty sessional division of Chester Castle, Chester union and county court district, and rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The Shropshire Union canal passes through the village. The church of St. James the Apostle is an edifice of local red sandstone and white Stourton stone, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of five bays, with aisles, transepts, south porch and an embattled western tower, rebuilt in 1530, but much damaged by the Royalist garrison of Chester in 1645, and restored in 1678: in 1877 it was heightened, and contains a clock and 8 bells: the rest of the church was rebuilt of brick in 1738, and again rebuilt in 1876-7, of red sandstone, from designs by Mr. W. Butterfield, architect. The pulpit, of oak and walnut, on a base of polished Devonshire marble, and designed by Mr. Butterfield, was presented in 1877 by Mrs. Ince, of Christleton Hall, in memory of her husband, Townsend Ince, esq. D.L. d. 1871: the font is of Derbyshire fossil and Sicilian marbles: the stained west window was given in memory of Theodosia Fanny Lace (d. 1877), by her husband, brothers and sisters, and there is a memorial window erected by his Honour Judge William Wynne Foulkes M.A. to his youngest daughter, Amy Elizabeth Margaret, d. 1883, and a third placed by Major J. St. John Hartford to Frances Catherine, his wife, d. 1886: the church is fitted with open oak benches, seating about 400 persons. The register dates from the year 1660. The living is a rectory, net yearly value, £358, including 60 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Capt. C. H. Garnett, of Wyreside, near Lancaster, and held since 1869 by the Rev. Lionel Garnett B.A. of Brasenose College, Oxford. The rectory house was rebuilt in 1870. There is a Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1838. Four almshouses, in the old Cheshire half-timbered style, from designs by Mr. J. Oldrid Scott F.S.A. were built in the year 1868 by the late Mrs. James Dixon, of Littleton, in memory of her son, James Dixon. A sum of £100 was left by the late James Dixon esq. of Littleton, who died in 1866, the interest to be used at the discretion of the rector for the benefit of the poor of the parish. The poor's money, amounting to £1 7s. is distributed by the churchwardens. The Workmen's Club was founded in 1871 and had in 1906 60 members; the premises comprise reading and billiard rooms; it is managed by a working committee; secretary, J. V. Wright. George Cooper esq. of Manchester, who is lord of the manor, W. G. Townsend Currie esq. and the Duke of Westminster are the principal landowners. The soil is strong clay and sandy; the subsoil is clayey and marly. The chief crops are wheat, oats and potatoes. A considerable quantity of cheese is made in the parish. The area of the township is 1,493 acres of land and 11 of water; rateable value, £6,004; the population in 1901 was—parish, 1,289; township, 859. By Local Government Board Order a farm house at Eggbridge in this township was in 1888 added to Waverton.

COTTON ABBOTS is a small township, 1½ miles east from the church and 4 miles south-east from Chester, in the union of Tarvin. The manor was given by one of the Fitzhugh family, barons of Malspas, to the abbey of St. Werburgh, at Chester; it is now the property of the Duke of Westminster. The area is 292 acres; rateable value, £387; the population in 1901 was 12.

By Local Government Board, Stamford Mill farm was in 1888 transferred from Cotton Abbots to Cotton Edmunds.

The Duke of Westminster is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is strong clay; subsoil, marl and clayey. The area is 622 acres; rateable value, £829; the population in 1901 was 62.

LITTLETON is a small but pleasant village and township, half a mile north from Christleton church and 2 miles south-east from Chester, in the union of Chester. Littleton Hall, the seat of Edward Dixon esq. is a handsome mansion, situated on an eminence overlooking the city of Chester. The area is 274 acres; rateable value, £1,474; the population in 1901 was 250.

ROWTON is a small township and village, a mile south from Christleton church, 3½ miles south-east from Chester and one mile from Waverton station on the Crewe and Chester section of the London and North Western railway, in the union of Tarvin. Rowton Moor, in this township, was the scene of an engagement, fought 24 September, 1645, between the Royalists, under Sir Mar-

maduke Langdale, and a Parliamentary force, commanded by Sir William Brereton and Col. Poyntz, in which the former were totally defeated, with a loss of 300 killed and wounded and 1,000 taken prisoners; the remainder being driven in disorder to Chester. Here is a Wesleyan chapel erected in 1865. Rowton Hall is the residence of John William Macfie esq. J.P. J. W.

CHURCH COPPENHALL is a small parish, 2½ miles north from the Crewe station, 4 north-east from Nantwich, 5 south-west from Sandbach, in the Crewe division of the county, Nantwich petty sessional division, hundred, union and county court district, rural deanery of Nantwich, and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The township of Monks Coppenhall is absorbed into the town of Crewe, and the greater part of the original township, also the church of Church Coppenhall, has been added to the borough of Crewe, Nov. 9th, 1892 (see Crewe). There is a Primitive Methodist chapel

here, erected in 1868. The charities for distribution in bread and money are of £16 ss. yearly value. There is no lord of the manor, but there are many landowners. The soil is very stiff and poor; the subsoil, clay. The chief produce is cheese. The area is 792 acres; rateable value, £5,798; the population in 1901 was 671.

CHURCH MINSHULL (so called to distinguish it from the adjoining township of Minshull Vernon) is a parish, township and small village on the west bank of the river Weaver, which is crossed by a bridge of two arches to Minshull Vernon, and on the road from Nantwich to Warrington, about 1½ miles from Minshull Vernon station, on the Crewe and Warrington section of the London and North Western railway, 6 miles north from Nantwich, 4 south-south-east from Over, and 5 miles south-west from Middlewich, in the Eddisbury division of the county, hundred of Northwich, union, county court district and petty sessional division of Nantwich, rural deanery of Middlewich and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The Shropshire Union canal crosses the border of the parish. The church of St. Bartholomew, erected in 1702 on the site of an older structure, is a plain edifice of brick and stone, consisting of apsidal chancel, nave of four bays, aisles, and a western tower with pinnacles, containing a clock and 5 bells, cast in 1717: the piers of the arcades appear to be the remains of the former church: in 1861 the church was completely restored and re-seated at a cost of £800, and in

1891 was further restored at an expense of nearly £560, under the superintendence of Mr. Walter M. Bowden, architect, of Chester: an organ, in memory of Captain Charles Luxmoore Brooke, of Ashbrook Hall, d. Jan. 9, 1890, was placed in the church in 1890 by his wife and children: in the church is a mural monument to Jane, wife of Thomas Cholmondeley esq. of Vale Royal, d. 14 April, 1866, and there are also several modern tablets: in the churchyard, at the foot of the tower, is a dilapidated tomb, on one side of which is a portion of a skeleton carved in stone, but the inscription is now entirely gone: this was the burial place of the old family of Wade, from whom Wade's Green takes its name, and there is a strong local tradition that the remains of the Right Hon. George Wade, P.C., M.P. Field Marshal, and commander of the King's troops during the Jacobite rebellion of 1745, who died 14 March, 1748, were interred here; but it is evident from the register of Westminster Abbey that he was buried there March 21, 1748, near the choir gate, and in the abbey nave is an elaborate monument to him, executed by the distinguished sculptor, Louis F. Roubiliac: on the exterior south-east wall of the chancel is a slab with

undated inscription to Thomas Minshull esq. of Eardswick, and Alice, his wife: there are sittings for 250 persons. The parish registers commence in 1561, and contain the following remarkable instance of longevity:—"1649, Thomas Damme, of Leighton, buried 20th of February, being of the age of seven score and fourteen." The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £126, with glebe and residence, in the gift of Charles F. C. Luxmoore esq. of Ashbrook Towers, and held since 1884 by the Rev. Alder Heffill, of St. Bees. Charities:—The poor have £30 yearly, £10 from the bequests of Wade, Frogge and others, which is distributed in coals and clothing at Christmas, and £20 derived from the rent of two fields situate at Tetton, and distributed in money on St. Thomas's day. This place was formerly in the parish of Acton, and attached to the barony of Wich Milbank (Nantwich), but on its division it fell to Philip Basset, and afterwards was vested in the Lovels. The mesne manor was formerly possessed by a family who assumed the local name soon after the Norman accession, and from whom it passed through an heiress in the reign of Edward III. to the Dutton family. After the death of Sir Thomas Dutton, in the reign of Henry VII. without male issue, it passed to the representatives of Eleanor, his fifth daughter, who married Richard de Cholmondeley; a younger branch of the Minshulls continued the male line, and resided here until the demise of John Minshull, in the year 1654, when his estate passed in marriage with Elizabeth, his sole heiress, to Thomas Cholmondeley esq. of Vale Royal, ancestor of the present Lord Delamere; he thus became possessed of the whole property, and died in 1652, and the estate was afterwards sold in 1770 to John Brooke esq. of Hallwood, Cheshire. Ashbrook Towers is the residence of Charles Frederick Coryndon

Luxmoore esq. who is lord of the manor and principal landowner; Henry Done esq. of Tarporley, also owns some land in this parish. Lea Green Hall, formerly belonging to the Vernon and Crewe families, is a brick residence, the property of Henry Done esq. and now occupied as a farm house. Minshull Hall, an ancient brick edifice, is also now a farm house. The parish comprises 2,325 acres of land, chiefly used for pasture, and 19 of water; rateable value, £4,015; the population in 1901 was 318.

The Council School (mixed), built in 1860 by the late Henry Brooke esq. & enlarged in 1896 by C. F. C. Luxmoore esq. was sold in 1905 to the Board of Education, under the Act of 1902: it will hold 130 children; average attendance, 75; Robert Kitchen, master; Mrs. Ada Kitchen, sewing mistress. In the year 1614 the Rev. Christopher Minshull left the interest of £200 for the support of a school, to which was added the interest of £50, by Mr. Wilbraham, of Dorfold Hall & £50 by other donors, for the same purpose; this money produces £3 per cent. yearly as interest. In 1870 Henry Brooke esq. bequeathed the sum of £200 to the vicar & churchwardens, the interest to be applied to the Church Minshull endowed school, & in the same will a further sum of £5 yearly for the maintenance of the school house & garden

CHURTON HEATH (or Bruera) is an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1868 from the parish of St. Oswald, Chester, 5 miles south-by-east from Chester and 2½ miles south from Waverton station on the Crewe and Chester section of the London and North Western railway, in the Eddisbury division of the county, lower division of the hundred and petty sessional division of Broxton, union of Tarvin, county court district of Chester, and in the rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The old name in a MS. in the British Museum is "Capella super Bruera," thence "Chapel on the Heath," "Church on the Heath," now called "Churton Heath." The ecclesiastical parish comprises the townships of Leacum-Newbold, on the south, Saughton, on the north, and Huntington, on the north-west. The church of St. Mary the Virgin (commonly called "the Church on the Heath") is an ancient edifice of red sandstone, supposed to date from the 10th century, having Saxon work in parts, a good deal of Norman and the remainder in Early English. The building, consisting of chancel, nave, south chapel, and a small western turret containing one bell: a fine Norman arch divides the chancel from the nave, but it has been greatly mutilated by the cutting away of the lower portion of the north side in order to admit of the erection of a pulpit: there are handsome mural monuments, with finely carved marble figures of cherubs unveiling medallion portraits in relief of Sir Ellis Cunliffe of Saughton bart. M.P. d. Oct. 1767: and of Sir Robert Cunliffe of Saughton bart. d. 1778. The church was thoroughly restored and enlarged at the expense of the late Duke of Westminster, under the direction of Mr. Walter M. Boden, architect, of Chester. During the removal of the plaster, several fragments of Saxon and Norman ornament have been discovered. There are 200 sittings. The register dates from the year 1645. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value, £151, including 18 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester, and is at present (1906) vacant. Thomas Henry Davies-Colley esq. is the sole landowner. The soil is heavy clay; subsoil, clayey; the land is chiefly pasture. The area is 133 acres; rateable value, £189; the population in 1901 was—township, 7; ecclesiastical parish, 485.

SAUGHTON (or Saigton) is a township and village 1 mile south-west from Waverton station, on the Crewe and Chester section of the London and North Western railway. Edward Richard Massie esq. of Minera Hall, Wrexham, who is lord of the manor and Hugh Aldersey esq. of Aldersey Hall, are the chief landowners. The soil is strong clay; the subsoil, clay. The land is chiefly in pasture, but oats are grown. The area of the township is 1,422 acres; rateable value, £2,174; the population in 1901 was—parish, 251, township, 103.

COMPSTALL (or Compstall Bridge) is a parish, formed in 1902, comprising the area of the ecclesiastical parish of Werneth, and is in the Hyde division of the county, Macclesfield hundred, Hyde petty sessional division and county court district, Stockport union, and is in the rural deanery of Mottram, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The village is picturesquely situated on the borders of Cheshire and Derbyshire, 5 miles east from Stockport, a mile and a half from Marple Junction station and 2 miles north-east from Romiley station, both on the Manchester and Hayfield section of the Great Central (late M. S. & L.) railway: the district is paved and well lighted with gas from works belonging to The Calico Printers' Association Limited; the water supply is derived from the neighbouring hills.

The Athenæum, erected about 1856, is an elegant building of stone in the Gothic style, comprising a public assembly room holding 700 persons and class rooms, and is also used for the purposes of the National school; adjoining it is a rotunda used in the summer months by the band belonging to the cotton mills. The inhabitants are principally supported by the cotton mills of The Calico Printers' Association Limited, which are on a very large scale, one of the principal motors being an overshot wheel: the reservoir assumes the proportions of a small lake, with the romantically-wooded banks of the Etherow beyond. On the Derbyshire side of the hamlet are some good private recreation and dancing grounds, attached to the Compstall Gardens inn, and the property of Lord Howard of Glossop. Ernecroft Hall, the residence of

George Henry Hill esq. is a fine old Tudor mansion, occupying an elevated and picturesque situation on the Derbyshire bank of the Etherow: Green Hill, now (1906) unoccupied, is a handsome modern edifice surrounded with well laid out grounds. The area of Compstall Urban District and civil parish is 873 acres of land and 30 of water; rateable value, £4,872; the population in 1901 was 875.

WERNETH is a village, adjoining Hyde on the south-east, 5 miles from Stockport, and extending to the river Etherow, which here divides the counties of Chester and Derby. From the rising ground called Werneth Low, the highest point in the county, very fine views are obtained of the Derbyshire hills and the surrounding country.

Werneth St. Paul is an ecclesiastical parish, formed May 24, 1841. The church, erected in 1840 by public subscription, is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, north-east porch and a tower on the north side containing a clock and one bell: there is a tablet to the memory of the founder, who died in 1855, and four memorial windows to other members of the Andrew family: in 1891 ten new windows were erected and a new font placed in the church at a total cost of £65: there are sittings for 700 persons. The register dates from the year 1841. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £145, with residence, in the gift

CONGLETON.

CONGLETON is a municipal borough, market and union town, on the banks of the river Dane and borders of Staffordshire, with a station on the North Staffordshire railway, and is the head of a county court district, 8 miles south-south-west from Macclesfield, 10 north-north-west from Lee, 9 north from Burslem, 12 north from Newcastle-under-Lyme, 32 from Chester, 48 from Derby, 2½ from Stafford, 2½ from Uttoxeter, 20 from Stockport, 1½ from Stoke-on-Trent, 14 from Buxton and 166 from London, in the Macclesfield division of the county, hundred of Northwich, Congleton section of

Northwich petty sessional division, rural deanery of Congleton, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The Macclesfield canal passes the east end of the town and has a wharf in Canal street.

The town is lighted with gas from works, erected in 1832, at Brook side, and belonging to the Corporation, and supplied with water from the forge works, and the district near the station and Mossley from Corda Well, Mow Cop. The principal streets are wide and paved and contain good houses and shops.

The first charter of incorporation, granted in the reign of Henry III. by Henry de Lacy, was afterwards confirmed by several monarchs, but the governing charter until 1835 was that granted by James I. in 1624-5. By the Municipal Corporations Act, 1835 (5 & 6 Wm. IV. c. 76), the town was divided into three wards, Dec. 7, 1835, and the Corporation now consists of six aldermen and eighteen councillors. A commission of the peace was granted to the borough in 1836, and there is a borough police force.

St. Peter's is an ecclesiastical parish, formed May 21, 1867, from the parish of Astbury. The church, in Chapel street, erected in 1742, is a rectangular structure of brick, with galleries on three sides, and consists of nave and aisles and a western tower with eight pinnacles, and containing an illuminated striking clock and 8 bells: the lower stage of the tower forms a porch: the organ was erected in 1824 at a cost of £1,000; above the reredos are two paintings on canvas of St. Peter and St. Paul: the church affords 1,253 sittings. The register of baptisms and burials dates from the year 1701, and of marriages from 1839. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £280, including 26 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Mrs. Hugh W. Williamson, eldest daughter of the late Thomas Rowland esq. of Overton, near Congleton, and held since 1891 by the Rev. Thomas Twistington Higgins M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin.

St. James's is an ecclesiastical parish, formed July 10, 1844, from the parish of Astbury. The church, in West street, erected in 1847-8, at a cost of £3,500, is a building of stone, in the Early English style, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave of six bays, aisles, north porch, vestries and a bell gable containing one bell: there is a richly carved pulpit of dark oak with the date 1600: the east window and four others are stained: the church affords 560 sittings. The registers date from the year 1842. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £300, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Ambrose Heygate M.A. of Keble College, Oxford.

St. Stephen's is an ecclesiastical parish, formed Aug. 1, 1845, from Congleton chapelry. The church, in Brook street, erected in 1860, at a cost of about £4,000, is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles and a bell gable containing one bell: there are several stained windows, and the church affords 650 sittings. The registers date from the year 1844. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £210, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1873 by the Rev. James Macleod Bannerman M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin.

MOSSLEY is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1846 from the parish of Astbury. The church of Holy Trinity, at Mossley Moss, about a mile and a half east from Congleton, was erected in 1844, and is an edifice in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, north and west porches and a bell gable containing one bell: there are two stained windows: the east window, designed by the late Sir E. Burne Jones Bart. was the gift of Alfred Meakin esq.: the other, and also the carved oak choir stalls, were presented by the Freemasons of Congleton, in memory of Samuel Blackshaw: the church, including a west gallery, will seat 366 persons. The registers date from the year 1844. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £160, with residence, in the gift of the rector of Astbury, and held since 1902 by the Rev. Maurice John Ransome B.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge.

The Catholic church, dedicated to St. Mary, in West road, erected in 1826, is a structure of brick, and has about 400 sittings: attached are day and Sunday schools and a residence for the priest, and a burial ground not now used. The Congregational church, in Antrobus street, erected in 1876-7, at a cost of £5,000, is a building of stone in the Geometric Gothic style, from designs by Mr. Sugden, architect, of Leek, and will seat about 600 persons: under the chapel are lecture and school rooms. The old Congregational chapel in Mill street is now the Masonic Hall.

The Methodist New Connexion chapel, in Queen street, erected in 1836-7, is of brick, and with galleries will seat about 500 persons.

The Primitive Methodist chapel, in Kinsey street, erected in 1821, was rebuilt in 1890, at a cost of £2,000, and with gallery will seat 550 persons: below the chapel are school and class rooms for 400 children. The Primitive Methodist chapel at Dane-in-Shaw, on the Biddulph road, erected in 1840, is a small building, having 120 sittings.

The Wesleyan Methodist chapel, in Wagg street, erected in 1808, and renovated in 1893, is a large building of red brick, seating 900 persons: a new minister's residence

has also been erected; the total cost amounted to £4,000, and there are attached schools. In Brook street is another small Wesleyan Methodist chapel, built in 1834, and seating 250 persons; and in Rood lane, a Wesleyan Methodist mission chapel, erected in 1886, and seating about 400 persons.

The Salvation Army use the old Baptist chapel, in Park street, a structure of brick, erected in 1822, and with galleries affording about 400 sittings.

The Unitarian Christian church, erected on the site of the old edifice in 1883, at a cost of about £2,000, affords sittings for 250 persons: adjoining are Sunday school buildings, erected in 1856, for 250 children.

St. Peter's Cemetery, situated on a lofty eminence a little south of the church of that name, has an area of 1 acre, and was opened for interments about 1842 and enlarged in 1894 by the addition of 1 acre.

The Town Hall, in High street, was built in 1864, at a cost of £8,000, from the designs of E. W. Godwin esq. on the site of the old Town Hall; the basement is used for the market, and the upper floor as magistrates' rooms, county court and municipal offices: in the centre is a tower 110 feet in height, containing 3 bells and a clock which strikes the hours and chimes the quarters: the façade is adorned with statues of H.M. Queen Victoria, Henry de Lacy, Earl of Lincoln, who first incorporated the borough, and Edward I. who granted its first charter: the building also includes an assembly room 75 feet long by 49 wide, and capable of holding 1,000 persons, with a gallery round three sides of the room for 200 persons: there is also a library and news rooms.

The municipal insignia comprise a great mace and lesser maces and a corporate and other seals. The great mace of silver-gilt is 3 feet 5½ inches in length and in general form resembles the usual late type: the staff is covered with a spiral pattern of oak foliage and acorns and divided into sections by gadrooned knobs; the foot knob, which is much larger, being handsomely wrought and terminating in double finial; four elegant open-work brackets support the mace head, the surface of which is divided into panels, containing respectively the borough arms, national badges, crowned, and the royal initials C.R. and immediately above is an encircling fillet, bearing the inscription "The Freedom of England by God's Blessing Restored to C.R. 1661;" the circlet, instead of the usual crosses and fleurs-de-lis, is formed of an intertwined cable, looped round small shields and other ornaments, and the usual arches of the crown are imitated by four ornate scrolls curling inwards and supporting a kind of mound, highly enriched and surmounted by a flattened orb with a plain cross: the chief interest of this mace lies in the fact that it was made in 1651, during the Commonwealth, when every kind of royal emblem was avoided, but on the Restoration, it was subjected to various alterations; the inscription receiving the addition "To C.R." and the date 1651 being changed into 1661; the royal badges and arms on the side and top of the mace head are affixed by screws; these alterations, it seems, cost £3. The smaller mace of silver, and 14 inches long, consists of a plain banded staff in three sections, with a bell-shaped head at either end, the upper being more richly ornamented, and bearing the royal arms of Jas. I. with the cypher I.R. The corporate seal, a very fine example of 15th century date, is of latten, circular in shape and 1½ inch in diameter, and has for a device a tun floating on the sea, between two conger eels hauriant, and surmounted by a lion of England; round the margin is a legend: the statute merchant seal of silver is oval and 1½ inch long; it bears a crowned rose with the cypher I.R. encircled by an inscription, and was re-cut in 1661. The corporation has also four halberds now carried in processions by the borough police, and an old china punch bowl. The mayor wears a robe of dark cloth with silk facings, presented by T. G. Sheldon esq. mayor in 1882-3; and the mayor's sergeant has also a gown and cocked hat.

In the rear of the Town Hall are butchers' shambles, the county and borough lock-ups for the confinement of prisoners and gaoler's house.

The Corporation Fire Brigade consists of 17 members, who have three engines and a hose cart, kept in the Market place.

The Masonic Hall, Mill street (formerly a Congregational chapel), was built in 1790, by Capt. Scott, a well-known evangelist. The lodge here was founded in 1846.

A charter was granted for a weekly market, to be held on Saturday, by Edward I. to Henry de Lacy, in the year 1272; and an annual fair of three days' duration to be held on the festival of the Holy Trinity: the fair has long been discontinued, but the market, though considerable, being so near to Macclesfield, is held every Saturday. The chief trade in corn is by sample: the

Corn market is held at the "Bull's Head," Mill street. Fairs are held here annually, viz. on the Thursday before Shrove-tide, the 12th of May, the 13th of July and the 22nd of November.

A cattle market and public auction is held in the Market square every alternate Tuesday.

The chief trades are the manufacture of silk and ribbon, silk throwing and spinning, fustian cutting and towel weaving and cigar and tobacco manufacturing, and for these industries there are extensive factories. Coach, chair and nail making and wood turning are also practised, and there are ropewalks, iron and brass foundries, agricultural implement and machine works, and in the vicinity, corn mills, gravel pits and stone quarries; these, unitedly, afford employment to a great number of the inhabitants.

A newspaper, called the "Congleton Chronicle" (with which is incorporated the "Congleton & Macclesfield Mercury") was established in 1855, and is published on Saturdays by R. Head, 11 High street, Congleton.

The "Congleton Guardian" (1899), a localised edition of the "Warrington Guardian," is published on Tuesdays and Fridays by Mackie and Co. Limited, Bridge street, Congleton.

Congleton is the head quarters of the 5th Volunteer Battalion, the Cheshire Regiment.

The Drill Hall, Albert street, erected in 1905, with dwelling house, at a cost of £2,000, for a sergeant-instructor; there are offices, mess and reading rooms, and a fine drill hall, 100 by 50 feet.

The Cottage Hospital, established in 1866 and supported by voluntary contributions, has 8 beds.

The charities, for distribution in bread, clothing and money, amount to about £270, yearly; including £62 from Holford's charity, and £93 yearly for the general uses of the poor from the Alsager's charity; the latter furnishes in addition £11 for apprenticing and the same for education; Parnell's gift of £2 yearly is for the clergy.

The public park and recreation ground, which consists of about 25 acres, is traversed by the river Dane, over which there is an iron bridge, and a second iron bridge was opened in 1906, and the park affords ample facilities for boating, cricket and bowls during the summer months; in the park are two pavilions, one for picnic parties and the other for the use of different athletic clubs.

The objects of interest in the neighbourhood of Congleton are Moreton Hall, Astbury church, Biddulph Grange, Eaton Hall, Bath Vale mineral spring, Moreton Hall, the Old Mill, Cloud End and Mow Cop. Cloud End is 1,190 feet and Mow Cop 1,091 feet above the level of the sea.

Heathfield is the residence of Mrs. Solly.

Sir Walter Geoffrey Shakerley bart. of Somerford Park, is the lord of the manor.

The area of the civil parish and municipal borough is 2,554 acres of land and 18 of water; rateable value, £34,800; the population in 1901 was 10,707, viz.: North ward, 3,778; South ward, 2,849, and West ward, 4,080.

SCHOOLS.

Free Grammar School, near St. Peter's church, was founded before the Reformation, the earliest existing record relating to repairs in 1553, & the position of the old school house on one corner of the churchyard of St. Peter's, would imply that the first master was a resident priest & the school a chantry for chorister boys. The corporation did all the repairs of the premises & claimed a general control over the institution until they were checked in 1643 by the Rev. Andrew Bowrey, then master, who refused to acknowledge their dismissal of him. During the Commonwealth a cordwainer named Hall was appointed the master, on the ground of his being, as stated in the records, a "scollar & godly man." The present school was built in 1814, & has an endowment of £16 yearly, being a fixed charge on the revenues of the corporation: there is also a special endowment of £500, the result of a general subscription in honour of the late Randle Wilbraham esq. on his completion, in 1848, of the 50th year of high stewardship of the borough, the income derived from which is devoted to the free instruction of three boys for ever, to be selected by the owner of Rode Hall for the time being; £1 is paid under the will of Dr. Hulme; & Samuel Maibon, of Oxford, apothecary, & son of a former master, left in 1789 a field worth £6 yearly for the master's use. All sons of burgesses are taught classics free, but fees are charged for other ordinary subjects, & the master is allowed to take boarders. The school is at present (1906) closed

MONKS COPPENHALL, see Crewe.

CRANAGE is a parish on the road from Holmes Chapel to Knutsford, 1 mile from Holmes Chapel station on the Crewe and Manchester section of the London and North Western railway, 5 miles north-west from Sandbach and 3½ east-north-east from Middlewich, in the Knutsford division of the county, Northwich hundred, Middlewich and Sandbach petty sessional division (Middlewich section), Congleton union and county court district. Cranage Hall, occupied by W. O. Carver esq. is a mansion of red brick and stone, standing in a well-wooded park of 90 acres, on the banks of the river Dane. The Rev. Canon John Richard Armitstead M.A. vicar of Sandbach, is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is loamy and sandy. The chief crops are pasture and wheat. The area is 1,964 acres

CREWE.

CREWE is a municipal borough, market town and railway centre, with a junction station on the main line of the London and North Western railway, 15½ miles from London, 3½ from Nantwich, 2½ from Chester, 5½ from Birmingham, 7½ from Coventry, 75 from Chesterfield, 63½ from Fleetwood, 5½ from Huddersfield, 80 from Leeds, 44½ from Liverpool, 73 from Leicester, 104 from Lincoln, 22½ from Macclesfield, 31½ from Manchester, 67 from Not-

tingham, 121½ from Peterborough, 53 from Preston, 84 from Rugby, 4½ from Sandbach, 25 from Stafford, 25½ from Stockport, 15 from Stoke-on-Trent, 24½ from Warrington, 38½ from Wigan and 40½ from Wolverhampton; from Crewe station lines of the above company diverge to Stockport and Manchester, also to Liverpool, Chester and North Wales, and to Shrewsbury and South Wales; the North Staffordshire railway has a line from

Stoke-on-Trent to this town, and there is a branch of the Great Western Railway from Market Drayton. The borough originally comprised the township of Monks Coppenhall, but, by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 11 Act), Nov. 9, 1892, the greater portion of Church Coppenhall, a small portion of Shavington-cum-Gresty, and also a small portion of Wistaston were added to the borough, which is in the Crewe division of the county, hundred, union and county court district of Nantwich, and in the rural deanery of Nantwich and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester.

Crewe was incorporated by charter granted April 27, 1877, the corporation now consisting of 7 aldermen and 21 councillors, from whom a mayor is selected; a commission of the peace was granted April 7, 1881: the town is well paved and lighted by electricity; gas is also supplied from works belonging to the London and North Western Railway Company, and water from works at Madeley and Whitmore, also the property of the company. The Corporation Sewage Farm, off West street, covers an area of 280 acres. Crewe has entirely grown up around the railway; not many years ago it consisted only of three or four farmhouses, and one of these, a structure of timber, plaster and thatch, with the date 1639 over the doorway, still remains, and is now occupied as a posting house. Hall o' th' Shaw was formerly the seat of the Shaws, and afterwards of the Foulhursts, and had originally a moat surrounding it; it is now a farmhouse.

St. Michael's is an ancient ecclesiastical parish, added to Crewe on Nov. 9, 1892, together with the greater portion of Church Coppenhall. The church of St. Michael was rebuilt in 1821 in red brick, but of this structure only the nave and tower, containing 3 bells, now remain, the remainder of the fabric having been entirely rebuilt of red brick, with stone dressings, in the Gothic style, from the plans of the late Mr. James Brooks, architect, of London; the church at present consists of chancel, transepts, organ chamber and side chapel, erected at a cost of upwards of £4,500; the old nave and tower have been removed, and are now (1906) in course of re-erection. The register dates from the year 1654. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £225, with residence and one acre of glebe, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1880 by the Rev. William Cawley Reid M.A. of Brasenose College, Oxford, and surrogate; area, 1,530 acres. An addition of 1½ acres to the parochial churchyard was made in 1871 at a cost of £850, and a further addition of a little over one acre in 1890 at a cost of £450: it is under the control of a burial board of 5 members, with the same rights reserved to the rector as he has over the original portion of the ground.

Christchurch is an ecclesiastical parish, formed Feb. 13, 1855; the church, standing in the centre of Moss square and erected in 1845 by the London and North Western Railway Company, is of brick, with stone dressings, in the Norman and Gothic styles, consisting of chancel, nave of five bays and an embattled western tower of stone, in the Gothic style, erected in 1878, with 4 pinnacles and containing a clock and 8 bells: it is surmounted by an elaborate iron flagstaff and vane manufactured at the works of the Railway Company: the chancel was added in 1901 at a cost of £1,000, and the north and south galleries were then removed: the organ was purchased in 1878 at a cost of about £700: the east window is stained, and there are sittings for 1,000. The register dates from the year 1845. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £355, with residence, in the gift of the directors of the London and North Western Railway Company, and held since 1902 by the Rev. Walter Bidlake M.A. of Exeter College, Oxford, and surrogate.

The church of St. John the Baptist, worked in connection with Christ Church, and erected in 1896 at the cost of £3,400, is a structure of red brick in the Romanesque style, consisting of chancel, nave, baptistery, added in 1905, and a turret containing one bell: there are sittings for 700 persons; the Rev. Samuel George Lloyd L.Th. of Hatfield Hall, Durham, has been curate in charge since 1903.

St. Barnabas is an ecclesiastical parish formed Oct. 20, 1885, out of St. Paul's; the church, in West street, erected in 1885, from the plans of Messrs. Paley and Austin, architects, of Lancaster, at a cost of about £5,000, on land given by the London and North Western Railway Company, is of red brick in the Perpendicular style, and consist of chancel, nave of three bays, aisles and a western turret containing one bell: there are sittings for 502 persons. The register dates from the year 1885. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £268, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1895 by the Rev. William Coleman Martin M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge.

St. Paul's ecclesiastical parish was formed Dec. 14, 1869; the church is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, south transept, organ chamber and a stone tower with spire erected at the north-east angle in 1888 at a cost of £750, and containing 8 tubular bells: a carved oak reredos was placed in the chancel by public subscription in 1889: the east window is stained, and the church affords 750 sittings. The register dates from the year 1869. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £240, with residence, in the gift of the directors of the London and North Western Railway Company, and held since 1879 by the Rev. Arthur Henry Webb M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge, surrogate, hon. canon of Chester and rural dean of Nantwich.

St. Andrew's Mission church is an iron structure in Bedford street; Rev. Eustace George Auden M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford, has been curate in charge since 1901.

The Catholic church, dedicated to St. Mary, in Gatefield and Delamere streets, erected in 1890 at a cost of £6,500, from the plans of Messrs. Pugin and Pugin, architects, of London, was opened in July, 1891; it is of red brick and Runcorn stone dressings, and consists of apsidal chancel with chapels, nave of five bays with clerestory, baptistery, north porch and a western tower with spire, 100 ft. in height, containing one bell: the magnificent altar of Caen stone and marble was executed by Messrs. Boulton and Son, of Cheltenham; there are sittings for 500 persons.

The Free Methodists, Methodist New Connexion, Independent Methodists, Baptists, Primitive Methodists, Presbyterians, Welsh Wesleyan Methodists, Catholic Apostolic Church, Free Christian Church, Congregationalists, Christadelphians, and Salvation Army have each places of worship here.

The Vestry Hall, Hightown, erected by subscription in 1893, in connection with St. Paul's church, at a cost of £1,100, will seat 200 persons, and is used for meetings &c.

A cemetery of 6 acres, formed in 1871, was enlarged in 1891 and 1895 to about 16 acres, and contains mortuary chapels for the Church of England, Dissenters and Catholics.

The borough and county police station, in Edleston road, and erected in 1876, is of brick, and consists of superintendent's house, lock-ups and court room in which the magistrates sit. The county court is also held here.

The Municipal Buildings, in Earle street, erected at a cost of about £2,000, and opened 19th July, 1905, are in the English Renaissance style from designs by Henry T. Hare F.R.I.B.A. and contain on the ground floor the offices of the borough accountant, rate collector, assistant overseer and sanitary inspector; on the first floor, the Mayor's parlour and reception rooms, Council chamber, two committee rooms and town clerk's offices; on the second floor are the offices of the borough surveyor, medical officer and director of education.

The Fire Station, in Beech street, is of Accrington brick with terra cotta dressings, from plans by the borough surveyor, and cost, including site, about £5,000; the equipment includes steam and manual engines, and all the necessary appliances.

The Post Office, in the Market square, a structure of red brick, was opened on 15th May, 1905, at a cost of £8,000, including site.

The meetings of the Town Council are held in the Council chamber of the Municipal buildings. The municipal insignia consists of a mace, a sword, a mayor's chain and badge and a corporate seal: the mace, of German silver-gilt, and manufactured in Birmingham, consists of a plain staff with dividing knobs and a goblet-shaped head, surmounted by a mural crown, with beaded arches; the sides of the mace head exhibit the arms of the borough, but there are no royal emblems: the sword, presented to the Corporation in 1877 by Mr. Thomas Watson, borough surveyor, is a modern weapon also of Birmingham manufacture, with a steel blade and German silver-gilt handle; but it does not appear that the borough has any right to possess a sword of state: the mayor's chain and badge are of gold and enamel; the chain, consisting of oblong links charged with shields and double C-shaped links, has in the centre a larger and more ornate link from which depends the badge, intended to be worn either with or without the chain; this ornament, in a strange burlesque of heraldry, exhibits a shield, on which are collected together representations of a pack-saddle nag, two people riding on a pillion, a stage coach and a canal boat; above the shield is a figure of a London and North Western engine and tender; and the combined effect of the whole is supposed to indicate the progress of locomotion: between this badge

and the chain has been added a gold medallion bearing an enamelled portrait of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, presented in 1887 by F. W. Webb esq. mayor: the borough seal is merely an embossing stamp. The mayor wears a robe of scarlet cloth with sable and velvet trimmings; the aldermen's gowns are similar but plainer.

The Market Hall, in Earle street, formerly the Cheese Hall, erected in 1854 by the late Mr. John Hill, of the Manor House, Wistaston, and purchased by the then Local Board in 1869 from his executors, is an edifice of brick in the Grecian-Doric style, 200 feet long, 76 feet wide and 25 feet in height; it is lighted from the roof, and has a tower, added in 1871, and containing a four-faced clock presented in memory of Mr. Hill. The Fish Market adjoining is beneath the Corn Exchange, and both are now under the control of the Crewe Corporation.

Market days, Mondays, Fridays, and Saturdays.

Crewe Cattle market, in Gresty road, built in 1883, is of red brick, and comprises offices, a restaurant, auction mart and a small clock tower, which with the pens cover an area of 5 acres. The market adjoins the main line of the London and North Western railway, and is connected with it by a siding. Cattle auctions and an open market are held every Monday and horse auctions monthly, three days, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

Crewe is the head quarters of the 2nd Cheshire (Railway) Royal Engineers (Volunteers).

The Lyceum Theatre, in Heath street, erected in 1887 at the cost of £7,000, from the plans of Mr. Alfred Derbyshire, architect, of Manchester, is a plain structure of brick, seated for 1,800 persons, and has an elaborately-fitted stage, furnished with every modern appliance. Ample provision has also been made for the speedy exit of the audience.

There are three flourishing masonic lodges in the town, viz. the Lodge of the Four Cardinal Virtues, 979, which meets on the Tuesday before the full moon of each month at the Royal hotel at six o'clock, and the Lodge of Unity, at the Crewe Arms hotel, on the last Wednesday in Jan. March, June and October at 3 o'clock, and the Chapter of Faith, at the Royal hotel, on the second Wednesday in Feb. April, October and December at 4 o'clock.

The prosperity of this town depends to a great extent upon the London and North Western Railway Co. whose locomotive engineering works were established here in 1843; they are the largest of the kind in the world, covering an area of 48 acres, and employing about 8,000 hands, in addition to which there are over 1,300 engine drivers, firemen and others occupied in the steam sheds at Crewe station, and the total space extends over 137 acres: in 1855, works for the manufacture of rails were established; these consist of forges and mills producing about 30,000 tons of rails yearly, and in 1864 additional buildings were erected for the manufacture of steel, which is now produced at the rate of about 30,000 tons yearly. Every part of the locomotive engines in use, with the exception of brass tubes and copper plates, is manufactured here, and the works include repairing shops, wheel, spring, fitting and turning and signal shops, forges, smithies and boiler shops; there are also brass and iron foundries, millwrights', joiners', pattern makers' and painting shops and saw mills. The office and works of the electrical signal and telegraph departments are in Gresty road, the telegraph section, recently removed from Stockport; and employs about 800 hands, including staff, in the signal department, 200 in the electrical, and 550 in the telegraph section. The company have built and own over 845 workmen's cottages, and they manufacture and supply gas to their works and the town, and provide water from Whitmore, 12 miles distant. The works are in three sections:—the Old works, the Deviation works and the Steel works; these are connected by the ordinary line and are also traversed in every part by a narrow gauge railway, 18in. wide, of a total length of about 5 miles. The railway station was rebuilt in 1867, and improved and enlarged in 1878, when new up and down lines with platforms and the necessary accommodation were constructed; since then large transhipping sheds, and 50 miles of extra sidings have been added, with additional engine sheds at the south end of the station. In 1906 the passenger station was again enlarged by the provision of a new island platform, with suitable buildings thereon. Adjoining the station is the Crewe Arms hotel, a spacious building in the Tudor style, containing numerous large and well-furnished apartments, and lit throughout with the electric light.

The Mechanics' Institution, in Prince Albert street, erected in 1846, and enlarged in 1901 now contains a large hall called the Town Hall, a news room, library, 15 spacious class rooms and an electrical laboratory; in the news rooms are portraits of the late F.

Trevithick esq. first president of the institution, who died 27th Oct. 1877, John Ramsbottom esq. second president, F. W. Webb esq. late president, and a medallion portrait of Sir Joseph Whitworth, subscribed for by the Whitworth Scholars and Exhibitors of the Institution. Evening classes for elementary subjects and science and art classes are held here in connection with the following examining bodies:—The Board of Education, the Society of Arts, the Union of Lancashire and Cheshire Institutes, and the City and Guilds of London Institute. Students in this institution are at liberty to compete for the Whitworth, Royal and other exhibitions, the Ramsbottom scholarship of £40 per annum, tenable for two years at the Victoria University, Manchester, and the Richard Moon scholarship of £80 per annum, founded by Sir Richard Moon, late chairman of the London and North Western Railway Company, and tenable at the Victoria University, Liverpool. Under the will of the late Mr. Bartholomew Kean, prizes to the value of about £8 annually are offered to youths under 17 years of age employed in the Locomotive Department of the L. & N. W. R. at Crewe. There is also a branch reading room in Goddard street.

The Public Baths, in Mill street, established in 1866 at the expense of the London and North Western Railway Company, are contained in a plain structure of red brick, and comprise Turkish baths, hot, cold and tepid baths and swimming and shower baths.

The Technical Institute and Municipal School of Art, at the junction of Flag lane and Richard Moon street, is a fine building of red brick, enriched with terra-cotta panels, in the English Renaissance style, and containing large class rooms and a lecture hall, lit throughout with the electric light; it was built in 1897 and is available for 500 students; evening classes in science and art, and various technological, commercial and domestic subjects are held throughout the summer and winter sessions. A day school of science was added in the year 1901, with laboratories for about 250 students. The building is also used as a pupil teachers' centre and for the purposes of secondary education.

The London and North Western Railway Hospital, in Mill street, was opened in 1901, and has 18 beds for accidental cases occurring on the railway and in the works.

The Isolation Hospital for Infectious Diseases, Middlewich street, opened by the Earl of Crewe, Oct. 16, 1897, is a structure of red brick, standing on an elevated position in five acres of land, and has separate wards for typhoid and scarlet fever, and an isolated block for the reception of doubtful cases; the cost of erection was nearly £10,000. In 1904, an additional ward for the treatment of diphtheria cases was added and contains 12 beds.

The Crewe Memorial Cottage Hospital, in Victoria avenue was established in 1895; a new children's ward was opened by Lady Annabel Crewe-Milnes, Nov. 6th, 1901; it provides beds for eight patients, and cost between £500 and £600; the total number of beds is 29.

Under the will of the late F. W. Webb esq. dated 22 May, 1903, a sum of £10,000 was bequeathed for the establishment of a nursing institution in Crewe, and the residue of his estate for the erection and endowment of an orphanage or home for the maintenance, education and residence of orphan children of workmen employed on the London and North Western Railway.

The Queen's Park, presented by the Railway Company, in commemoration of the Jubilee in 1887 of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, is at the west end of the town and approached by Victoria avenue or West street; it was opened in 1888 and comprises an area of 40 acres, with a lake, and is tastefully laid out and planted with trees; a clock tower and fountain have been erected by the workpeople of the company. In the park is a monument erected in 1904, at a cost of about £1,000, to the Crewe Volunteers engaged in the South African War, 1899-1902.

In connection with the park are three large enclosed spaces reserved for recreation, known as the "North Ward," "South Ward," and "West Ward Playgrounds."

The soil is clayey; the subsoil is also clay. The area of the Municipal borough (which is also the area of Monks Coppelhall civil parish) is 2,174 acres of land and 9 of water; rateable value, £168,198; the population in 1891 was 32,774 and in 1901, 42,074.

The population of the wards in 1901 was:—Central, 9,349; North, 10,160; South, 13,101; West, 9,464.

The population of the ecclesiastical parishes in 1901 was:—St. Michael, Coppelhall (parish church), 5,563; Christ Church, 14,821; St. Barnabas, 5,041; St. Paul, Coppelhall, 16,068.

CREWE GREEN is a parish, formed Sept. 8, 1857, from the civil parish of Barthomley and township of Crewe, one mile east from Crewe station, 5 miles north-east from Nantwich, in the Crewe division of the county, hundred and petty sessional division and union of Nantwich, county court district of Crewe, rural deanery of Congleton, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Michael, erected in 1858, is an edifice of brick and stone in the Gothic style, from designs by the late Sir G. Gilbert Scott, of London, and consists of chancel, nave and a western turret containing one bell. The register dates from the year 1858. DARESBURY is a village and parochial chapelry, constituted 27 Feb. 1880, with a station in Moore township, on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railway, and is on the road from Chester to Warrington, $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-west from Warrington and $5\frac{1}{2}$ north-east from Frodsham, in the Knutsford division of the county, hundred of Bucklow, petty sessional division of Daresbury, union of Runcorn, county court district of Warrington, in the rural deanery of Frodsham and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of All Saints is a building of stone, in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, a chapel or chancel at the east end of the south aisle, rebuilt by the lord of the manor in 1773, north and south porches, and an embattled western tower with pyramidal roof, containing a clock and 6 bells: this church, under the name of the "White Chapel of England," was the subject of some of the remarkable predictions of William or Robert Nixon, an illiterate and half-witted "prophet," said to have lived in the reign of Edward IV. and believed to have been a native of Over; his prophecies, which are adopted by Fielding, in his "Tom Jones," and also mentioned by the historian. Oldmixon, were published in Manchester, in 1873: the south-east chapel originally belonged to the Brookes family, of Mere, but has since been added to the Daresbury estate, and was again rebuilt at the restoration of the church in 1870-2: there are memorials to the families of Byrom, and Cooke, of Moore, and to the Rev. Joseph Blackburn, 32 years incumbent here, d. 20 June, 1787; and a fine monument of white marble, with symbolical figures by John Gibson R.A. to Sarah, wife of Henry Byrom esq. d. 7 Feb. 1833; as well as brasses to Gen. Peter Heron, and Catherine, his wife, placed in 1804; and to Mary (Claughton), first wife d. 4 Dec. 1861 of Sir Gilbert Greenall M.P. d. 1894, and the Ven. Richard Greenall M.A. archdeacon of Chester, d. 27 Nov. 1867: the church was restored under the direction of Messrs. Paley and Austin, architects, of Lancaster, and consecrated 1870-2, and the sanctuary floor has since been relaid with mosaic in memory of the Rev. Henry Taprell Clark M.A. vicar here 1895 to 1901: the church affords 500 sittings. The register dates from the year 1617. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value, £240; in the gift of Sir Gilbert Greenall bart. and held since 1905 by the Rev. Thomas Thorp Lee-Jones M.A. of University College, Oxford. Bennett's charity of £3 19s. yearly value is for distribution in bread; Miss Williams's charity of £2 15s. for the poor of Daresbury is invested with the Charity Commissioners; Hinton's charity of £3 7s. 6d. yearly has now lapsed; Betty Acton's charity of £2 10s. yearly is for coal for the poor of Moore; Hall lane charity of £3 7s. 6d. yearly; Mrs. Wood's Hatton charity of £16 os. 8d. yearly, being the interest on £500, is for coal and clothing for the poor of Hatton. Daresbury Hall, the residence of Frank Tinsley esq. is a mansion of brick, erected about 1760. Sir Gilbert Greenall bart. of Walton Hall, is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is sandy, and the subsoil red sandstone. The chief crops are wheat, oats, barley and potatoes. The area of the township is 607 acres; rateable value, £1,666; the population in 1901 was 153; population of parish 1901, 1,598.

DAVENHAM (formerly called Daneham) is a parish, township, and compact village, on the road from Northwich to Middlewich, 2 miles south-south-east from the former place and 4 north-west from the latter, and about 2 miles from Hartford station on the London and North Western and Cheshire Lines railways, in the Northwich division of the county, hundred, union and county court district of Northwich, petty sessional division of Leftwich, rural deanery of Middlewich and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The township lies between the rivers Dane and Weaver: the church and portion of the village are in the township of Leftwich. The church of St. Wilfrid, entirely rebuilt at various times within the period 1850-80, is an edifice of stone in the Decorated style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, transepts, south porch, and an embattled western tower with pinnacles and a lofty octagonal spire, and containing a clock and 6 bells: there are 15 stained windows, including one erected in 1890 to the Rev. Canon Thomas France-Hayhurst M.A. rector (1830-84), d. 1889: the church affords about 650 sittings. The register dates from the year 1560. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £400, with 9 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Col. C. H. France-Hayhurst, and held since 1904 by Rev. George Russell Sanders M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. The Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1856, is a structure of brick, and affords sittings for 200 persons. The Congregational chapel, used by the Primitive Methodists, is a small edifice, built in 1852. The Liberal Club, erected in 1886, contains a library and reading room and is well supplied with books and periodicals. The Constitutional Club comprises a reading room and a library of 900 volumes; the members now (1906) number about 172. The club is managed by a committee of 15 members. Vickers' charity of about £13 yearly is for apprentice fees; the poor's land of 18a. 3r. 27p. together with Oldfield and Brook's gifts, provide £60 a year for the poor, and Wrench's charity furnishes £6 13s. 4d. for distribution in money, which is given in sums of 6s. 8d. to poor householders born and living in the parish. Davenham Hall, now (1906) unoccupied, is a spacious mansion, standing in a well-wooded park, about half a mile south of the village. At an early date the estates in this locality were annexed to the barony of Shipbrook, and were afterwards divided into the manors of Over and Nether Davenham, at that period vested in the Brett family, from whom they passed by marriage to the Holfords, a family long resident here: Allen Holford, the last male heir, alienated his estates to Thomas Ravenscroft, his brother-in-law, on whose death, in 1795, the property was purchased by William Harper esq. of Liverpool. The manor is now vested in Colonel C. H. France-Hayhurst, of Bostock Hall, who is also the chief landed proprietor. The area of the township is 496 acres, chiefly applied to dairy purposes; rateable value, £2,893; the population in 1901 of the ecclesiastical parish was 4,024, and of the township, 706.

BOSTOCK is a township and pleasant village, in the parish of Davenham, on the road from Middlewich to Warrington, 2½ miles north-west from Middlewich station on the Crewe and Acton Bridge branch of the London and North Western railway, in the Middlewich section of Middlewich and Sandbach petty sessional division. The descendants of Osmerus, Lord of Bostock, in the time of William I. adopted the name of the township as their surname, and this lordship was held by them for some centuries; another branch of this family settled at Abingdon, Berks, and built a house on the Fitzharris estate, now the property and residence of Mrs. J. H. Clarke, of Boar's Hill Heath, near Abingdon, in which are some panelled rooms with the Bostock arms, and several members of the family were mayors of Abingdon. Towards the latter part of the 15th century an heiress of the Bostocks brought it in marriage to the Savages; it was afterwards vested in the Whitmores of Apsley, who sold it to William Tomkinson esq. and from his nephew, Edward Tomkinson esq. it was acquired by Thomas France esq. in 1793. Bostock Hall, erected in 1775, is a handsome mansion of brick, standing in an extensive and well-wooded park, formerly the property of the France family, and now of their representative, Col. Charles Hosken France-Hayhurst J.P., D.L. The site of the old hall, taken down in 1803, is now occupied by a farm house. A new water supply was provided in 1905 by Col. C. H. France-Hayhurst D.L., J.P. at a cost of about £400. At Bostock Green stood an ancient oak tree, now cut down, said to have been there placed to mark the centre of the county; another oak was, however, planted in its place in 1887, the Jubilee year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, three generations of the France-Hayhurst family being present. The area is 1,152 acres of land, producing wheat, oats, potatoes, turnips and some pasture, and 13 of water; the rateable value is £2,116; the population in 1901 was 197.

EATON (anciently called Ayton) is a township on the river Weaver, in the parish of Davenham, 2½ miles south-west from Northwich, and is intersected by the London and North Western railway, which has a station at Hartford about a mile and a half distant. The manor of Eaton was originally divided between the Fraed and Bulkeley families. Thomas Bulkeley, in the time of Henry VIII. sold his share to the Breretons, who subsequently became the proprietors of the entirety of the manor. Previous to the year 1672, however, the estates became by purchase the property of the Cholmondeley family, and the manor is now vested in Lord Delamere, of Vale Royal, who is the sole proprietor of the township. Eaton Hall is now occupied as a farmhouse. The area is 438 acres of land and 17 of water; rateable value, £3,393; the population of the township in 1901 was 26.

RUDHEATH is a township, chapelry and lordship in the parishes of Davenham, Great Budworth and Sandbach, about 2 miles south-east from Northwich, on the road from Newcastle, Staffs, to Northwich. The chapel of ease, near Broken Cross, attached to Davenham church, is a small building, erected in 1835, in which divine service is held every Sunday afternoon, except on the last Sunday in the month when it is held at 10.30 a.m. Rudheath lordship is intersected by the Grand Trunk Canal. The heath, now inclosed, contains many good modern

farmhouses and extensive plantations. On the 22 February, 1643, an engagement took place here between the Royal and Parliamentary forces, the result being indecisive. The manors of Drakelow and Rudheath formerly belonged to the Drakelow family, and having been forfeited by the attainer of John Drakelow were for some time vested in the Crown, and then granted to the Bentincks, dukes of Portland, from whom they were afterwards purchased by Thomas Marshall esq. are now held by Col. C. H. France-Hayhurst, of Bostock Hall, who is lord of the manor of Drakelow and Col. Thomas Horatio Marshall, of Bryn-y-Cood, Bangor, who is lord of the manor of Rudheath. By Local Government Board Order 22,879, dated March, 1889, detached parts of this township have been added to the townships of Cranage, Twemlow, Stublach and Hulse, and a detached part of Stublach township transferred to Davenham. The lordship comprises 2,273 acres of land, chiefly applied to pasturage and grain, and 25 of water; rateable value, Rudheath and Shurlach, £6,124; the population in 1901 was 954.

SHIPBROOK (or Shipbrooke), comprising only a few farmhouses, is $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-south-east from Northwich station and about 3 south from the station at Hartford, both on the London and North Western and Cheshire Lines Joint railways, and in 1892 was by Order of the County Council confirmed by Local Government Board Order No. 28,045, annexed to Whatcroft township. According to Ormerod, the historian of Cheshire (1819), this place was formerly the seat of the Barons Vernon; Richard de Vernon, the first of the family who settled at Shipbrook, being one of the barons of Hugh de Abrincis, surnamed Lupus, created by the Conqueror in 1070. Earl of Chester: Warin Vernon, 5th baron, who had married one of the co-heiresses of the Barons of Wich Milbank, Nantwich, who left three daughters, co-heiresses, married into the families of Wilbraham, Stafford and Littlebury: Ralph Vernon, rector of Hanwell, younger brother of Warin, had a long law-suit with his nieces concerning the barony, and it was eventually determined that Ralph should have one-half of the baronial estate, including Shipbrook, the seat of the barony, and the manor of Minshull Vernon, which estate is said to have been settled, by deed, on his illegitimate son, Sir Ralph Vernon, who lived to the extraordinary age of 150 years, as appears by various law proceedings bearing on the estates, in which and in the pedigrees of the family he is styled "the old" and the "old liver," and he was one of the witnesses in the famous Scrope and Grosvenor controversy, in the reign of Richard II. This Ralph married, first, Mary, daughter of Lord Dacre, and secondly, Maude Grosvenor, widow of John Hatton, who on one side is described as his second wife and on the other as his concubine; in the year 1325 he made a settlement, upon the marriage of Sir Ralph, his grandson, with Agnes, daughter of Richard Damory: by this deed, in the event of failure of male issue from Sir Ralph and Agnes, the Vernon estates were settled upon Richard, eldest son of the above mentioned Sir Ralph "the old," by Maude Grosvenor, passing by Thomas, a younger son by Lord Dacre's daughter, whose descendant, James Vernon, some time afterwards contested the validity of the deed, and after considerable litigation appears to have effected a compromise. At a subsequent date, a moiety of the barony, with the manor of Shipbrook, was transferred in marriage to the Savage family, and in the early part of the last century these were purchased by Richard Vernon esq. who procured an Act of Parliament in 1764 for the sale of this estate, which he disposed of to Mr. Tomkinson, of Liverpool, from whom it was purchased by William Harper esq. Colonel C. H. France-Hayhurst of Bostock Hall, is the present lord of the manor and sole proprietor. Shipbrook Hall is now a farmhouse. The land is applied to pasture; a little grain is also cultivated here.

DELAMERE is a parish formed out of Delamere forest under the Inclosure Act, 52 Geo. III. c. 136 (1812), and comprising the townships of Delamere, Eddisbury and Oakmere in the East division, and Kingswood in the West division of the hundred of Eddisbury, within the once extensive Forest of Delamere, which originally included 50 townships within its boundary, and was called the Forest of Mara in Mondrum, extending nearly to Nantwich, but the greater part is now inclosed and cultivated. Previous to the Inclosure Act the whole was common land and extra-parochial: about 4,000 acres are now timbered, some portion of which lies in each of the above-named townships. The township of Delamere is on the road from Northwich to Chester, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles south from the Delamere station on the Cheshire Lines railway, and $\frac{1}{2}$ south-west from the Acton Bridge station of the London and North Western railway, $\frac{7}{8}$ south-west from Northwich, 10 east-north-east from Chester, 5 north from Tarporley and 176 from London, in the Eddisbury division of the county, Northwich union and county court district, and petty sessional division and hundred of Eddisbury, rural deanery of Middlewich and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. This place gives the title of baron to the Cholmondeley family, Thomas Cholmondeley esq. of Vale Royal having been so created 17 July, 1821. The church of St. Peter, erected in 1817, is a small building of white freestone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, transepts, south aisle with porch, vestry and an embattled western tower, containing one bell and a clock, placed in 1807, at a cost of £100, in commemoration of the Diamond Jubilee of her late Majesty Queen Victoria: the church was restored in 1878, at a cost of £1,400, when the south aisle was re-seated and most of the windows renewed. A stained east window has been erected by Major James Tomkinson M.P. of Willington Hall, as a memorial to the late Mrs. Tomkinson: a new organ was provided in 1891, at a cost of £135: the church affords 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1817. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £150, including 150 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of the Crown, and held since 1889 by the Rev. Samuel Ward Payne LL.D. of Trinity College, Dublin. There is a Presbyterian chapel of brick, erected 1816, and a Methodist New Connexion chapel. The manor belongs to the Crown; the Crown, the Earl of Haddington K.T. Major James Tomkinson M.P. of Willington Hall, Willington, the Earl of Shrewsbury, Sir Philip H. B. Grey Egerton bart. of Oulton park and J. W. Kenworthy esq. of Hurst Hall, Ashton-under-Lyne, are the chief landowners. There are sandstone quarries in the neighbourhood. The soil is sandy; the subsoil, various—clay and stony; the chief crops are wheat, barley, oats and potatoes. The population of the township of Delamere in 1901 was 612 and of the ecclesiastical parish, 1,464; the area is 1,960 acres of land and 9 of water; rateable value, £4,114.

EDDISBURY is a township of scattered houses in the Forest of Delamere, $\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Delamere church, and one south-east from Mouldsworth station on the Cheshire Lines railway, in the union and county court district of Northwich and giving its name to the hundred. In this township is included the Old Pale, or Chamber of the Forest. On Eddisbury Hill, which is 500 feet high, traces of earthworks and fortifications of considerable extent are still visible. KINGSWOOD is a township formed by the Inclosure Act of 1812, in the north-western part of the Forest of Delamere, in the union and county court district of Runcorn, about 4 miles north-west from Delamere church. The Liverpool Sanatorium for the open air treatment of consumption, situated here, standing in grounds of some forty acres, with a south-west aspect and at a height of 500 feet above the sea level, overlooking the valley of the Dee, the city of Chester and the Welsh hills, is a fine structure of red brick with sandstone facings, erected at a cost of £15,000, defrayed by the late Lady Willox and W. P. Hartley esq. of Southport, and opened by the Countess of Derby, Oct. 18, 1901: it affords 40 beds. Divine service is held at the sanatorium every Sunday by Church of England and Free Church ministers, during alternate months, there being no endowment. The sanatorium is maintained by subscriptions and the payments of patients. The Crossley Sanatorium, situated in Delamere Forest in this township, occupies a site of some sixty-six acres, with a south aspect and at an elevation of 480 feet above sea level, and commands magnificent views of the

Cheshire plains and distant mountain scenery. The Sanatorium, the facade of which is 300 feet long and three storeys in height, was opened on March 31st, 1905, and is available for 90 patients. The building contains two large recreation or day rooms, a spacious dining hall, used also for entertainments, wards for four or six beds, single bed rooms, bath and douche rooms, and operating theatre, research block, a nurses' home, and a chapel, in which a Church of England chaplain conducts Divine service on Sundays. Attached to the Sanatorium are stables, a laboratory, engine and pump houses, a laundry and kitchens, and to the south of the building, in the grounds, are numerous shelters, some fixed and others revolving; these are provided with lounge chairs, tables and electric light, so that patients can sit out and read in dark evenings. The Sanatorium is $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles from Mouldsworth station and 4 from Frodsham. The principal part of this township is in the possession of the Crown. The Crown and Charles Bell esq. of Norley Hall, Norley, are the landowners. The soil is a light, sandy loam. In 1901 it contained 248 inhabitants and 1,910 acres of land and 8 of water; rateable value, £3,400.

DISLEY, or Disley-Stanley, on the high road from Manchester to Buxton, in Derbyshire, is a township, village and parish, formed July 23rd, 1558, from the civil parish of St. Mary, Stockport, with a station on the Stockport and Buxton section of the London and North Western railway, and is $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles south-east from Stockport, in the Knutsford division of the county, hundred of Macclesfield, petty sessional division of Stockport, Hayfield union, county court district of Chapel-en-le-Frith, rural deanery of Stockport, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. Water is supplied by the Stockport Corporation Waterworks. The church of St. Mary the Virgin is an ancient building of stone in the Gothic style, with a parapet surmounted by pinnacles, and consists of chancel, nave of four bays, aisles and an embattled western tower with porch, and containing a clock and 6 bells: there is a brass eagle lectern, the gift of Lord Newton, of Lyme Park, and a pulpit of stone and alabaster, presented by W. B. Stott esq. in memory of his wife Amelia, who died in 1868; the carved stone font was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Mackie, of New Mills: the east window is stained and represents in the upper portion the history of St. Elizabeth of Hungary; below are 6 panels of German glass dating from 1535 and illustrating the events in the life of our Lord; this glass was purchased by the late Thomas Legh esq. and given by him to the church: the church was partly restored and reseated in 1870, and completed in 1882 at a total cost of about £1,030, the organ being also thoroughly restored at a further cost of £350; there are 846 sittings, 400 of which are free. The register dates from the year 1591. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £220, in the gift of Lord Newton, and held since 1859 by the Rev. Charles James Satterthwaite M.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge, surrogate and hon. canon of Chester. There is a Wesleyan chapel here, founded in 1805; a new chapel is now (1906) in course of erection. The Baptist chapel is a small building, erected in 1893. Ouff's charity and the poor's land of 3a. 2r. 3op. together provide £5 yearly for bread. Here is a county police station, with one sergeant and two constables. In the village is a stone fountain, erected in 1834 by Richard and Thomas Orford esqrs. for the use of the inhabitants of Disley, and inclosed within iron railings. Lord Newton, of Lyme Park, who is lord of the manor, and Col. Edward T. D. Cotton-Jodrell C.B. of Reaseheath Hall, are the principal landowners. The soil is clayey and sand; subsoil, mostly rock. The chief crops are oats and potatoes, but the principal portion of the land is pasture. The area is 2,419 acres of land and 47 of water; rateable value, £15,954; the population in 1901 was

2,827 in the civil and 4,347 in the ecclesiastical parish. The estimated civil population in 1906 was 3,100.

Newtown, a district, formerly in Disley township, has been, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894," transferred for civil purposes to Derbyshire, but is still ecclesiastically attached to Disley.

DODDINGTON is a small township, 3 miles from Betley Road station on the main line of the London and North Western railway from Crewe to Stafford and 5 south-east from Nantwich, and in 1840 was formed into a parish from the civil parish of Wybunbury; it comprises Checkley, Hunsterson and Bridgemere, in the Crewe division of the county, hundred, union, county court district and petty sessional division of Nantwich and rural deanery of Nantwich and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. John, erected in 1837 by Sir John Delves Broughton bart. who died in 1847, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, occupying a pleasant site on the west side of Doddington Park, and consists of chancel, nave, porch and a turret containing one bell, and contains an organ: the interior was redecorated and furnished about 1891, at a cost of over £100, and now affords sittings for 170 persons. The register dates from the year 1838. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £202, in the gift of Sir Delves Louis Broughton bart. and held since 1880 by the Rev. DODLESTON (or Doddleston) is a township and parish, 2 miles from Kinnerton station on the Chester and Denbigh section of the London and North Western railway, 1 from Balderton station on the Chester and Wrexham line of the Great Western railway, 5 south-west from Chester, 7½ north from Wrexham, and 175 miles from London, in the Eddisbury division of the county, Broxton hundred, petty sessional division of Chester Castle, Chester union and county court district, and rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Mary is an edifice of red sandstone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, north aisle, north porch and an embattled western tower containing

a clock and 5 bells; Sir Thomas Egerton, Baron Ellesmere and Viscount Brockley, and Lord Chancellor, 1603-17, was interred here on his death at York House, Strand, 15 March, 1617, where he had been visited by the king himself on the 3rd of the same month. Lord Ellesmere was also chancellor of the University of Oxford, 1610-17; there is a nameless inscription on white marble over his grave, but a plain marble tablet was erected near the spot with full epitaph in 1829; the lectern was presented in 1904 by parishioners and friends, as a memorial to the Rev. Charles Gordon M.A. rector, 1867-1904: the church was restored in 1870 at a cost of about £3,500, and affords 300 sittings. The register

dates from the year 1570. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £253, with 34 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Alan Philip Wood M.A. of Keble College, Oxford. There is a Primitive Methodist chapel here, built about 1867. Charities of about £16 yearly value are distributed in money to the poor at Christmas; and there is also Dicky's gift of £1 14s. for bibles for the poor. The Duke of Westminster is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The soil is clayey; subsoil, clayey. The land is chiefly in pasture. The area of the township is 1,673 acres; rateable value, £4,705; the population in 1901 was—township, 307 and parish, 788, of which 354 were in Flintshire.

DUKINFIELD, anciently called "Dockenfeld," is a town and populous municipal borough, within the parliamentary borough of Stalybridge, adjoining Ashton-under-Lyne and Stalybridge, with a station on the Great Central (late M. S. & L.) railway, 6 miles east from Manchester and 185 from London, in the Hyde division of the county, hundred of Macclesfield, Ashton-under-Lyne union and county court district, Dukinfield petty sessional division, rural deanery of Mottram, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. Dukinfield was constituted a Local Board of Health District in 1857, and an Urban District in 1895. By the "Local Government Boards Provisional Orders Confirmation Act (No. 11) 1898" it was wholly placed in Cheshire, and the boundary altered; in 1899 it received a Charter of Incorporation, dated 2 Oct. in that year, and is now governed by a Corporation consisting of 6 aldermen and 18 councillors. The borough is divided into east, west and central wards, and is bounded on the north and west by the river Tame, which separates it from Lancashire, and by the above Act the bridge over the river to Ashton-under-Lyne became a county bridge. The borough was very much benefited by the "Public Works Act, 1863" (26 and 27 Vict. c. 70), and under the "Stalybridge, Hyde, Mossley and Dukinfield Tramways and Electricity Board Act, 1901" has joined with the other Corporations in a scheme of electric tramways and lighting. The place is lighted with gas from works at Wood End, belonging to the Corporation, and supplied with water from reservoirs, the property of the Ashton-under-Lyne, Stalybridge and Dukinfield Waterworks Joint Committee of 16 members, 3 of whom represent the Corporation. The Dukinfield reservoir holds 33,000,000 gallons, the others have a much greater capacity. By the "Representation of the People Act, 1867," Dukinfield was joined with Stalybridge in returning one member to Parliament. St. Mark's is an ecclesiastical parish formed Feb. 13, 1846, from the parish of Stockport; the church, erected in 1848, is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of six bays, aisles, north and south porches and an embattled tower on the north-west, with pinnacles, and containing one bell, erected in 1881, at a cost of about £2,000; the organ was erected in 1866 and the stained east window in 1887, as a memorial to the Rev. William Heffill, vicar 1845-82: there are 700 sittings. The register dates from 1848. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £312, with a quarter of an acre of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Godfrey Michael Vincent Hickey B.A. of Queen's College, Oxford.

St. Luke's is an ecclesiastical parish formed 18 May, 1906, from St. John and St. Mark. The church in King street, erected in 1889, is a building in the Early English style, consisting of nave with lofty arcades in seven bays, apsidal sanctuary, and organ chamber: the church affords 720 sittings. The register dates from the year 1875. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £180, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1903 by the Rev. William Graham M.A. of Durham University. The Unitarian chapel, of Chapel hill, built in 1840, replaces an earlier chapel erected by Non-conformists in 1707, and is a lofty cruciform structure in the Early English style. The Catholic church, in Zetland street, dedicated to St. Mary, erected in 1825, and rebuilt in 1854, is an edifice of red brick in the Early English style, and will seat 500 persons. The Primitive Methodist chapel, in Foundry street, erected in 1877, is of red brick with stone dressings; the Primitive Methodist chapel, in Astley street, erected in 1872; and the Congregational chapel, Crescent road, are of the same material, and seat 900 persons. The Congregational chapel, Dukinfield Hall, incorporates the chancel and nave of the old domestic chapel, to which in 1872 a considerable addition was made on the north side of the nave, at right angles to the ancient fabric, chiefly at the expense of Abel Buckley esq. of Dukinfield and the late Mr. Hugh Mason: the new building, which is in the Gothic style, now forms the body of the chapel, the old nave being at the south end, and the chancel, continued from it, is now a kind of south-east transept: a north-east porch was added in 1873 at the sole expense of Robert Platt esq. of Stalybridge: in the chancel of the old part are flat stones inscribed to Sir Robert Dukinfield, 1st bart. d. 6 Nov. 1729, and to Susanna, his daughter, d. 21 Jan. 1722; a third, to his daughter Martha, d. 13 Sept. 1723, has been lost since 1881. An organ was erected 6 Oct. 1901, at a cost of £300. The chapel affords 500 sittings. The cemetery for Dukinfield and Ashton-under-Lyne, belonging jointly to the Corporations of these boroughs, and situated on an eminence overlooking the valley of the Tame and within the borough of Dukinfield, consists of about 40 acres and has two mortuary chapels, one for the Church of England and Nonconformists and the other for the Catholics. The cemetery is managed by a joint committee of the two Corporations.

Dukinfield in 1801 was but an agricultural hamlet, with a population of 1,737; but in 1881 the population in the Urban area alone, irrespective of the portion within Stalybridge, was 17,408; this increase was principally due to the great facilities it affords for manufactures; the

river Tame flows for three miles through it and its canal and railway communication is ample and efficient. The manufacture of cotton is carried on to a great extent, and there are also engineering, boiler making and other iron works, fire brick and tile works, and others for calico printing, hat making &c. The Town Hall, erected in 1899, occupies a fine site on rising ground in King street, and is an edifice of brick with stone dressings, in the Domestic Gothic style, from designs by Messrs. John Eaton, Sons & Cantrell, architects, of Ashton-under-Lyne. The principal front is relieved by a spacious porch, above which rises a tower with spire, containing a clock with chimes, by J. B. Joyce & Co. of Whitechurch, and 5 bells cast by Taylor & Co. of Loughborough. The ground floor is occupied by the various municipal offices, and on the first floor, reached by a wide staircase, with stained windows, is the Council chamber and mayor's parlour; the basement contains other offices, a fire brigade and ambulance station, and store rooms &c. The Dukinfield Village Library was established about 1833; the present building, in Town lane, erected by subscription in 1853 and enlarged in 1875 at the expense of F. D. Astley esq. at a total cost of about £3,000, is a structure of brick with stone dressings in the Elizabethan style, and contains reading rooms and a library of upwards of 8,000 volumes; a new wing was added in 1895 for Technical education, at a cost of £4,000. In 1894 the District Council assumed the management both of the Library and Technical schools, and the Village Library became a Free Library in 1905; the yearly average of students attending the classes is now (1906) 700, and the lectures are very popular. The Reform Club, in Town lane, erected in 1874 at the expense of Nathaniel Buckley esq. J.P. late M.P. for Stalybridge and Dukinfield, is an edifice of brick from designs by the late Mr. George Thompson, of Dukinfield, architect, and contains a reading room, billiard room and other apartments; there were in 1901 250 members, and the club is managed by a committee of nine members. The Conservative Club, in Oxford road, erected by a company of the shareholders in 1872-3, is of brick in the Elizabethan style, from designs by Messrs. John Eaton and Sons, architects, of Ashton-under-Lyne, and comprises a reading room, billiard room and large hall for entertainments, holding 500 persons; there were in 1901 150 members and the club is managed by a committee of nine members. The Central Liberal Club, in King street, erected in 1877, is also of brick, and contains reading, billiard and committee rooms; the total number of members is about 200, and the club is managed by a committee of 17 members. The Central Conservative Club, in King street, erected in 1905 is a structure of red brick and contains reading, billiard and committee rooms &c. The rifle range of the Rifle Volunteers, near the hunter's tower, Hough hill, was presented by the late Francis Dukinfield Palmer Astley esq. (d. 1868) and is 100 yards in extent.

Dukinfield Park and Recreation Ground comprises an area of over 10 acres in extent, situated on the western

slope of Chapel Hill, and has been purchased and laid out for this purpose by the Corporation. The whole site is enclosed, and has four entrances, the principal being in King street and Grenville street, where there are solid stone piers with wrought-iron ornamental gates. The contour of the land having a gradient in places of 1 in 10 and falling something like 80 feet from east to west, is laid out in terraces, with flights of stone steps and a balustrading, and in the centre terrace is a fountain, the gift of Mrs. J. F. Astley-Cheetham, and a full-rigged mast, the gift of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Nicholson, lord and lady of the manor. The upper portion forms a promenade laid out with flower beds, and immediately below is a sheltered bowling green. The gymnasium or playgrounds on the south side are provided with swings &c. The whole of the works have been carried out by Messrs. W. Underwood and Brother, contractors, of Dukinfield, under the supervision and according to plans prepared by the borough surveyor, Mr. S. Hague, at an estimated cost of £15,000.

Dukinfield Hall, an ancient mansion, now partially demolished, was formerly the seat of the family of the same name, baronets; but the title became extinct on the death (24 Jan. 1858) of the Rev. Sir Henry Robert Dukinfield, 7th bart. without issue. One of the earlier members of the family, Lieut.-Col. Robert Dukinfield, born in 1619, was a commander in the Parliamentary army, and as such defended Stockport against the Royalists under Prince Rupert, and in 1650 was appointed high sheriff of the county and governor of Chester, he was also M.P. for Cheshire in the parliament of 1653 and died 18 Sept. 1689; his remains were interred at Denton, but Judith, his wife, who died 23 Feb. 1738-9, was buried in the graveyard attached to the ancient domestic chapel, where there is an inscription to both; an altar tomb to William Dukinfield, d. 30 August, 1735; and another memorial to Francis Dukinfield Astley, d. 23 July, 1825. The chapel, licensed to John de Dokenfeld 10 Oct. 1398, as a private oratory, was used by the Independents during the reign of Charles I. by permission of Lieut.-Col. Dukinfield, himself a sturdy Nonconformist; it ceased to be used for public worship before 1795 and was subsequently desecrated until purchased by the Congregationalists in 1872, who thereupon added to it as previously stated. All the family portraits were dispersed by sale about 1845. The Hall was restored by the late James Ogden esq. about 1855, but its remains have since been converted into working men's dwellings. Dukinfield Lodge, erected about 1770, is a mansion of stone in the Tudor style, picturesquely situated on an eminence overlooking the valley of the Tame and adjoining scenery, but is now divided into two residences. Mrs. G. S. Nicholson is lady of the manor. The area of the civil parish and borough is 1,364 acres of land and 41 of water; rateable value, £68,511, and population in 1901, 18,929, viz.: Central ward, 6,699; East ward, 6,618; West ward, 5,612.

The population of St. Mark's ecclesiastical parish in 1901 was 8,207.

DUNHAM MASSEY is a parish with a station on the Altrincham and Warrington section of the London and North Western railway and is $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles west from Altrincham, in the Altrincham division of the county, Bucklow hundred and union, Altrincham petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The ecclesiastical parish was formed in 1855 out of the parish of Bowdon, and comprises the hamlets of Dunham, Oldfield, Woodhouses and Sinderland. The Bridgewater canal, now the property of the Manchester Ship Canal Co. passes through the township. The church of St. Margaret, erected in 1853-5, at the sole cost of the 7th Earl of Stamford and Warrington, estimated at £20,000, and consecrated 13 June, 1855, is a fine building of stone in the Perpendicular style from designs by Mr. William Hayley, architect, of Manchester, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave, south or Stamford chapel, aisles, transepts, south porch and a noble embattled tower with pinnacles, a ribbed spire and enriched flying buttresses, rising to an altitude of 220 feet and surmounted by a gilt cross: the tower contains a clock and 10 bells, the tenor weighing 1 ton 7 cwt. 3 qrs. and a set of 14 bells for chimes, all cast by Messrs. Taylor & Son, of Loughborough: the Stamford chapel, entered by a private door, has a richly-worked roof with pendant and is inclosed on two sides by oak screens of beautiful design: the Decorated east window, 30 by 14 feet, with rich tracery, is filled with stained glass representing prophets and saints, and all the windows in the transepts and north and east aisles contain stained glass representing different scriptural subjects:

the pulpit, reredos and font are all of Caen stone, exquisitely carved; the reredos has seven divisions, each filled with an enriched canopy, the centre three projecting from and rising above the others; richly-traceried buttresses with crockets and finials support these, and the whole is surmounted by an enriched cornice and Tudor-flower battlement: the organ was enlarged in 1876: the nave has an open-framed oak roof, with curved ribs and hammer beams, at the ends of which are richly-executed figures of angels with expanded wings: the chancel roof is divided into panels with a large boss in the centre: the church is seated with open oak benches, and affords 630 sittings. The register dates from the year 1855. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £414, in the gift of the trustees of the late Earl of Stamford, and held since 1895 by the Rev. Charles Maxwell Woosnam M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge, hon. canon of Chester, and surrogate. All Saints', built in 1898 as a chapel of ease to St. Margaret's, is in Regent road, Altrincham. **DUNHAM TOWN** is an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1898: the church of St. Mark, erected in 1864, at a cost of £1,200, on a site granted by the 7th Earl of Stamford and Warrington, is a small building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and central turret containing one bell: there are 241 sittings, of which 111 are free. The register dates from the year 1864. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £298, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Bowdon, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Roger Kerrison Preston M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. Bowdon Downs Congregational chapel, erected in 1848, was enlarged in 1864, and will seat

900 persons. Trinity Presbyterian church, Delamere road, erected in 1872, is a building of stone lined with white bricks; it has a large tower and spire, and will seat 400 persons; adjoining is a Sunday school. There is a mission hall in Police street, Altrincham, in connection with this chapel. Leicester's charity of £5 17s. yearly, founded by will in 1858, is for clothing. The Bowdon branch of the Manchester Hospital for Consumption and Diseases of the Throat, in Woodville road, comprises 4 large wards, 2 sitting rooms, dining rooms and apartments for the staff; it contains 50 beds; the average yearly number of patients is 240; the board of management consists of 17 members. Dunham Massey Hall, a handsome structure of brick surrounding a quadrangular court, is the property and residence of the Earl of Stamford M.A.; the mansion, which contains some good family and other paintings by old masters, was rebuilt in 1721, and stands in a park of 252 acres, abounding with fine timber and adorned with several sheets of water; a herd of about 100 deer is kept here, and there is another park of 130 acres adjoining. The township contains some good residences, principally occupied by Manchester merchants. The Earl of Stamford is lord of the manor and the chief landowner. The area is 3,681 acres of land and 31 of water; rateable value, £31,365; the population in 1891 was 2,047, and in 1901 was 2,544 in the civil and 3,468 in the ecclesiastical parish.

The population of St. Mark, Dunham Town, ecclesiastical parish in 1901 was 725.

OLDFIELD is a hamlet in Dunham Massey parish, about a mile west from Altrincham. Oldfield Hall is a mansion of stone, in a park of several acres, and is the residence of James Grimble Groves esq. D.L., J.P. The land is principally employed for market gardening and farming purposes, although a number of residences have lately been erected.

Seamon's Moss Endowed School, originally founded for 50 boys, from Altrincham, Dunham Massey & Bowdon, was formerly carried on in a large school building erected in 1759, but in 1867 new premises were built on a site adjacent & enlarged in 1899, for 200 boys, & there is now (1906) an average attendance of 185; in 1883 a scheme was set forth by the Charity Commissioners for the administration of the foundation, under which a yearly sum of £90 is applied to the maintenance of scholarships & exhibitions; these comprise (1) Ten scholarships of £1, awarded annually to boys conspicuous for regularity, punctuality, progress & good conduct; (2) Five annual scholarships of not more than £4 each for boys who have passed Standard VI. or VII. for the purpose of studying subjects higher than elementary; (3) Three exhibitions of £20 a year, tenable for three years at any place of education higher than elementary or of technical or scientific instruction, for boys who have been not less than 3 years in the school & not less than 12 years of age: the weekly school fees are also returned at the end of the year to all boys who have been uniformly regular & punctual in their attendance & who may, therefore, in this way obtain an absolutely free education; Thomas Johnson, master

SINDERLAND is a hamlet on the north side of the township of Dunham Massey, consisting of several scattered farmhouses. At Sinderland Green is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel, erected 1881. There is also a Congregational Mission room at Lowerhouses. The soil is light and sandy and admirably adapted for market gardening, which is carried on here to a great extent, spade husbandry being principally resorted to for the cultivation of the land, in which females take an active part.

DUNHAM-ON-THE-HILL is a village, township
and parish, containing the township of Hapsford, and was
formed into a parish in 1888 from that of Thornton-in-the-
Moors; it is on the high road between Chester and War-
rington, with a station on the London and North Western
and Great Western joint railway, 33 miles from Man-
chester, 6 north-east from Chester and 14 south-west
from Warrington, in the Eddisbury division of the county,
Chester Castle petty sessional division, Chester union and
county court district, and in the rural deanery, archdeaconry
and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Luke,
erected in 1861, is a small edifice of red sandstone in the
Decorated style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch
and a western turret containing one bell: there are 150
sittings. The register dates from the year 1888. The
living is a vicarage, net yearly value £150, with resi-
dence, in the gift of the rector of Thornton-in-the-
Moors, and held since 1902 by the Rev. Edgar Robert
Hutchinson M.A. of Cambridge. There are two Wes-
leyan chapels. The Earl of Shrewsbury and Talbot is
lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is
clay; subsoil, red sandstone. The land is principally
used for grazing purposes, but corn is also grown. The
area of the township is 1,404 acres; rateable value,

£4,246; the population in 1901 was—township, 282;
ecclesiastical parish, 368.

EASTHAM is a township, parish and village, on the river Mersey, and on the high road from Chester to Birkenhead, one mile and a half south from Bromborough station and a mile and a half north from Hooton station on the Great Western and London and North Western joint railway, a mile and a quarter south from Eastham Ferry, 9 miles north from Chester and 6 south from Birkenhead, in Wirral division of the county of Chester, higher division of the hundred and in the union of Wirral, county court district of Birkenhead, rural deanery of Wirral and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. This place in the summer months is a favourite resort for pleasure and picnic parties from Liverpool by ferry across the river. The church of St. Mary is an ancient edifice of red sandstone, in the Early English and later styles, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, south porch and a western tower with octagonal broach spire, containing 6 bells: the nave, which is the oldest part, dates perhaps from 1280; the chancel and tower may be assigned to about 1330; and the aisles are Perpendicular, the latest portion being the Stanley chapel, at the east end of the north aisle, erected c. 1500: this chapel, entered through a beautiful oak screen, adorned with the quartered arms of the Stanleys of Hooton, has been the burying place of that family, many of whom are interred in the vault beneath: in the chapel are two altar tombs, one to Sir William Stanley kt. ob. 1612, and another, of alabaster, to Sir Rowland Stanley kt. his grandfather, ob. 1613; here also is an inscribed marble tablet to Sir Thomas Stanley Massey-Stanley bart. of Hooton Park, d. 23 Aug. 1841, and to Frances (Smythe), relict of Sir Carnaby Haggerston; she died at Hooton 30 June, 1836, and this memorial was erected by her daughter and heiress, Mary, wife of Sir T. S. Massey-Stanley bart.: in the chapel is a memorial window to the above, erected in July, 1877, by Sir John Stanley-Errington bart.: the stained east window in the chancel is a memorial to Louisa, wife of John Torr esq. of Carlett Park, d. 30 Aug. 1868: one in the baptistery replaces a window presented in 1861 by Edward Grey esq. but since transferred to the church of St. Paul, Rhodesmor, Flintshire. In the north aisle is a marble tablet, erected by his widow, to the Rev. Thomas Trevor Trevor LL.D. prebendary of Chester, rector of West Kirby from 29 Mar. 1803, and for 30 years vicar of this parish, who died 1 Feb. 1827, and another to Captain Robert Salusbury Trevor, killed at Kabul, 23 Dec. 1841: at the east end of the south aisle are three carved panels, originally forming part of the pew of the Poole family, of Poole Hall, and bearing the quartered arms of that family: in the same aisle, cut in stone on the south wall, is a list of the bishops of Chester from 1542 to 1889, and of the previous bishops of Mercia and of Lichfield, or Lichfield and Coventry, from 656 to 1541 the present diocese of Chester having formerly been part of that see, and there is also a list of the vicars of Eastham: the alabaster retables, wrought iron screen, the windows in the chancel and some other ornaments were presented in 1888 by the Rev. W. E. Torr M.A. vicar: the font, presumed to be of Saxon date, was removed to the present baptistery in 1890, and in the Stanley chapel is an oak chest of the Elizabethan period: an organ chamber and vestries were provided in 1881 by prolonging the south aisle eastwards, as a memorial from his children to John Torr esq. M.P. of Carlett Park, who died 16 Jan. 1880: the interior of the church has been renovated during the years 1875, 1880, 1886 and 1890, and it will now seat 350 persons. In the churchyard is a very ancient yew tree. The register dates from the year 1598. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value to present incumbent (in consequence of pension of £50 to late vicar) £203, with residence and 15 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester, and held since 1880 by the Rev. William Edward Torr M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. There is a mission and lecture room, in which services are held on Sundays and Thursdays. In the centre of the village is a market cross, erected in 1891. A fine recreation ground has been laid out for the parish by private munificence.

The Eastham Ferry, which is the oldest on the river, was converted into a steam ferry in 1868. The river Mersey is here over two miles broad; the pier was erected by Messrs. Thompson and Gough in 1874, at a cost of £6,000, and immediately opposite the pay-gates, at the shore end, is the Ferry hotel.

The Manchester Ship Canal, opened in its entire length of 35 miles, on 1 Jan. 1894, has at Eastham the entrance locks, and here the channel of the Mersey has been dredged to a depth of 30 feet high water neap tides and 40 feet spring tides; these locks, three in number, are divided by concrete piers 30 feet wide, on which is the hydraulic machinery used for working the lock-gates: the locks vary in size; the largest, on the land side of the canal, is 600 feet in length by 80 feet wide; the mid lock 350 feet by 50 feet; and the outer lock 150 by 30 feet: besides the ordinary lock gates there are exterior storm gates for each lock, to be closed in case of very rough weather: the sills of the gates are 11 feet lower than the deepest dock sills at Liverpool or Birkenhead, and the channel has been dredged three feet deeper than the dock sills: the minimum width of the canal at the bottom from Eastham to Latchford is 120 feet, and the rise at the locks from mean tide to ordinary water level is 9 feet 6 inches; the Eastham section of the canal, from the mouth to Ellesmere Port, was flooded 19 June, 1891, and the Ince section, from Ellesmere Port to Weston Point, 13 Sept. in the same year; this point has been named Saltport, and is at the head of the Weaver Navigation, which vessels can enter from the canal: very extensive wharfs and quays have been erected here for landing and shipping timber, coals, salt and general merchandise; there are also several private wharfs on the banks: subsidiary locks have been constructed at Weston Marsh, Weston Mersey, Bridgewater, and Runcorn old quay; and jetties and laybies between Saltport and Runcorn. Above Runcorn there are the Latchford, Irlam, Barton, and Modewheel locks, the various locks raising the level 60 feet above the sea, the last forming the entrance to the docks at Manchester and Salford, which covers 114 acres, with quays about five miles in length. Ocean steamers up to 6,000 tons can pass through the canal. The capital raised for this undertaking has been £15,412,000, and the works, under the direction of Mr. Leader Williams C.E. were commenced Nov. 1887.

Carlett Park, the seat of the Rev. W. E. Torr M.A. vicar, is a fine mansion of brick and stone in the Elizabethan style, standing in a park of about 150 acres; a private chapel has been added to the house by the present owner. In close proximity to the village is Eastham House, the residence of J. Herbert Vernon esq. an edifice of stone standing in a well-timbered park of 50 acres. The trustees of Richard C. Naylor esq. J.P. (d. 1899) are lords of the manor and principal landowners. The entire area of the parish is 1,604 acres of land, 4 of inland and 246 of tidal water and 342 foreshore; rateable value, £11,560; the population of the parish in 1901 was 913.

EATON is a township and parish, formed Aug. 2, 1858, from the parish of Astbury, and is on the road to Macclesfield, 2 miles north-north-east from Congleton station on the North Staffordshire railway, in the Macclesfield division of the county, Prestbury petty sessional division, hundred and union of Macclesfield, county court district of Congleton, rural deanery of Congleton, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. Christ church is a Gothic stone structure, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and square embattled western tower containing a clock and 3 bells: it was built in 1856-7, partly at the expense of the late G. C. ECCLESTON is a township, parish and village, on the west bank of the river Dee and on the road to Aldford, 3 miles south from Chester railway station, in the Eddisbury division of the county, Broxton hundred, Chester union and county court district, petty sessional division of Chester Castle, and rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The Dee is crossed to Aldford by an iron bridge, erected by the late Marquess of Westminster. The church of St. Mary, entirely rebuilt in 1899, at a total cost of £40,000, on a new site near but above the former church of 1808, is an edifice of local red sandstone and ashlar, in the Gothic style of the 14th century, from designs by Mr. G. F. Bodley A.R.A., F.S.A. of London, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave, aisles, side chapel and a tower containing 8 bells, cast by Taylor, of Loughborough: the reredos is of carved sandstone, the font of coloured marbles and the chancel screen and other fittings of English oak: all the windows are stained: in the chancel is a memorial to the founder, the late Duke of Westminster K.G. (d. 1899), placed by his widow: it consists of a marble cenotaph, with an effigy in alabaster, the whole being surmounted by a richly-carved oak canopy: in the north aisle is an inscribed tablet removed from the old church, to members of the Grosvenor family buried at Eccleston from 1645 to 1802, and there

J. C. Antrobus, and held since 1895 by the Rev. Robert Moor Peile Butler M.A. of Pembroke College, Cambridge. Eaton Hall, on the Wilmslow road, the seat of Lieut.-Col. John Coutts Antrobus J.P. lord of the manor and chief landowner, is a mansion of brick with stone dressings, in the Elizabethan style; the principal entrance is a handsome portico, supported by four fluted columns: the park, which extends over about 200 acres, is well wooded. The township contains 1,212 acres of land and 17 of water; rateable value, £2,886; the population in 1901 was 346.

is also a brass to Lady Henry Grosvenor, who died 24 Dec. 1894; the old church stood on an eminence overlooking the Dee, and only a small portion of the south wall is left as a protection to the graves of the Grosvenors. The register dates from the year 1593. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £197, with 45 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Duke of Westminster, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Michael Ward Kinloch M.A. of Pembroke College, Cambridge, chaplain and librarian to the Duke of Westminster.

Eaton Hall, the seat of the Duke of Westminster, situated here, is about 3 miles from Chester, surrounded by a well-wooded park of 371 acres, containing a lake of about 11 acres; the principal entrance is from the Grosvenor road, by the Overleigh Lodge, from which there is an avenue 3 miles in length: the other entrance, on the Wrexham road, about 3 miles from Chester, is by a noble avenue about 2 miles in length, called "The Belgrave Drive." The old Hall, a large mansion of brick, was erected at the close of the 17th century from the plans of Sir John Vanbrugh, but about 1818 it was rebuilt from designs by Mr. William Porden, architect, the style being a species of Gothic, and the house, as thus reconstructed, consisted of a central block with wings, relieved by octagonal turrets and pinnacles: in

1840 and the following years this building was in turn much altered by Richard, 2nd marquess of Westminster K.G. under the direction of Mr. Burn, architect, and in 1870 a further and more extensive reconstruction and enlargement of the Hall was begun by the late Duke of Westminster, under the superintendence of Mr. Alfred Waterhouse R.A. and completed in 1883, and the mansion as it now stands is a fine example of 13th century Gothic applied to the requirements of modern domestic life: in the central portion of the main block are the central hall, the doorway of which (18 by 11 feet) is of alabaster, the saloon, a noble apartment 16 by 32 feet, and the library, a magnificent room, 92 by 30 feet, lined with walnut, the book-presses being carried up to a height of 11 feet, and here are hung five historical pictures by Benjamin West P.R.A.: adjoining the library is the grand staircase leading to the State apartments: the great drawing and dining rooms have various ante-rooms opening into them, and the drawing-room is panelled with exquisite embroidery worked at the School of Art Needlework at South Kensington, and has a fine chimney piece, executed at Rome in 1868: the saloon is hung with pictures illustrating Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*, painted by H. Stacey Marks R.A. and in the other apartments are pictures and portraits by Rubens, Snyders, Sir Peter Lely, J. M. W. Turner R.A. George Stubbs A.R.A. John Hoppner, Samuel Prout F.S.A. and Sir John Millais bart. P.R.A. The north wing consists principally of a spacious kitchen with stone groined ceiling and extensive larders: north-east of the kitchen is the Grosvenor wing, which forms a complete mansion of itself and is used exclusively by the duke and his family for their separate occupation: the extreme northern portion of the house comprises the stables, riding school and coachmen's cottages: a grand corridor runs north and south through the whole length of the building, and is intersected at its north end by another which runs east and west, connecting the Grosvenor wing with the chapel and stables. The chapel, which stands to the north-west of the Grosvenor wing and almost detached from the main building, is in a style of architecture corresponding with the rest of the structure, and consists of ante-chapel, nave, pentagonal apsidal chancel and a tower, 183 feet in height, rising over the ante-chapel, with spire, and containing a clock with four dials and 28 bells of very fine tone, cast by Van Aerschodt, of Louvain, and playing 35 tunes and 5 peals: the nave has a lofty groined roof of stone and windows on one side, the corresponding spaces on the opposite being filled with marble mosaic: it is separated from the chancel by a dwarf screen of alabaster divided into square panels filled with pierced foliage very delicately carved; a continuation of this

screen forms the pulpit, which is supported on columns of Devonshire marble: the retables, of alabaster and marbles, is richly adorned, and the font is also of alabaster: within the altar-rails is a magnificently-carved recumbent figure in alabaster, by Sir J. E. Boehm bart. R.A. of Constance (Leveson-Gower), first Duchess of Westminster, who died 19 Dec. 1880: eleven of the windows are stained: both the nave and chancel are fitted with stalls and benches of walnut wood with elaborately-carved ends, and the interior also includes a large gallery. The Hall is lighted throughout by the electric light, produced from works on the spot: extensive alterations to the electric light house have recently been completed: the gardens and conservatories, one of which is 375 feet in length, are very magnificent and cover about 50 acres, and there is also an aviary: close to the mansion is the stud farm, where the duke breeds his famous racehorses, and in front of the Hall is a fine equestrian statue, designed by G. F. Watts R.A., D.C.L. of Hugh de Abrincis, surnamed "Lupus," 1st Palatine Earl of Chester, who died 27 July, 1101. The Duke of Westminster is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil is clay; subsoil, marl. The chief crop is wheat. The area is 1,382 acres of land and 10 of water; rateable value, £2,731; the population in 1901 was 320 in the township, and 502 in the ecclesiastical parish.

EATON is a township, a mile and a half south. The Duke of Westminster is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The area is 968 acres of land and 31 of water; rateable value, £3,604; the population in 1901 was 182.

CLAVERTON, formerly extra-parochial, is now a parish in Chester union, 1 mile north, but without inhabitants. The Duke of Westminster is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The area is 264 acres; rateable value, £507. The parish was without houses or population in 1901.

EGREMONT is a modern village in the township of Liscard, and a steamboat station on the river Mersey, nearly opposite to Liverpool, to which there is a ferry, and is 2½ miles north from Birkenhead railway station, in the Wirral division of the county of Chester, lower division of the hundred and union of Wirral and county court district of Birkenhead, and in the rural deanery of Birkenhead and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. Egremont constitutes two of the ten wards now under the control of the Wallasey Urban District Council, and is lighted with gas and by electricity and supplied with water by Wallasey Urban District Council from works at Poultoncum-Seacombe. Egremont Ferry landing-stage, with station and offices, erected by the Wallasey Local Board (now the Urban District Council), and opened in 1875, was constructed from the designs of Mr. William Carson,

engineer and ferry manager, at a cost of £14,000; it consists of a high-level pier of wrought iron lattice girders, 35 feet above low-water level, supported at intervals of 35 feet by cast-iron piles 1 foot in diameter, with a timber flooring and cast-iron ornamental fence: at a distance of 70 feet from the shore, at the end of the pier, is a dolphin consisting of two groups of wrought-iron columns, arranged tripodwise and braced together, and a fence of elm balks is secured to the face of the dolphin to take the chafe of the steamers. It is connected with the pier by a wrought-iron girder bridge 80 feet long, hinged at the point of attachment to the pier and supported at the outer end on two hydraulic coupled-rams, fixed within the dolphin, by means of which the height of the bridge is adjusted to the varying tide levels, so as to allow the steamers to approach the dolphin: under the pier and

extending for an equal length into the river bed beyond it, a masonry slipway has been constructed, with an inclination of 1 in 34, and a movable carriage 325 feet long, adjusted according to the tide level, traverses it; the carriage weighs 80 tons, and is housed underneath the pier and automatically regulated so as to reach a point where there is sufficient water at the dolphin for the steamers: at the head of the slipway is a sluicing chamber which holds 200,000 gallons, and is filled by each tide, and by means of paddles, thoroughly scours the slipway and adjacent sand banks; the steamers run every half hour. The Egremont and Liscard promenade was constructed in 1892 by the late Local Board at a cost of about £6,700, from plans by Mr. W. H. Travers, surveyor to the present Urban Council: it forms a pleasant thoroughfare from the Egremont ferry to New Brighton, and is well lighted. The ecclesiastical parish of St. John was formed in 1884 out of Wallasey and St. Paul Seacombe; the church of St. John is an edifice of stone in the Classic style, consisting of chancel, nave, two vestibules, a portico supported on columns of the Ionic order, and has one bell: there are three stained windows and a chancel screen: the church was restored and decorated in 1894, at a cost of £800, and affords sittings for about 1,000 persons. The register dates from the year 1833. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £350, including an endowment of £19 19s. in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Walter Taylor Warburton M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge, and surrogate. St. John's Church Army mission room is in Union street. There is a Baptist chapel in Liscard road, erected at a cost of £2,200, and seating about 500. The Presbyterian Church of England, King street, erected in 1863, at a cost of £6,000, is a substantial edifice of brick with a stone front, in the Classic style, and has 729 sittings. The Presbyterian mission house in Union street is a building of stone and brick, and will seat 250 persons. There are a number of good residences, and the principal inhabitants are business men of Liverpool. Egremont Institute, Tobin street, opened in 1883, consists of an assembly room, holding 400 persons, reading and billiard rooms. Liscard Hall, formerly the seat of the late Harold Littledale esq. is a mansion of stone in the Classic style, standing in a beautiful park of about 200 acres; it was purchased in 1890 by the Wallasey Urban District Council, at a cost of £17,500, and has been converted into a Technical School; in 1891 the grounds were laid out as a public park. The area of the Egremont ward is 187 acres; rateable value is included with Liscard. The population in 1901 was 11,336.

ELLESMERE PORT (formerly called Whitby Locks) is a well-built village and port, in the parish of Whitby, at the junction of the Ellesmere canal with the Manchester Ship canal, on the southern shore of the river Mersey, with a station on the Birkenhead, Lancashire and Cheshire section of the London and North Western and Great Western joint railway, 7 miles north-north-east from Chester and 9 south-east from Birkenhead, in the Wirral division of the county of Chester and in the eastern division of the hundred of Wirral, union of Wirral, county court district of Birkenhead, and in the rural deanery of Wirral and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The

Ellesmere canal, which is the property of the Shropshire Union Railway and Canal Co. communicates, by its branches, with the Severn, the Dee and the Mersey, and opens up the inland navigation from Liverpool to North Wales, Bristol, Birmingham, Wolverhampton and the Midlands; the docks and warehouses are all substantially built, and a large number of coasting vessels and flats can lie here at one time. This is the chief depot for iron ore brought from the north, and forwarded to iron manufactories in Staffordshire and other places. A good trade is also carried on in pig iron, and steamers depart at every tide, conveying merchandise and

passengers to Liverpool and other ports. Immediately opposite Ellesmere Port is the massive embankment separating the Manchester Ship canal from the Mersey: it is constructed of piles and timber framing, solidly filled in and banked up with stone, rubble and boulder clay, the width at the top being about 70 feet, and at the base, which is strengthened with additional piles, 140 feet; the minimum bottom width of the Ship canal here is 120 feet. A pontoon dock capable of raising and docking vessels of 5,000 tons and 350 feet long was inaugurated here in Nov. 1893. The village is lighted with gas from the works of the Shropshire Union Canal Co.

By Local Government Board Order No. 42,750, which came into operation April 1, 1902, the civil parish of Whitby was constituted an Urban District, named Ellesmere Port and Whitby, and under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. ch. 73), is now governed by an Urban Council of fifteen members. The ecclesiastical parish was formed March 28, 1871, from the parish of Eastham. Christ Church, erected in 1869, at a cost of £2,900, is a building of stone, in the Early Decorated style, consisting of chancel, nave, transepts, south porch and a tower with turret containing one bell: there are about 400 sittings. The register dates from the year 1844. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £320, with 3 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1903 by the Rev. Oliver Edmund Rice. There is a Mission church, in Stanley street, in which services are conducted on sundays, both morning and evening. There is a Primitive Methodist chapel, built in 1900 at a cost of £3,500, and seating 670 persons. The Wesleyan Methodist mission room is in Queen street. There is also a Bethel chapel belonging to the Mersey Mission for Seamen. The acreage, rateable value and population is given with Whitby township.

The population of the ecclesiastical parish in 1901 was 4,027.

NETHERPOOL is a township in the ecclesiastical parish of Ellesmere Port, 2 miles east from Little Sutton station on the Hooton and Helsby branch of the Great Western and London and North Western joint railway, and 8 south from Birkenhead. Pool Hall, erected by Sir William Poole kt. sheriff of Cheshire 16 Hen. VIII. (1524-5), is a large and picturesque mansion in the Domestic style of the Tudor period, and was long the residence of the very ancient family of Pool or Poole, knights and baronets, who took their surname from this lordship, with which they were connected from the time of Edw. I.: the north and east fronts of the building are of grey stone; the other sides, relieved by projecting gables with mullioned windows, are of timber and plaster work; the east front is lighted by large bay windows, and has at each end an octagonal turret of three storeys, rising slightly above the main portion and finished with a low conical roof; attached to the south-east turret is an embattled porch, approached by a flight of steps and leading to a spacious hall, at the end of which is the great hall, an apartment with fine bay windows, but now divided so as to form several rooms, one of which contained a chimney-piece with the date 1574, which has now been removed to the front of the hall; there is also a dining hall, the walls of which are lined throughout with oak panelling, and an ancient chapel; the house, which stands on the south bank of the Mersey and now occupied as a farmhouse, is the property of the trustees of the late Richard Christopher Naylor esq. J.P. of Kelmash Hall, Northants (d. 1899), who are lords of the manor and the principal landowners. The area is 444 acres of land, 33 of inland and 106 of tidal water and 1,121 of foreshore; rateable value, £1,070; the population in 1901 was 21.

ELWORTH is an ecclesiastical parish, formed March 9, 1847, out of Sandbach and Warrington parishes, and includes part of Sandbach and Elton and the whole of Bradwall; it is on the road from Sandbach to Middlewich and Northwich, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles north-west from Sandbach, in the Crewe division of the county, petty sessional division of Northwich, rural deanery of Congleton, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. Sandbach station on the London and North Western railway is in this parish. The church of St. Peter, erected in 1846, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, north porch and an open western turret containing one bell: the church affords 222 sittings. The register dates from the year 1847. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £105, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Sandbach, and held since 1883 by the Rev. Thomas Lunt B.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. There is a United Methodist chapel here, built in 1889. BRADWALL (or Bradwell) is a township in the Eddisbury division of the county, Sandbach section of Middlewich and Sandbach petty sessional division, and in the union of Congleton, about 2 miles north from Sandbach. There is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel here, erected 1883. FRANKBY is a township and parish, formed June 28, 1861, from the parish of West Kirby, 2½ miles from the West Kirby station on the Wirral railway, and about 6 west from Birkenhead, in the Wirral division of the county, hundred, petty sessional division and union of Wirral, county court district of Birkenhead, rural deanery of Wirral and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. John the Divine, erected in 1862, is a building of red sandstone, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch, and a turret containing one bell:

there are twelve stained windows, and the church affords 400 sittings, of which 194 are free. The register dates from the year 1862. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £125, with residence, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester, and held since 1889 by the Rev. Clement Alfred William Cruttwell M.A. of University College, Oxford. Hill Bark, the seat of Mrs. Smith, is a mansion of red sandstone in the Gothic style; the house and home farm cover an area of 150 acres. Frankby Hall, the residence of Sir Thomas Bland Boyden bart. D.L. is finely situated, and commands extensive land, river and sea views. Sir Thomas Bland Boyden bart. Col. Arthur Mesham, of Pontryffydd, Trefnant, and Mrs. Gray, of Farley Hill Place, Reading, are the principal landowners. Soil, sandy; subsoil, rocky. The area is—ecclesiastical parish, 1,714 acres; township, 571 acres; assessable value of township, £1,862; the population was in 1901—parish, 573; township, 248.

The entire area is 809 acres; rateable value, £2,232; the population in 1901 was 285.

FRODSHAM is a market town and parish on the high road from Warrington to Chester, near the river Weaver, with a station on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railway, connecting Birkenhead, Chester and Warrington, 10 miles north-east from Chester, 4 south-west from Runcorn, 29 south-west from Manchester, 8 south-south-west from Warrington, 10 north-west from Northwich, 15 south-east from Liverpool and 19½ from London, and is in the Eddisbury division of the county, second division of the hundred of Eddisbury, Eddisbury petty sessional division, union and county court district of Runcorn, rural deanery of Frodsham and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The river Weaver, which is here crossed by a stone bridge and also by a lofty railway viaduct, affords communication with all the inland navigation, and is connected at Weston Point with the Manchester Ship canal, which passes westward through Frodsham marshes to Ellesmere Port. The Weaver sluices, which form part of the outer wall of the canal and divide the estuary of the Weaver from that of the Mersey, have been constructed in order to allow the waters of the Mersey to flow in and out of the Weaver with the rise and fall of the tide, and are 10 in number; they are built of brick, faced with sandstone, to a height of 44 feet, and rest on a solid foundation of concrete, deeply laid in the bed of the river; the stonework is plain, but very substantial, and between these massive piles of masonry are huge iron shutters, which can be raised or lowered by hydraulic machinery. The Weaver canal, cut in 1807, in order to render the Weaver navigation independent of tidal influences, is connected with the docks at Weston Point, and, pursuing a course nearly parallel to that of the Weaver, joins it at a little distance above Frodsham bridge. The parish extends to the Mersey. The town is lighted with gas by a company, from works in Main street, and erected in 1856, and is supplied with water from a deep well in Frodsham, the water in which is forced up to two reservoirs at Overton, whence it flows by gravitation to all parts of the district; the works were constructed in 1894, at a cost of £4,000, by Messrs. E. Timmins & Sons Limited, of Delph bridge,

Runcorn, engineers. The parish church of St. Lawrence, standing on a lofty eminence close to the village of Overton, half a mile from the town, is an edifice of red sandstone in the Norman style of the early part of the 12th century, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of six bays, aisles, north and south porches and an embattled western tower, containing a clock and 6 bells: the stained east window is a memorial to Robert Wainwright Ashley, d. Dec. 24, 1878, and John Rigby Pickering, d. Oct. 15, 1885, and there is another in the north aisle to Jane Crosfield, erected by her fellow Sunday school teachers: the nave and chancel were rebuilt and the tower partially restored in 1882, at a cost of £10,000, under the direction of Messrs. Bodley and Garner, architects, of London, and Mr. Samuel Davies, architect, of Frodsham, to whom was entrusted the restoration of the tower. The church affords 550 sittings. The register dates from the year 1558. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £365, with 50 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Christ Church, Oxford, and held since 1879 by the Rev. Henry Birdwood Blogg M.A. of Wadham College, Oxford, rural dean of Frodsham, and surrogate. The church of St. Dunstan, in Main street, an iron building, affords 230 sittings, and is served from the mother church at Overton. There is also a Mission church at Frodsham Bridge, seating 100 persons. Trinity Wesleyan chapel, Main street, erected in 1873, at a cost (including the organ) of over £8,000, by the late T. Hazlehurst esq. of Runcorn, on ground given by his brother, the late C. Hazlehurst esq. of Runcorn, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, with a tower and spire 120 feet high, and affords 630 sittings. The Wesleyan chapel, Five Crosses, Overton, erected in 1885, at a cost of £1,750, on land leased from the Marquis of Cholmondeley, is a structure of white brick, and affords 350 sittings. The Union (Congregational and Baptist) church, Bridge lane, erected in 1886, at a cost of £2,000, is a structure of red brick, with turret and spire, and affords 300 sittings. The Primitive Methodist chapel, Main street, erected in 1877, is a plain edifice of red brick, seating 300, and

there is a Free Methodist chapel in Main street. The Town Hall, erected in 1852, at a cost of £700, is a plain building, containing a hall, 54 by 32 feet, and holding about 300 persons, and two smaller rooms; it is used for concerts and lectures; the business of the savings bank is also transacted here, and here are the overseers' offices. The Memorial Hall at Overton, erected by J. C. Sutton esq. of Heath Dale, in memory of his wife and daughter, was handed over to the parish Oct. 31, 1901, and is used as a parish room. The Parish Room in Main street was erected in 1899 by public subscription. Courts for the manor and fee of Frodsham, and also for Frodsham lordship, formerly held here, are now abolished. Fairs are held on the last Tuesday in April and the last Thursday in October. A new Volunteer Drill Hall, in Main street, was opened in 1901, at a cost of £1,000, and will seat about 900 persons; it is used for concerts, balls &c. and contains a reading room. The entrance gates were presented by Mrs. Garratt, of Stapleton House. The Conservative Club house was erected in 1891, by the Frodsham Conservative Club Buildings Co. Limited, on a central site in Main street, presented by the Marquess of Cholmondeley, the designs being furnished by Mr. Samuel Davies, architect, of Frodsham. The Bear's Paw inn has over the doorway the date of its erection, 1632. The charities for distribution in money, chiefly to poor widows in Overton and Bradley, from Harrison's gift, left by will in 1838, amount to about £3 10s. yearly; of the Frodsham and Stockham charity one moiety goes to the poor of Frodsham and one moiety to the poor of Stockham. Overton Hill, near the town, is 400 feet high, and commands a splendid view of the five adjoining shires, the Weaver valley, and the estuary of the Mersey, and is a favourite resort in summer of pleasure seekers from Manchester, Liverpool and other places. Castle Park, purchased by the late Edward Abbott Wright, is now the seat of the Misses Wright, his daughters; the mansion, built of red sandstone, stands on the site of a mediæval castle, the only existing remains of which are part of the cellar walls. The present mansion stands in a small park and beautifully laid-out grounds of some 30 acres. The Marquess of Cholmondeley is lord of the manor and the principal landowner. The area of Frodsham township is 2,408 acres of land, 109 of inland and 43 of tidal water and 704 of foreshore; rateable value, £14,431; the population in 1901 was 2,278. Frodsham Lordship has an area of 2,610 acres of land and 20 of water; rateable value, £10,241; population in 1881, 1,087; 1891, 1,533; and in 1901 was 1,403. The population of Frodsham ecclesiastical parish in 1901 was 4,436.

MANLEY is a township of scattered houses, 4 miles south-west from Frodsham and about 2 miles from Mouldsworth railway station on the Cheshire Lines railway, in the union and county court district of Runcorn. Divine service is conducted at the school every Sunday morning and afternoon by the clergy of St. Paul's, Helsby. A mission church is now (1906) in course of erection here, at the expense of J. St. Vigor Fox esq. and will cost £1,000. The Primitive Methodist chapel, erected 1859, is a plain edifice of red brick, seating 150. Manley Hall, the seat of David Arthur Vaughan Colt-Williams esq. is a stone mansion, standing in a small but well-wooded park of about 20 acres. The land in the township is chiefly the property of the trustees of the late John W. Fox esq. of Girsby Manor, Lincolnshire, who are lords of the manor. The soil is sandy; subsoil, marl. The chief crops are potatoes, wheat and turnips. The area is 1,337 acres; rateable value, £2,700; the population in 1901 was 305.

GATLEY is a growing village, three-quarters of a
 mile from Cheadle stations on the London and North
 Western and Cheshire Lines Committees railways, and
 4 west-south-west from Stockport, in the Altrincham
 division of the county, union, county court district and
 petty sessional division of Stockport. Gatley is governed
 by the Cheadle and Gatley Urban District Council.
 The ecclesiastical parish was formed 30th June, 1882,
 from St. Thomas's, Stockport, and consists of the whole
 of the township of Stockport Etchells, in the rural deanery
 of Stockport, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of
 Chester. The church of St. James the Apostle, erected in
 1881, is an edifice of red brick, consisting of chancel, nave,
 transepts and a saddle-back tower on the south-west,
 containing one tubular bell: the base of the tower forms
 a porch: there are several stained windows and 250 sit-
 tings. The register dates from the year 1877. The living
 is a vicarage, net yearly value £170, with residence, in
 the gift of the rector of St. Thomas's, Stockport, and held
 since 1888 by the Rev. John Bruster, of the University of
 Durham. There are Congregational chapels at Gatley
 and Long Lane, and a Primitive Methodist chapel at
 Gatley. The Manchester Royal Lunatic Hospital, situ-
 ated here, was erected in 1848 at a cost of £25,000, and
 enlarged in 1885, when a ball room, officers' quarters and
 store rooms were added; it was further enlarged in 1897,
 and in 1901 another branch was erected for 60 more
 patients at a cost of £16,500: it stands on an estate
 of 103 acres, lying contiguous to the road from Wilmslow
 to Manchester, and about 100 feet above the Manchester
 level: the building, which consists of a central block with
 wings, has a south-east aspect: there is a chapel within

the grounds seating 230, and eleven villas for the re-
 ception of 116 patients: the country around is flat, but
 pretty well wooded, and very extensive and fine views
 are obtained from some of the windows, especially of the
 Derbyshire hills, and in the direction of Woodhead:
 Walter Scowcroft L.R.C.P. Irel. medical superintendent.
 Thomas Egerton Tatton esq. J.P. of Wythenshawe Hall,
 who is lord of the manor, and Lady Dundonald, of
 Gwyrch Castle, Abergele, are the chief landowners. The
 soil is sand, clay and gravel; subsoil, clay. The chief
 crops are wheat, oats, potatoes and turnips. The area
 of Stockport Etchells township is 1,572 acres; rateable
 value, £12,451; the population in 1871, was 977, in
 1881, 1,369, in 1891, 1,444, and in 1901, 1,776, including
 281 inmates and 119 officials and their families in the
 Lunatic Hospital and St. Anne's Hospital for Females.

Outwood is the name given to a few houses standing
 on the site of a former wood.

GAWSWORTH is a village and large scattered parish, on the west from Macclesfield to Congleton, 3 miles south-west-by-south from Macclesfield, the nearest railway station, on the Stoke and Stockport section of the North Staffordshire railway, in the Macclesfield division of the county, petty sessional division of Prestbury, Macclesfield hundred, union, county court district, rural deanery and archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester: the parish is intersected by the Macclesfield canal and the North Staffordshire railway. The church of St. James, which dates from the 11th century, is a fine edifice of stone in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with pinnacles curiously sculptured and containing a clock and 6 bells: the east window is stained and in the chancel are several monuments to the Fytton family, baronets and formerly owners of the Gawsorth estate: one on the south side to Francis Fytton is an altar-tomb, with arched sides, and on the upper slab his effigy in plate armour, the head resting on a helmet with a plume of feathers; the tomb is adorned with shields of arms of Neville and Fytton, he having married, in 1588, Catherine, widow of Henry (Percy), 8th Earl of Northumberland, and eldest daughter and co-heir of John (Nevill), 4th baron Latimer; below the effigy is the headless figure of a skeleton, carved in white marble: in the south-east angle is a monument to Sir Edward Fytton, 2nd bart. ob. 1643, with effigies in stone of himself in armour and of his 1st wife, Jane (Trevor): on the north side is a tomb, with effigies, to Sir Edward Fytton, 1st bart. ob. 10 May, 1619, and his wife Ann (Barret), ob. 1644, and below, on a sort of ledge in front, are a number of small figures, curiously modelled, of their children: on the same side of the chancel are five other figures, the first two being kneeling male effigies, in armour, and the third a female, in a sitting posture, her head resting on her right hand and her left holding a book; the Fytton to whom this tomb was erected died in 1683: there are 200 sittings. The church was renovated and improved about 1895, at a cost of £800. In 1893 a carved oak screen was erected,

at a cost of £270, to the late Rev. Edward Massie, for 25 years curate in charge here. The register dates from the year 1557. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £374, with 2 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of the Earl of Harrington, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Herbert Edward Polehampton M.A. of University College, Durham, and Ely. The Wesleyan chapel, at The Warren, was erected in 1892, at a cost of £600, and has sittings for 100 persons. At the back of the churchyard is an old tilting ground, probably the only one now in existence in so good a state of preservation: in a wood near the church lie the remains of a Mr. Samuel Johnson, author of the burlesque of "Hurlthrumbo," played at the Haymarket Theatre in 1722, he himself taking the character of Lord Flame; he was buried here at his own desire May 5th, 1773, aged 82. Near the school there stand the remains of an ancient cross, and in the vicinity of the church and rectory are four ancient fish ponds. The Earl of Harrington is lord of the manor and owns nearly the whole parish. The soil is—western side sand, east side clay; subsoil, rocky. The chief crops are oats, rye, turnips and potatoes. The parish contains 5,687 acres, of which 400 acres, called Danes Moss, are waste and uncultivated, and 17 of water; rateable value, £9,946; the population in 1901 was 573.

GOOSTREY-CUM-BARNSHAW is an ecclesiastical parish, and comprises the townships of Goostrey-cum-Barnshaw, Blackden and Twemlow, in the Knutsford division of the county, hundred and county court district of Northwich, Middlewich and Sandbach sections of Middlewich and Sandbach petty sessional division, Congleton union, rural deanery of Congleton, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. Goostrey township has a station on the Crewe and Stockport section of the London and North Western railway, and is 7 miles north-east from Middlewich, 9 south-south-east from Northwich, 12 south-west from Macclesfield and 7 north from Sandbach. The church of St. Luke, erected in 1792, is the third church built on this site, the original structure having been built about 1230; it is a plain edifice of brick, in the Norman style, consisting of chancel, nave, and a western tower with pinnacles containing a clock and 5 bells: the stained east window is a memorial to Egerton Leigh esq. of Jodrell Hall and West Hall, High Leigh, d. 5 Oct. 1865, and there are others to Mary Susan, wife of the Rev. W. G. Armitstead, the present vicar, d. 8 Nov. 1868, and to the parents of the late Capt. J. B. Glegg, of Withington Hall: there are mural monuments to Lawrence Armitstead esq. of Oranage, d. 31 Oct. 1814; Capt. Walter Booth R.N. of Twemlow Hall, d. 21 Mar. 1810; Thos. Booth esq. d. 23 Aug. 1786 and to the Baskerville, Glegg and Kinsey families: the ancient stone font, now in a mutilated condition, was in the old church: in 1876 the church was restored and the old oak pews reconstructed, at a cost of between £600 and £700; a new organ was at the same time purchased at a cost of £220: the church affords 250 sittings. The register dates from the year 1561. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value, £300 with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Sandbach, and held since 1862 by the Rev. William George Armitstead M.A. of Christ Church, Oxford. In the churchyard remains the lower part of a yew tree of great age. Here is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel, erected in 1875. The charities for distribution in money and bread are of about £9 yearly value. Egerton Leigh esq. of Jodrell Hall, John Baskerville-Glegg esq. of Withington Hall, who are joint lords of the manor, and the trustees of the late Rev. Edward Royds M.A. rector of Brereton in 1845-96, are the chief landowners. The soil is sand and clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and pasture.

GRAPPENHALL is a village, township and parish; the village is 1 mile south-east from Latchford station on the Stockport and Warrington section of the London and North Western railway, and 2½ south-east from Warrington, in the Knutsford division of the county, Bucklow hundred, petty sessional division of Daresbury, Runcorn union and Warrington county court district, rural deanery of Frodsham, and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Wilfrid, mentioned in Domesday Book, and rebuilt in 1539, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of seven bays, aisles, transepts, south porch and an embattled western tower containing a clock and 8 bells: the font, of Norman, if not earlier date, had been buried under the nave floor, but was recovered at the time of the restoration of the church and then repaired and re-set: in the church is a recumbent cross-legged stone effigy in chain armour representing Sir William Fitz-William le Boydel kt. ob. c. 1275; the figure was restored and an inscription on brass placed relating to it in 1875; there is another brass inscription, placed in 1876, to Sir Thomas Danyers kt. of Bradley in Appleton, who fought at Crecy, 25 May, 1346, and there captured the Count de Tankerville; there are many mural monuments to the Bower (1780-1830), Dakin (1728-1837) and Hall (1782-1810) families, to Murdo Grant, lieut. R.N. 1759, and to the Rev. Edmund Taylor, ten years rector here, d. 10 May, 1786, and Catherine, his wife, d. 1788: the church was restored in 1873-4, at a cost of nearly £5,000, and affords 400 sittings, all free except four pews in the Boydell chapel belonging to J. C. Parr esq. of The Heyes. The register dates from 1574. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £372, with 17 acres of

glebe and residence, in the gift of Sir Gilbert Greenall bart. and held since 1905 by the Rev. Harry Vernon Pigot M.A. of Oriel College, Oxford. There is an Independent Methodist chapel in Chester road, erected in 1881, and seating 200. Tanning is carried on here. Johnson's charity, a rent-charge of £7 yearly, is for clothing, which is distributed on Easter Tuesday: a sum of about £7, the rent of three fields in Appleton, is for school expenses. The Heyes, the seat of Joseph Charlton Parr esq. J.P. is a mansion pleasantly seated in a park of 150 acres. Grappenhall Hall, the seat of Francis Aylmer Frost esq. J.P. is a modern house surrounded by a park of 30 acres. Lord Barrymore P.C. of Fota Island, Queenstown, who is lord of the manor, Joseph Charlton Parr esq. and Mosley Leigh esq. of Hartford. are the chief landowners. The soil is light; the subsoil is sand. The chief crops are oats, wheat and potatoes. The area of the township is 1,597 acres of land and 23 of water; rateable value, £9,262; the population in 1901 was 987.

GULDEN SUTTON (or Sutton Guilden) is a township, parish and small village, three-quarters of a mile from Mickle Trafford station on the London and North Western and Cheshire Lines Committees railways, 3 miles east-north-east from Chester, 7 south-south-west from Frodsham and 7 west-north-west from Tarporley, in the Eddisbury division of the county, Tarvin union,

lower division of the hundred of Broxton, petty sessional division of Chester Castle, Chester county court district, and rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. John is a small edifice of brick, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a western turret containing 2 bells, dated respectively 1666 and 1777: the font bears date 1635: a memorial tablet of

serpentine marble in mosaic was erected in March 1896 to the memory of the Rev. Edwin A. The register dates from the year 1595. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £194, with residence, in the gift of G. Warburton esq. and held since 1899 by the Rev. William Rowley. Here is a Primitive Methodist chapel, erected in 1873. G. Warburton esq. who is lord of the manor, the trustees of the late Thomas Arthur Hope esq. of 14 Airlie gardens, London W. and Robert C. Smith esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is clayey; sub-

HALE is an Urban District, much scattered, formerly in Bowdon parish, but by Order of the County Council was formed into a separate parish March 31, 1900, and by Order in Council dated July 28th, 1906, was created an ecclesiastical parish; it is in Altrincham division of the county, Bucklow hundred and union, Altrincham petty sessional division and county court district, and in the rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester, about a mile south and east from Altrincham, consisting principally of private residences occupied by business men from Manchester; the district is rapidly developing, and fast becoming a residential suburb of the City and Port of Manchester. The Cheshire Lines railway from Altrincham to Chester, which runs in connection with the Great Northern, the Midland and Great Central railways, passes through the parish, and has a station here.

Hale is governed by an Urban District Council of twelve members, formed in 1900. St. Peter's, in Ashley road, formerly a chapel of ease to Bowdon parish church, was opened in 1892 and erected at a cost of upwards of £7,000: there are 400 sittings. The register dates from the year . The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £250, in the gift of the vicar of Bowdon, and held since 1906 by the Rev. John Ritson Brunskill M.A. of Queen's College, Oxford, who was curate in charge from 1893. Hale Barns is a hamlet in Hale parish. The chapel of ease at Hale Barns, erected in 1882 at a cost of £800, in connection with All Saints', Ringway, is an edifice in the black and white timbered style, and will seat 150 persons. The Congregational chapel in Ashley road, built in 1899 at a cost of £4,500, is a structure of red brick, and will seat 400 persons. Near here is also a Unitarian chapel, erected in 1721, with 160 sittings, and in connection with it a Sunday school, founded in 1787 and held in a building erected in 1880. The Wesleyan Methodist chapel, in Henry street, Hale road, erected in 1880, is of brick, and will seat 100 persons. Altrincham Girls' Home, Ashley road, Hale, founded by F. W. Crossley esq. of Star Hall, Manchester, was erected in 1883, for the reception of 60 children, and there were in 1901 54 children: the home is supported by voluntary subscriptions; it formerly consisted of two separate blocks, but one of these was transferred by Mrs. Crossley, in 1897, to the Manchester and Salford Police Orphanage, and had in 1901 20 children. The principal landowners are Earl Egerton of Tatton, the trustees of the late Sir William Cunliffe Brooks bart. (d. 1900), the trustees of J. Harrop esq. and Joseph Harrop Clibran, and John Richardson esq. The Countess of Stamford and Warrington is lady of the manor. The soil generally is sand and gravel, with here and there

soil, clay. The chief crops are wheat and oats. The area is 974 acres; rateable value, £2,259; the population in 1901 was 347.

HALTON (or Haulton) is a township and village and was formed into a parish, including Norton, Stockham, Rock Savage and Astmoor, July 3, 1860, from the civil parish of Runcorn; it is in the Knutsford division of the county, Bucklow hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Runcorn, and in the rural deanery of Frodsham, and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. Halton village, standing on the top of an eminence commanding a fine view of the rivers Mersey and Weaver, is a mile and a half south-east of Runcorn, and has a station about $\frac{1}{2}$ miles south from the village on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railways: the village is lighted with gas and supplied with water from works at Runcorn. The church of St. Mary the Virgin, standing on an eminence, is a building of red sandstone in the Gothic style, designed by the late Sir Gilbert Scott R.A. and consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, south porch and a turret on the eastern gable of the nave containing one bell: there are 415 sittings, of which 164 are free. The registers date from the year 1732. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value, £230, with 80 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Sir R. Marcus Brooke bart. and held since 1905 by the Rev. Samuel Wilkinson M.A. St. Catharine's College, Cambridge, and surrogate. The Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1875, at a cost of £4,000, at the expense of the late Thomas Hazlehurst esq. is a building of stone in the Gothic style, and has a tower with spire: it affords 320 sittings. A cemetery of one acre was formed in 1885 at a cost of £500, and is under the control of the Parish Council. Brooke's almshouses, founded in 1769 and endowed with £54 12s. yearly, are for six poor and decayed honest servants; each inmate receives 4s. weekly. Fairs and markets were formerly held here. The charities for distribution in fuel and money amount to £36 yearly, and there is also a sum of £11, for the support and repair of the library founded here in 1733 by Sir John Cheshytre kt. of Hallwood, first serjeant-at-law to George II. ob. 15 May, 1738, and buried in Runcorn church, where there is a monument: the library is a small detached building, and over the entrance is an inscription recording the foundation and the appointment of the curate as perpetual librarian. Halton Castle, now, and for a long period in ruins, was built A.D. 1071 by Hugh de Abrincis, surnamed "Lupus," first palatine Earl of Chester: it subsequently became the property of the Crown, in right of the Duchy of Lancaster, which has still a large jurisdiction in the country included in Halton Fee, or the honor of Halton, and maintains a court of record. At the Castle inn, which stands within the ruins, courts leet have been held annually for over 700 years; attached to the inn is a good bowling green. Sir Richard Marcus Brooke bart. of Norton Priory, is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is clayey, resting on rock. The population of the township in 1901 was 1,238, and the acreage is 1,813 of land, 39 of inland and 19 of tidal water and 235 of foreshore; the rateable value, £5,679. The population of the ecclesiastical parish in 1901 was 2,066.

By Local Government Board Order 15,915 (24 March, 1884) and by the provisions of the Divided Parishes Act, 1882, part of Halton has been transferred to Runcorn.

Public Elementary School (mixed), for 170 children; average attendance, 130; Miss Mary A. Woodward, mistress; Mrs. Mary E. Woodier, infants' mistress

ASTMOOR is a hamlet in the township of Halton, a mile and a half from Runcorn, on the Bridgewater canal.

NORTON is an agricultural township and village, with a station on the Chester and Runcorn section of the London and North Western and Great Western joint railways, $\frac{3}{4}$ miles north-east from Frodsham, 5 south-west from Warrington and 3 east from Runcorn: the township is intersected by the Bridgewater canal, now the property of the Manchester Ship Canal Co. In this township stands a lofty water tower of red sandstone, 113 feet in height, and 80 feet in diameter, erected by the corporation of Liverpool as part of their undertaking for the supply of water to that city from the great reservoir at Vyrnwy, in Montgomeryshire; the tank in the tower holds 3,000 tons (672,000 gallons) of water, which descends on the Cheshire side of the Mersey, through pipes laid in a shaft 86 feet deep, and is carried under the Mersey at a point about $\frac{2}{3}$ miles from Runcorn, by means of a tunnel 900 feet in length and 10 feet wide, lined with iron; on the Lancashire side the water ascends through a similar arrangement of pipes, and is thence conveyed to Prescott. Norton Priory, the seat of Sir Richard Marcus Brooke bart. J.P. is a fine old mansion, pleasantly situated in a park of about 115 acres. The Augustinian priory of St. Mary, once existing here, was founded in 1210 by William, son of Nigel, constable of Chester, having been removed hither in 1135 from Runcorn, where it was first established; he endowed it with lands in the counties of Nottingham, Leicester and Oxford, which endowment his son Roger confirmed and granted, amongst other privileges, two deer out of his park at Halton every year upon the Feast of the Assumption. Edward the Black Prince was also a great benefactor to this priory; in the time of Henry VI. it was raised to the rank of an abbey: Sir R. M. Brooke bart. J.P. is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil and the subsoil are clay; the chief crops are wheat, oats and potatoes. The area is 2,192 acres of land, 54 of inland and 62 of tidal water and 51 of foreshore; rateable value, £6,805; the population in 1901 was 294.

STOCKHAM is a small township, about one mile south-west from Norton station on the Chester and Crewe section of the London and North Western railway, 3 miles south-east from Runcorn, and one mile from Sutton Weaver station on the Crewe and Runcorn section of the London and North Western railway. The London and North Western branch railway from Warrington to Chester and Birkenhead passes through the township in a tunnel about a mile long. Cheshyre's charity amounts to £6 yearly. Sir Richard Marcus Brooke bart. J.P. is lord of the

manor and principal landowner. The area is 331 acres; the rateable value is £962; the population in 1901 was 38. Letters from Halton via Runcorn; the former is the nearest money order & telegraph office, three quarters of a mile distant

CLIFTON (or Rock Savage) is a small township, 1 mile from Halton station on the Chester and Crewe section of the London and North Western railway, 2 miles north-east from Frodsham and 2½ south from Runcorn, in Bucklow hundred. The Marquess of Cholmondeley P.C. is lord of the manor, and derives his title of Earl of Rock Savage (both created 22 Nov. 1815) from this place. The soil and subsoil are clay; the chief crops are wheat and potatoes. The area is 637 acres of land and 20 of water; rateable value, £3,567; the population in 1901 was 213.

HANDFORTH (or Handforth-cum-Bosden) is a parish and village, on the road from Cheadle to Congleton, with a station on the Manchester, Stockport and Crewe section of the London and North Western railway, 20½ miles from Crewe, 10½ from Manchester, 5 south-west from Stockport, 13½ from Sandbach and 17½ from London. Handforth is governed by an Urban District Council, formed October, 1904, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. ch. 73). Handforth was formed into an ecclesiastical parish out of Handforth and Bosden, and other parts of Cheadle parish 18 Dec. 1877, and is in the Altrincham division of the county, and in the union, county court district and petty sessional division of Stockport, rural deanery of Stockport, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Chad, formerly a chapel of ease to Cheadle, and erected in 1837, was rebuilt in 1893, and is a plain edifice of brick, with stone dressings, consisting at present of nave only, and seating 200. The register dates from the year 1843. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £92, in the gift of the rector of Cheadle, and held since 1900 by the Rev. Arthur Espinelle Espin M.A. of Keble College, Oxford. There is a Methodist New Connexion chapel, built in 1850, near the railway station, and a Wesleyan chapel in the Wilmslow road. Handforth Hall, formerly a residence of the Breretons of Ashley and Brereton, stands about a quarter of a mile from the church, and is now occupied as a farmhouse; over the doorway, carved on an oak beam, appears the following—"This haulte was buylded in the yeare of Oure Lord God mcccclxii. by Uryan Brereton knight whom maryed Margaret daughter and heare of Wyllyam Handforth of Handforth esq. who had issue 3 sonnes and 2 daughters." Edward Thomas Cunliffe esq. Alexander Brooke esq. of 34 Craven Hill gardens, London W, and J. B. B. A. Wright esq. of Mottram, are the principal landowners. The soil is sand, the subsoil clay; the chief crops are grass. The area is 1,312 acres; rateable value, £6,926; the population in 1901 was—civil parish, 911; ecclesiastical parish, 1,020.

BOSDEN, formerly a hamlet in this parish, now comprises part of the new civil parish of Hazel Grove.
